

Patterson Talks At Labor Meet On Jobless Law

MEDFORD (AP) — Gov. Paul Patterson told the Oregon AFL convention Wednesday he hopes the 1957 Legislature will remedy "objectionable features" of the new unemployment compensation law.

The governor said in a speech prepared for delivery here that the 1955 law, which increases maximum benefits from \$25 to \$35 weekly, "contains a mixture of good and bad features, with the benefits to the worker outweighing the drawbacks."

Good features of the new law, he said, include increased benefits, permitting jobless persons to accept part-time work without loss of benefits, extension of coverage to employers of two or more workers, and making the unemployment fund more stable.

Labor leaders have criticized the law because it disqualified thousands of workers from benefits.

Forward Step Taken

"The bill," Gov. Patterson said, "did not contain all the features that I had hoped would be incorporated. But I felt that the forward steps were of such great moment we should accept rather than reject the bill."

He told the delegates that 52.6 per cent of Oregon workers belong to labor organizations. Income of the state's workers is near the top of the national scale.

Gov. Patterson also told how the Legislature increased industrial accident benefits and guaranteed equal pay for women.

"The labor legislation that I have reviewed is but a part of the vast continuing effort by the people and their elected representatives to use our government institutions for the benefit of all the people," the Governor concluded.

Effect Of New Wage Floor On Economy Of Northwest Finds Congressmen Apart

WASHINGTON — Two Northwest congressmen sharply differ on whether the new minimum wage law of \$1 per hour will have any appreciable effect on the economy of the Pacific Northwest.

Rep. Thor Tollefson (R-Wash.) contends the new law "placed in jeopardy not only the jobs of 600,000 forest-product workers on the Pacific Coast, but the profitable operation of one of the industries of paramount importance to the economy and well-being of our area."

Tollefson was referring to the lumber industry.

Rep. Sam Coon (R-Ore.) claims the bill will not adversely affect the lumber industry or any other industry in the region, because the prevailing wage rate in the Northwest is already well above the minimum stipulated in the new act.

Coon is a member of the House Labor and Education Committee which handled the bill.

Tollefson based his argument on a section of the bill which exempts from its provisions "any forest-product operation employing 12 or fewer persons."

"Most of the lumber camps and mills in the South employ 12 or fewer persons; thus the operators can pay any wages they wish to tens of thousands of workers, giving the products they make an extremely favorable competitive advantage over those manufactured in our area where a decent wage prevails," Tollefson declared.

Coon said he was convinced from listening to testimony of lumber operators from the South and the Northwest that this would not be the case. He said most of the small operators in the South were producing such items as wooden food crates and barrels which are not competitive with Northwest lumber products.

"Our people have been shipping more and more lumber products into the South year after year," Coon said, indicating that the South cannot offer great competition to the mills of the Northwest. He said that while wages are lower in the South, Northwest operators find they are getting a higher rate of production from their workers who are paid higher wage scales.

Northwest Economy Safe

Although Tollefson was critical of this feature of the bill and Coon said it would not disturb the economy of the Northwest, Tollefson supported the increase in the minimum wage from 75 cents to \$1 and Coon opposed it.

"I think we will probably do more harm to small business and those wage earners we are supposed to be trying to help," Coon said, explaining that many employers told the committee they

might still operate profitably at 90 cents, but were doubtful if they could do it at \$1.

Coon favored the 90 cent level, as advocated by President Eisenhower; and he supported efforts on the floor to amend the bill to that effect. On the vote for the bill itself, Coon at first voted against it, then changed his vote in support of it.

"After doing all I could to change it to 90 cents," Coon said, "I thought I might as well go along with it (and vote for the \$1 amount in the final bill)."

All congressmen from the Pacific Northwest were among the 362 who voted for the bill on the final roll call, against 34 who opposed it.

In another congressional action affecting the lumber industry to a degree, Congress turned down a bid by the domestic hardwood industry for a boost in the tariff on imported hardwood from Canada and the Scandinavian countries.

The tariff increase was attached by the Senate as a rider to a bill allowing servicemen to import gifts duty free. The House had passed the bill earlier without the hardwood rider, which was then knocked off in conference.

Ex-Rep. Lowell Stockman (R-Ore.) lobbied here for weeks to get the rider approved, after failing last year to get favorable action on a bill of the same nature. Stockman is now in the hardwood business at Pilot Rock, Ore.

Gus Newbury, Medford Attorney, Passes Away

MEDFORD (AP) — Gus Newbury, widely known attorney and a prominent figure in Jackson county for more than 70 years, died Tuesday night.

Newbury arrived in Jacksonville in 1881, and started teaching school four years later at the age of 16. He later served two terms as county superintendent of schools.

Entirely self-taught, he passed the state bar examination in 1903 and began practicing law.

He was Jackson County clerk for a time. Newbury was also active in fraternal organizations.
