Mystery Drama Well Presented In Kiwanis Series

A psychological mystery drama pointing up author J. B. Priestley's belief that "we don't live alone" was presented in Roseburg Thursday evening.

"An Inspector Calls" was the third offering in the 1955 Kiwanis Summer Theater Series. Capably written by Priestley and well cast with University of Oregon students, the three-act play was a jeweled offering.

Its plot concerns personality reactions of a well-oriented and individually enmeshed in the life web class English family and the fiancée of the daughter as they are individually enmeshed in the life web which confined and apparently caused a young woman's suicide.

Each family member, it develops, has played a part in the tragic events which stockpiled until an Eva Smith (known also by other names) ended her life by drinking disinfectant.

Knowledge of her death is brought to the group assembled in the Birling home to honor the engagement of Sheila Birling (Barbara Adams) and Gerald Croft (Harold Williams) by an Inspector Goole (Bruce Holt). The inspector as "Grand Inquisitor" questions each individually until the dead woman's story is unraveled.

The father, Arthur Birling (Gordon Howard) started the net when he discharged her from his mill after she unsuccessfully joined in a strike for a pay increase. The daughter later forced her dismissal from a store for "impertinence." The fiancée befriended her at a bar and established her in an apartment as his mistress for a time. The son Eric (Bruce Emmons) met her later at the same bar, later fathered her unborn child and stole money from the Birling firm to help support her, until she refused his aid. And, a short time later, Mrs. Birling (Ann Winther) was instrumental in preventing a Brumley charity group giving her assistance.

Through direct questioning, the inspector brings forth the mottled story. When its implications become evident to all, he abruptly departs after declaring "we don't live alone. . . the time will come that if men don't learn that lesson, they'll be taught!"

In a diabolic plot twist Priestley allows his players to realize they have admitted their respective sins to a bogus officer. Now the story grinds and snakes as all but the Birling children revert to the

form, accepting the inspector's visit as only a hoax without implications. They have thought to find that no suicide is there. They have learned that no Inspector Goole is employed by the police.

The play closes on an almost unbearable note. The father answers a phone call from the police, informing him a young woman has just died on the way to the infirmary and that a police inspector is "on his way to ask some questions."

Superb individual performances by cast members speak well for the taut casting of Director Daniel Drempel. Holt as Inspector Goole, is new to the local stage, but his visit will be remembered. Howard, as usual, delivered a compelling performance. Rounding out the cast was Miss Helen Adams, seen briefly as the maid Edna.

Some 150 persons viewed the play at Central Junior High School. They were enthusiastic in applause and praise.
