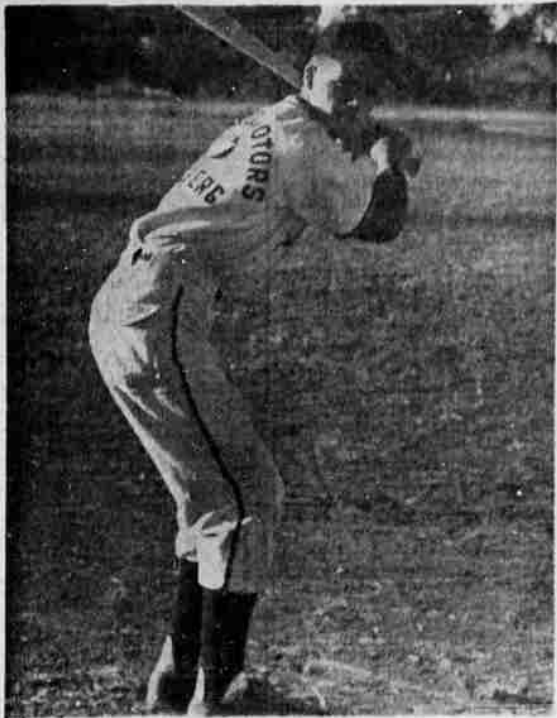


Junior Legionnaires Post Impressive Records

Lewiston came back from an 8-2 beating in seven innings at Spokane to take the Indians, 4-1. Eugene lost 5-4 in the abbreviated opener against Tri-City but shut out the Braves, 2-0 in the nightcap.

At Wenatchee, Salem's Joe Whitson set the hapless Chiefs down with three hits. The Senators picked up two runs in the third when Mel Krause tripled home a runner and closed the scoring in the fourth on Don Fraley's two-run homer.

Horse Betting Hinted For '56

County Fair Racing Set Again This Year

Horse racing, featuring entries from throughout southern Oregon, are being planned as part of the entertainment events at the Douglas County Fair and they may be the forerunner of pari-mutuel betting in 1956.

Harry Hucker, Olalla, has been put in charge of the race program. He has had considerable experience in running horses in California.

He and Fair Manager Dick Turley said Wednesday an attempt will be made to obtain approval of the State Racing Commission for a pari-mutuel window at the fairgrounds next summer.

Fairs Get Race Money

Turley explained that 60 per cent of the money taken in by the state on racing is returned to fairs, turkey shows and the like. He said even though the county fair now has no betting, it gets a cut from others where racing is held.

Turley estimated the amount at between \$10,000 and \$12,000.

Common practice, he continued, shows a return of 85 per cent of the betting money to the public. The remaining 15 per cent goes for expenses and to the state.

The road ahead for introduction of pari-mutuel betting at the county fair here isn't without a few curves.

Better Facilities Needed

Turley said improved facilities at the fairgrounds, such as better lighting, will be needed.

"A little backing and much enthusiasm" could make betting possible here. He also sees the need of a sponsoring group.

Meanwhile, work on the 1955 races continue. Race manager Hucker said an entry fee, not yet determined, would be announced soon.

There will be a price of \$100 plus entry fee, in each of the races. The split among the winning three entries will be on a 50-30-20 per cent basis, Hucker announced.

Children under 15 will be admitted free. A slight admission charge is planned for adults.

Hearst, Sports Writer Denied New Libel Trial

LOS ANGELES — Sports columnist Vincent Flaherty and the Hearst Publishing Co. have denied a new trial of a libel suit in which a former heavyweight fighter Lou Nova won \$35,000 damages.

Superior Judge Newcomb Condee ruled against the defendants. A jury in his court held last June 1 that Flaherty was wrong in calling Nova a coward for his actions in a fight with ex-heavyweight champion Joe Louis Sept. 29, 1941.

Nova sued for \$200,000 alleging his reputation was damaged.

Bleachers Moved, Ground Levelled In Preparation For Start Of Grandstand

Initial preparations for construction of a new grandstand on the south side of Finlay Field took place Wednesday with the moving of old wooden bleacher sections from the sidelines onto the two ends of the field.

Leveling also took place and ground was pronounced ready for foundation. First actual construction step will be taken with the

setting of forms for the foundation within the next day or two.

Construction was originally set to begin next week on the project promoted by the Indian Club to build a new grandstand.

Chairman Robert G. Davis of the club reports that materials for construction from lumber companies "have been coming in real good." He then stressed that the important thing now was to continue the selling of preferential seating plaques.

The plaques have been selling in town by club members for the past week on a donation basis to help defray the cost of constructing the new grandstand. Various business houses will also handle selling of the plaques which sell for a minimum of \$10 and entitle the holder to preferential seating at Finlay Field football games for the next 10 years.

Graves, Dage Add Race Points
