### Trabert Hurt; Cup Hopes Dip

**SOUTHAMPTON, N.Y.** — The United States' hopes to retain the Davis Cup took a nosedive over the weekend.

The country's top tennis ace, Tony Trabert, was sidelined at least a week, possibly longer, with a mysterious backache.

There is no certainty the 24-year-old Wimbledon champion from Cincinnati, the one man who might save the trophy, will be ready for the challenge round Aug. 26-28 at Forest Hills, N.Y.

Tony, plagued by the back ailment all week, reached high to hit a service in the final match of the Meadow Club tournament here yesterday and felt, he said, a sharper pain run up his back.

So, after consulting with officials, he defaulted the championship match to Eddie Moylan, of Trenton, N.J., who led 1-0 in the fifth set. Trabert had lost the first set 3-6, won the next two 6-2, 8-6, and then dropped the fourth 6-8 when he decided to quit.

Take it from the Yanks and Indians, you just can't trust those A's and Orioles any more.

While Chicago was squeaking past Washington yesterday in both games, opening up a one-game lead in the American League, New York and Cleveland were running into trouble with Kansas City and Baltimore and had to settle for splits.

As a result of the weekend's furious action, the Yanks and Tribe are tied for second place as they open a three-game series at Yankee Stadium tomorrow night. Boston, a double winner over Detroit, 8-3 and 3-2, is only three games behind the White Sox, who invade Fenway Park for three games, starting tomorrow.

Chicago had to press hard to take Washington 3-1 in 11 innings when a Senators' relief pitcher, Pedro Ramos, hit one man and walked another with the bases loaded. Then they had to hold on tight to ride out a ninth-inning Washington threat and save the second game 6-5.

**Larsen Throws Win**  
The recall of Don Larsen from the Denver farm looked like just what the Yankees needed as he threw a four-hitter at the A's in the first game for a 3-2 victory. Then the A's, who humbled New York Saturday 12-2, rose up to score five in the ninth and take the second game 7-1. Gus Zernial's two-run homer in the eighth gave the A's the lead.

The clubs tied a major league record with nine double plays in that second game.

Cleveland saw a three-run lead melt away as Baltimore scored four in the eighth to win the first game 4-3. The Indians needed a triple play and a six-hit shutout by Art Houtteman for a 6-0 verdict to get even for the day.

**Ted Hits Grand Slam**  
The heady Red Sox at Fenway Park got a life from Ted Williams' first grand-slam homer since 1951 and the 12th of his career as Frank Sullivan won his 10th in the 8-3 opener against the Tigers. Jim Piersall's leadoff homer in the ninth gave bonus baby Frank Baumann a relief victory in his first major league game. Billy Hoelt was the loser.

Brooklyn continued to pour it on its National League rivals, opening up a 1 1/2 game edge on Milwaukee by bombing the St. Louis Cardinals with 14 hits, 12-2. Don Newcombe breezed along with a five-hitter, bringing his record to 18-1. Roy Campanella's 200th homer of his career was one of four hits by the Dodger catcher.

**Giants Stop Milwaukee**  
The New York Giants, 17 1/2 games back and so discouraged that they sold Sal Maglie to Cleveland, broke Milwaukee's six-game winning streak 7-3. The Braves also lost the services of first baseman Joe Adcock for a month. He suffered a fractured right forearm when one of Jim Hearn's pitches struck him. Willie Mays hit home run No. 33.
