the 10th inning, then rookie Milt Smith singled off loser Clem Labine to bring in the winning run. Don Hoak and Duke Snider homered for Brooklyn. Johnny Klippstein pitched the 10th inning and gained credit for the victory.

Roberts Gets Competition
Roberts, seeking his 17th victory, hooked up in a hurling duel with Lew Burdette for six innings at Milwaukee. Then in the seventh the Phils scored on three singles, but the Braves bounced back in the bottom half with the winning talies after two were out. Del Crandall singled, Danny O'Connell was hit by a pitch, and pinch hitter George Crowe drove home one run with a single. Billy Bruton's infield hit scored the winning run.

Wally Moon blasted a grand slam homer while Harvey Haddix tossed a three-hitter for St. Louis to end a five-game Pittsburgh winning streak. Moon's homer came in the eighth inning and clinched the Cards' first win in five games.

The Chicago Cubs, who had won only once in their last 15 games, poured it on the Giants. They scored four runs in the first three innings of the opener and coasted home as Paul Minner gained his eighth victory with help from relief pitcher Bill Tremel. The Giants led 8-4 going into the eighth inning of the second game, but the Cubs smashed seven consecutive hits for five runs. New York had built up its lead on Willie Mays' 31st and 32nd homers, and a grand-slammer by Dusty Rhodes.

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Washington Entries In Golf Quarterfinals

CHICAGO — A battle of golf prodigies, a renewal of a Southern feud, and a showdown between two meet-scarred warriors highlighted Thursday's quarterfinal round of the 53th women's Western Amateur tourney.

Carol Dinger of Tiffin, Ohio, and Mrs. Mae Murray Jones of Southern Pines, N. C., the "oldster" pair, met in a top match. Co-medalist Miss Dinger Wednesday whacked three strokes off men's par in a 14-hole, second round triumph over Charlene Cross, Winchester, Ky.

The "kid" skirmish was between the other co-medalist, 18-year-old Wilfrid Smith of St. Clair, Mich., and 17-year-old Anne Quast of Everett, Wash. Miss Smith, as a 15-year-old, won the Mexican Open. Miss Quast, as a 14-year-old, was the younger player ever to qualify for the National Amateur.

The Dixie scrap was between Mrs. Scott Probasco of Chattanooga, Tenn., 1950 collegiate champion as Betty Rowland, and Mary Patton Janssen of Charlottesville, Va.

The day's fourth match was between Curtis Cumper Pat Lesser of Seattle, and the meet's "dark horse", 20-year-old Vernice Denney of Lake Forest, Ill. Miss Quast stopped Eileen Stubb, Augusta, Ga., 5 and 4 and Miss Lesser ousted Marge Burns, Greensboro, N.C., 5 and 3.

Dr. Ed Palmrose, Astoria, overwhelmed another Astorian, Eddie Hall, 8 and 7.

Ralph Dichter, medalist, playing on his home course, defeated George Shirilla, Pendleton, 5 and 4.

Lillian Schassen, medalist from The Dalles, was eliminated in the quarter-finals of the women's division. She lost to Mrs. Harry Stepp, Portland, 3 and 2.

Other women's results: Barbara Snook, Portland, defeated Mrs. Tom Georges, Tualatin, 7 and 5.

Mrs. Lloyd Burgess, Astoria, defending champion, stopped Mrs. Graham Barbey, Astoria, 5 and 3.

Mrs. Les Darby, Portland, eliminated Mrs. Ed Wheelock, Portland, 4 and 3.

Horseshoe Championship Acquired By Coloradoan

Two Pacific Coast League games were good for 33 innings Wednesday night as Sacramento edged Seattle, 4-3, in 17 innings and the Oakland Oaks defeated Los Angeles, 3-2, in 16.

In regulation contests, Hollywood beat San Francisco, 11-4, and San Diego split a double bill with Portland, taking the opener, 2-1, but losing the second game, 3-2.

Both Sacramento and Seattle got 12 hits but had trouble getting past first base. The Rainiers scored in the first inning when Carmen Mauro singled and moved around on a walk, a deep fly and a force out. Sacramento tied it up in the fourth with a double by Jerry Streeter and a single by Harry Bright.

Sacramento Ties In Ninth
In the seventh Seattle's Bob Balena and Art Schult singled, advanced on Chick Pieretti's wild pitch and scored on Leo Rightt's single. But Sacramento surged back in the ninth to knot the score. Bright and Jake Crawford singled, and Ed Mierkiewicz doubled them home.

There was no further scoring until the 17th, when Crawford singled, went to third on Mierkiewicz' single and came home after a sacrifice fly by Bud Sheely.

At Oakland it was a 1-1 game at the end of the ninth.

In the 10th Bill Consolo came in from third with the winning run when a pitched ball slipped by the catcher.

Four Hits Get Pads Run
In the first game at Portland, San Diego got its two runs in the fourth on successive singles by Dick Sisker, Ray Jablonski, Earl Rapp, and Ed Bailey. The Beavers' run was unearned. Carl Powe singled in the first and scored after center fielder Dick Faber overthrew third base trying to get him as he advanced on Luis Marquez' single.

Portland's Glenn Elliott had the visitors under control in the second game. He'd allowed only two hits and no runs until the ninth, when Sisker singled and Jablonski followed with a home run. But Elliott retired the next three men.

The Beavers scored twice in the fourth on doubles by Marquez and Ed Mickelson and a single by Eddie Basinski. They added another in the seventh when Basinski singled, went to second on a passed ball and came home on Jim Robertson's double.

At Portland it was Frank Austin night, called to honor the Beavers' shortstop, who was playing in his 600th game for Portland. A jazz combo turned out to serenade him after which admirers presented an array of gifts, ranging from a fishbowl full of silver coins to watches, lamps, luggage and even a live pig in a crate.

Austin responded with a short speech — and several brilliant fielding plays.

Northwest Open Event Slated At Walla Walla

WALLA WALLA — Six years ago Ed (Porky) Oliver, then the pro at Seattle's Inglewood Country Club, closed his way around the Walla Walla Country Club course to win the Northwest Open Golf championship.

That was the last time, in 1949, the Northwest Section of the PGA held its annual Open here.

Next Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday the Open returns to Walla Walla. Oliver won't be among those shooting for the \$3,500 pro purse, but a flock of Northwest vets and a talented array of newcomers already have signified their intentions to claim the title, won in 1954 by Eddie Draper of Seattle.

Draper, now an assistant to Claude Hamon at the Winged Foot Country Club in Mamaronock, Long Island, won't defend the championship. A field of approximately 150 entries, however, is expected for the 72-hole tournament, gridded in an effort to succeed Draper. There will be 18 holes of medal play the first two days for all contestants, and 36 holes Wednesday for the low 60 and ties.

In addition to the \$3,500 pro jackpot, merchandise awards totaling \$750 in value will go to the leading amateurs.

The Baltimore Orioles have had the largest turnover of players this year. Of the 40 on their roster of Dec. 1, 1954, only 14 players are with the team.
