

Flying Service Sues Over Spraying Contract

DENVER (AP)—Suits for \$40,000 were filed in Denver district court Wednesday against the Colorado agriculture Dept. by an Oregon flying service which charged failure to "provide the necessary acreage" to fulfill provisions of a grasshopper spraying contract.

Ace Flying Service, Inc., charged the state agency agreed a year ago to pay 13¢ cents an acre for spraying 1½ million acres of infested rangeland.

The petition claims the firm was allowed to spray only 240,000 acres and the state owes \$40,000 on the contract.

Chief Of Legion Sees No Peace Under Red Rule

REDMOND, Ore. (AP)—Seaborn P. Collins, national commander of the American Legion, said here Thursday the Legion approved United States participation in the Four Power Conference at Geneva.

"But," he said in a speech prepared for delivery at the Legion's annual state convention, "I hope that the American people will not become so anxious for a cold war

settlement that they will be willing to sacrifice any military, economic or psychological advantage which they might now have over the Communist world."

Collins, a Las Cruces, N.M., real estate man and contractor, told the delegates, "Never let it be said that the American people refused to set down at a table with any other nation or group of nations and talk peace."

However, he said he "sees no hope of lasting peace while a great part of the world is held in the grip of Communist dictatorship."

"You cannot reach agreement for peace while the will of 600 million people is crushed by a small group of men who want to rule the world. When these people are freed and their great longing for peace can be expressed, then and only then will we have lasting peace."

Collins asked, in view of Russia's record, "how much reliance could we place on any agreement reached as a result of the Geneva Conference and the diplomatic talks which will take place this fall?"

Senate Restores Funds For Oregon Air Bases

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate restored nearly four million dollars for Oregon projects in the supplemental military appropriations bill passed late Tuesday.

Included were \$2,042,000 for the Klamath Falls Air Base, \$1,806,000 for the Portland Air Base and \$92,000 for the Tongue Point Naval Station.

The items had been deleted earlier through technical points of order. Subsequent legislation eliminated the technical objections, and opened the way for restoration of the items.

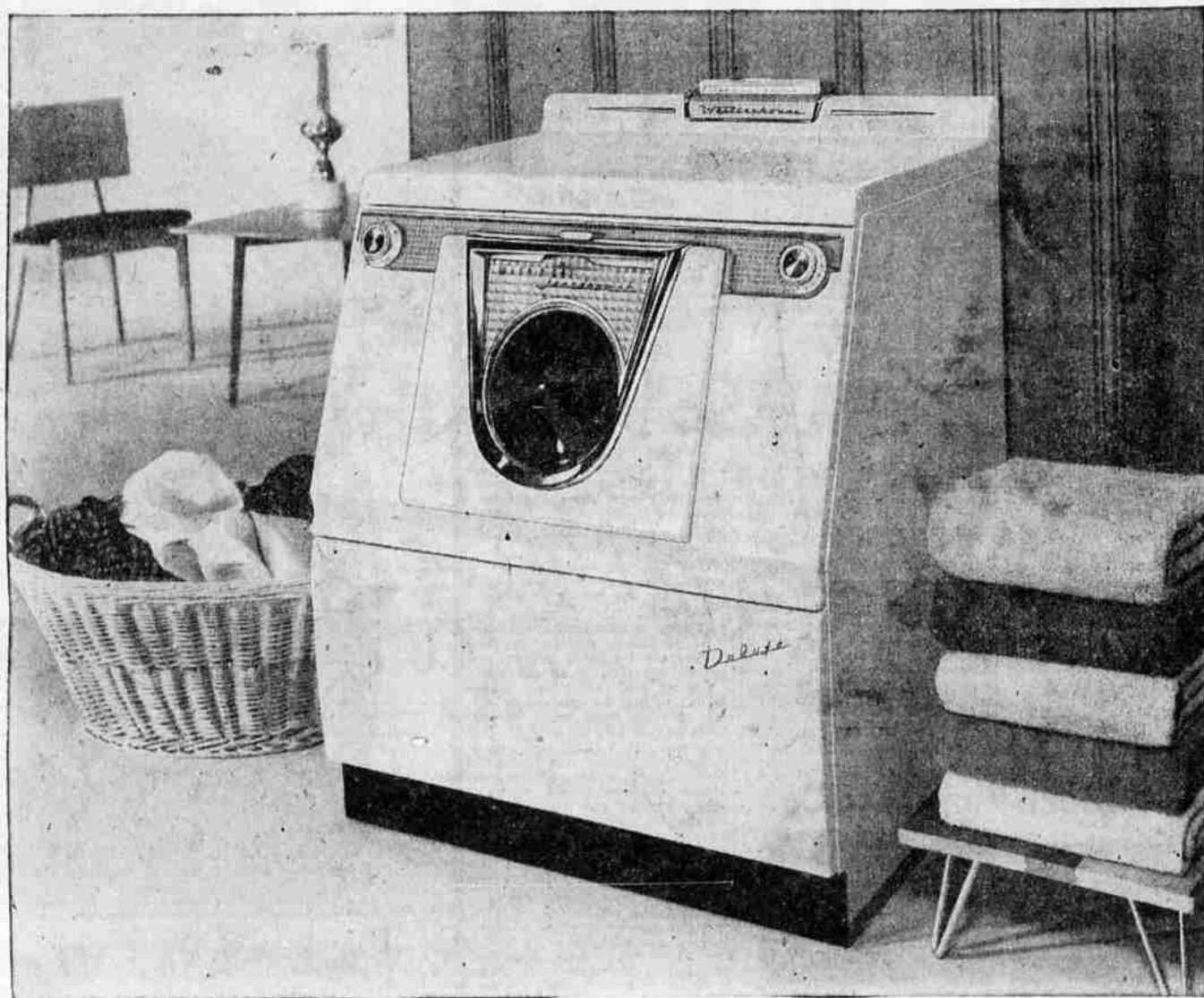
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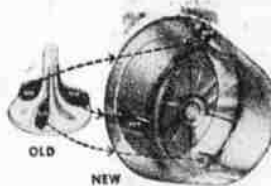
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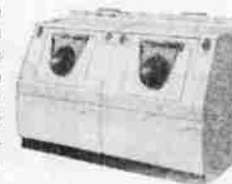
