OSC Scientists Get Grant For Insect Study

A trio of Oregon State College scientists has received a \$24,000 grant from the National Science Foundation to study the nutritional requirements and chemical behavior of various nuisance insects.

Although there are some 500,000 species of insects, little is known about their body chemistry and how they stay alive. One of the goals of this research will be to work out the basic steps by which various insects breakdown foods to furnish energy for flight, reproduction, and other essential life processes.

Making the study will be Vernon H. Cheldelin, director of the OSC Science Research Institute; P. O. Riecher, head of entomology; and R. W. Newburg, assistant professor of chemistry.
