Knife Attacker Of Nehru Draws Six-Year Penalty

BOMBAY, India (AP)—The Nagpur district magistrate Thursday sentenced a 34-year-old rickshaw puller to six years at hard labor for "attempting to cause Prime Minister Nehru's death."

The man, Baburao Kachale, jumped on the side of Nehru's automobile last March, waving a knife. Police said the man was angry because he had been arrested previously for a traffic violation.

The publication includes actual classroom projects dealing with construction of furniture, working models, toys, musical instruments, masks and formulae for making butter, candles, paper, etc.

Honored Eskimo Didn't Understand But Nods Happily

GAMBELL, St. Lawrence Island, Alaska (AP)—Old Moses Soongarook, toothless and 69, didn't understand a word of what was said but he nodded happily, clutching his certificate and shuffled away as fast as his mukluks would allow.

Soongarook couldn't stay to see the rest of the ceremony here. He and 59 other Eskimos of this St. Lawrence Island community were given medals and certificates for their work in rescuing the 11-man crew of a U. S. Navy patrol plane shot down by Russian fighter planes June 27.

He couldn't stay because it was time for him to go on duty at the Ground Observer Corps post from which a constant watch is kept on the shores of Siberia only 38 miles away.

The Eskimos have a clear view of the Asiatic mainland and can see two Soviet bomber bases and one MIG fighter base. The whole community of 300—except for the man in the GOC post—turned out for the ceremonies.

The Eskimos were at the scene of the wreckage of the Navy plane in less than an hour after it crashed. They carried blankets, first aid kits and coffee in their little skin boats.

Seven injured men were among the 11 crewmen who were waiting about 300 yards from the still-burning plane and first aid was quickly given.

Rescue planes soon reached the fliers and took them to Fairbanks. The ceremony yesterday was the official "thank you."

The race horse Joe Jones was named after the man who acted as the groom for Stymie, sire of the thoroughbred.

Tax Board Ruling Cuts Assessment On Moore's Island

SALEM (AP)—The Oregon State Tax Commission ruled Wednesday that the Clackamas County assessor can assess the northern half of Moore's Island at Oregon City, on which is located the Crown-Zellerbach paper mill and a Portland General Co. generating plant.

In the past, the commission has assessed the whole island, which is owned by PGE. The commission assesses operating properties of utilities.

The commission valued the land at \$10,000 an acre, in contrast to County Assessor Gus Meyers' assessment of \$30,000 an acre.

Wednesday's decision holds the northern half of the 20-acre island to be non-operating or a utility. Meyers had ruled void past assessments on the island, but the

commission held that no assessor can rule void any order of the commission. On the opposite side of the river, land occupied by Publishers Paper Co., and also owned by PGE, is assessed at \$30,000 an acre. The commission said this assessment would be reduced in the near future.

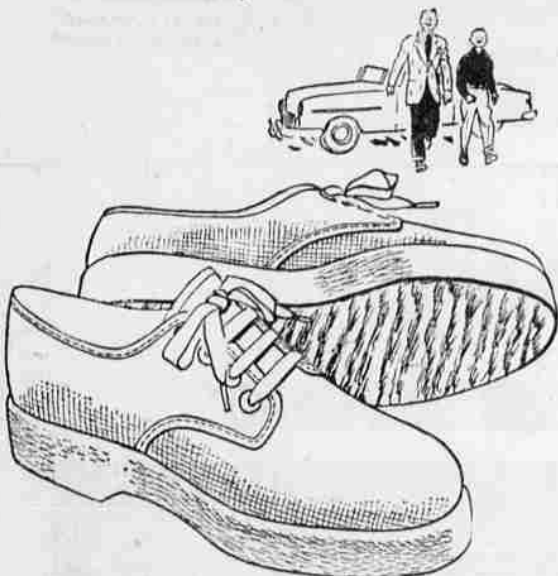
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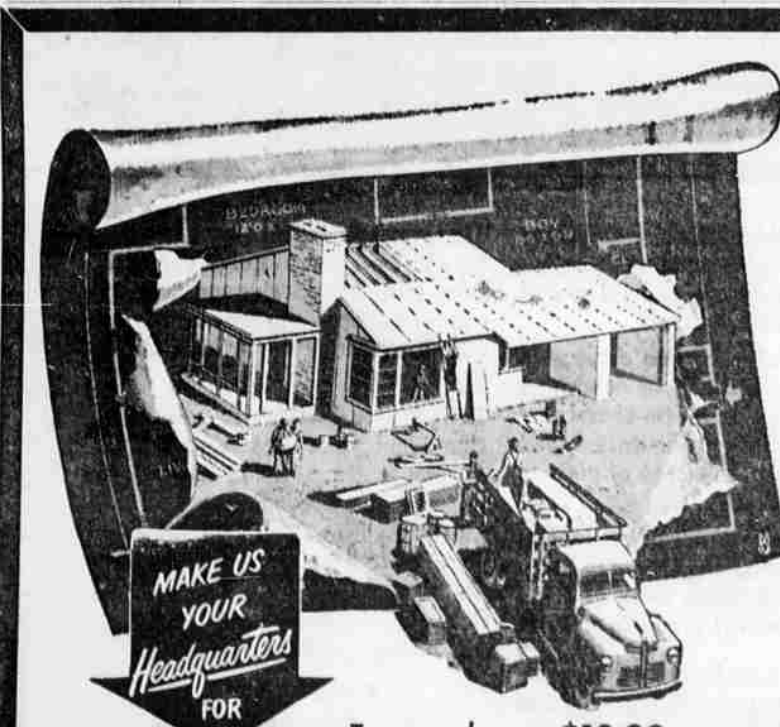


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
