Higher Education Board Announces Grants, Gifts

PORTLAND — The State Board of Higher Education this week accepted \$188,204 in grants and gifts for its eight colleges.

Among the grants were two from the Atomic Energy Commission — \$50,000 to support research in experimental medicine at the University of Oregon Medical School and \$12,750 to continue research on projects at Oregon State College.

National Science Foundation grants of \$26,700 to the University of Oregon include \$11,000 for a study of prehistoric conditions along the Oregon Coast, to be directed by L. S. Cressman, professor anthropology.

Foes Of Hitler Given Top Ranks In German Army

BOONN, Germany — Two of the 1944 bomb plotters against Hitler, Adolf Heusinger and Hans Speidel, have been named to the top ranks in the new West German army.

They headed a list of officer appointments approved this week by the Security Committee of the Bundestag, lower house of Parliament.

They will serve first in a 6,000-man volunteer force to be raised this year as the nucleus to the 500,000-man armed force West Germany has pledged to the Atlantic Alliance.

There was no indication what posts they will hold. They will have their former rank of lieutenant general.

Speidel, 58, now is Bonn's civilian representative at Supreme Allied Headquarters in Europe. He was Field Marshal Erwin Rommel's chief of staff on the Western Front in World War II.

Heusinger, 57, has been heading the Defense Ministry's military planning department. He was wartime chief of the German supreme command's operations division. Defense Ministry officials have said previously he would be named chief of staff of all the armed forces.

Both Heusinger and Speidel were arrested after the 1944 attempt on Hitler. Heusinger was released after two months. Speidel escaped and was in hiding when the war ended.

Sen. Morse Uses Talbott Scandal For General Rap

WASHINGTON — Sen. Morse (D-Ore.) here has accused Secretary of the Air Force Talbott of "consciously and wilfully" misusing his office.

The senator said this was "only a symptom of what has been happening in the 'business' administration of President Eisenhower."

The propriety of Talbott's partnership in a firm whose clients include some defense contractors is being studied by a Senate investigations subcommittee.

Morse said the administration "has slipped through many objectionable and questionable appointments" and that "the President has either misused or shirked his responsibility—either course amounts to irresponsibility."

The senator cited what he said were examples of other appointees who have misused their offices: Former Asst. Secretary of Commerce Craig R. Shaeffer, who tried to fire Dr. Allen Astin, Bureau of Standards official; and former director of the Budget Joseph M. Dodge, and his successor, Rowland Hughes, who Morse said had attempted to put over "the sordid Dixon-Yates" power contract.

The senator said the Eisenhower administration had appointed men to regulating commissions from the "industry or interests subject to regulation."

Examples of this, he said, were Albert Beeson to the National Labor Relations Board; Edward F. Howey as chairman of the Federal Trade Commission, and Jerome Kuykendall to the Federal Power Commission.

Eisenhower Expects His Fourth Grandchild

WASHINGTON — A beaming President Eisenhower announced at a news conference Wednesday he expects to be a grandfather for the fourth time.

Newsman greeted the President's disclosure with applause and cheers.

Eisenhower broke off a discussion of the Big Four conference to say with evident happiness that immediately upon his return from Geneva his daughter-in-law, Barbara, told him that if all goes well she will have a fourth child next Christmas time.

Barbara, wife of the President's only son, Maj. John Eisenhower, now has three children—a boy and two girls.
