State Lists New Changes In Grain Warehouse Inspection

The last legislature established the pattern for a new program in grain warehouse inspection in Oregon.

As a result the Oregon State Dept. of Agriculture is preparing to launch a full-scale inspection of all public grain storage structures this fall. This will include a survey of stocks to determine if they cover obligations.

Much interest is evident in this new law — probably because warehousemen and grain growers knew some provisions of the old law were about as old as Oregon herself. (Not quite that old, but the 1953 lawmakers knocked out some grain and warehouse legislation that wandered back to 1885.) A copy of the new law will be sent on request.

T. Ralph Harry, chief of the department's division of grain inspection and warehouse licensing, says his office receives these questions about the new law:

Q. — I have a small warehouse — do I have to get a license?

A. — Yes, you need an Oregon license regardless of size. Every warehouse does unless it is licensed and bonded under the U. S. Warehouse Act.

Q. — But I only handle grain a short time; I just issue load slips. Do I still need a license?

A. — The answer is still yes. If you hold stocks of grain that are not your own, you need a license.

All Grains Covered

Q. — What grains are covered?

A. — All of them; also the law includes dry beans and dry peas.

Q. — How about seeds? I store only seeds.

A. — Then you don't need a public warehouse license. Seeds are not covered by this law. But public warehouses which store both grain and seeds do need a license. Also, if you store only hay you don't need a license — hay is not covered in the warehouse act. The department inspects hay but does not license its storage if that is the only commodity stored.

Q. — Do I have to have a bond, too?

A. — Yes, public warehouses — and that term includes mills, elevators or any place where grain from the public is stored, shipped or handled — must be bonded. When you apply for a license, the department will notify you of the sum of the bond. The bond must be approved by the department.

License Fees Noted

Q. — What's the license fee?

A. — That depends upon the bushel capacity of the warehouse — \$25 for up to 100,000 bushels; \$50 from 100,001 to 500,000 bushels; \$100 for everything over a half million bushels.

Q. — When's the license due?

A. — Every year on July 1. This new law carried an emergency clause so it is now in effect. If you don't have your license for 1955-56, make application now. Direct it to the department's grain and warehouse licensing division in Portland, 1517 N.W. Hoyt St., rather than to the Salem headquarters.

Q. — What else should I know about this law?

A. — Several things. For one, you should have posted a schedule of storage and handling rates the first week in July — and these you cannot legally change for one year. Also, the law prohibits discriminatory practices or favoritism of any kind. And it requires each warehouse to have a sign showing the license number.

Q. — Any certain size for the sign?

A. — Yes, both size and form. The letters and numerals must be at least eight inches high; this is the form: "State No. —"

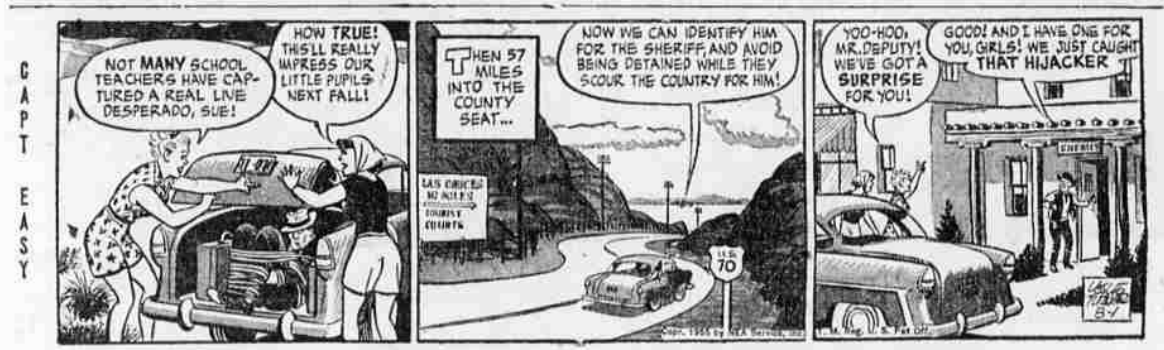
