

Whitman's Bat Still Best In Coast Loop; Hollywood Hurler Has Best Mound Record

Portland's Werle Loses Loop Lead

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Al Lyons turned in two pitching victories last week for the Hollywood Stars and took over the hurling leadership of the Pacific Coast League with a mark of .769. His record is 10 wins and three losses.

The leader of the week before, Portland's Bill Werle, lost the only game in which he figured. His mark of .706 dropped him not only behind Lyons but also Los Angeles' Don Elston, with 13-4 and .785, and Hollywood's Ray Munger, 15-6 and .714.

These figures are based on 12 or more decisions. Actually the best record in the league is possessed by Seattle's Lou Kretlow, who has won nine and lost none in 10 games.

Campy Ends Long Slump, Now Has Batting Edge

NEW YORK (AP)—Roy Campanella, slugging catcher of the Brooklyn Dodgers, broke out of a slump last week and today held a 10-point lead over Philadelphia's Richie Ashburn in the National League batting competition.

Campy climbed seven points to .338 with 12 hits in 30 at bats. Meanwhile, Ashburn dropped eight points to .328 with only six safeties in 27 trips. Richie had held the No. 1 spot last Tuesday after Campanella had lost 15 points.

In the American League, Al Kaline of Detroit in the throes of his worst slump of the year, tailed off 13 points. He's batting .352, but his lead isn't nearly as large as it was several weeks ago.

Harvey Kuenn of the Tigers is in the runnerup spot with .327.

Nursing a paper-thin one-game lead and deprived of the services of their top pitcher, the Chicago White Sox tackle the rollicking Boston Red Sox tonight in the eighth American League race.

The White Sox are just one game and 12 percentage points in front of the New York Yankees and Cleveland Indians and three games ahead of the Red Sox, currently the hottest team in the league.

While the White Sox and Red Sox are battling, the Yankees and Indians will be trying to knock each other out of the race in the first of a three-game set in New York.

Marty Marion's Pale Hose are hampered by the absence of Dick Donovan, their No. 1 right-hander. He is recuperating from an appendectomy and will be out more than four weeks.

Pitchers Announced
Connie Johnson (3-1) will get the call tonight. Tommy Brewer (8-8) will be on the mound for the Red Sox.

To add to the White Sox's troubles, third baseman George Kell, third leading hitter in the league, has been having back trouble again and strictly a limited-service performer now.

The Yankees and Indians, eager to get off on the right foot, will send their ace to the rubber. Early Wynn (13-5) goes for the Indians, while Tommy Byrne (9-2) pitches for the Yankees.

No games were scheduled in the American League yesterday, but the National League had a full slate. The Brooklyn Dodgers widened their lead to 14 1/2 games by coming from behind to defeat the second-place Milwaukee Braves 4-3 in 10 innings.

Giants Crush Cards
In other games, the New York Giants knocked the St. Louis Cardinals into seventh place with a 9-1 victory, the Cincinnati Redlegs climbed to sixth by winning their fifth straight, a 4-3 decision over the Philadelphia Phillies, and the Pittsburgh Pirates edged the Chicago Cubs 5-4.

Lew Burdette held the Brooks scoreless until they tied it in the seventh with three runs. They won it in the 10th when Johnny Logan bobbled a double play ball, permitting Junior Gilliam to score. Karl Spooner, third Brook pitcher, was the winner and Ernie Johnson lost it.

Don Liddle made his first start for the Giants in more than a month and held the Cards to five hits. Willie Mays hit his 34th homer.

Reliever Saves Game
Herschell Freeman came to a mate's rescue for the third time in the last three games when he saved Art Fowler in the ninth for Cincinnati.

Dick Hall whipped the Cubs for the second time in eight days and in the process broke a six-game Pirate losing streak. He also knocked in what proved to be the winning run with a single in the ninth. That gave him a 5-2 lead but the Cubs scored twice in their half.

Rooks Halt Rise Of Wenatchee
Two fireballing Yakima rookies Monday night slammed the brakes on Wenatchee's rapid rise in the Northwest Baseball League.

John Kelly, a speedster from Seattle University, tamed the Chiefs with three hits in seven innings. And when Kelly faltered in the eighth, the Bears sent in Don Rabung, pitcher on Yakima's national American Legion junior champion two years ago, to nip a Wenatchee rally and save a 5-4 victory.

The setback levelled the Chiefs, in the cellar less than a week ago, in fourth place, five games back of the league-leading Eugene Emeralds, who returned to action after a four-day rest with an 8-6 triumph over Salem.

ODGEN, Utah (AP)—An Oregon bowler won first place Monday in a 30-day endurance meet that required each contestant to roll steadily for about 12 hours.

John Ringquist of Salem, Ore., had a pin total of 8,318 in 40 games he bowled July 9. That score stood up during the remainder of the meet in which 90 women from 13 states and 178 men from 31 states competed. Final competition ended early Monday morning.

Sponsors of the meet said many bowlers quit, because of sore thumbs, before completing their 40-game stint.

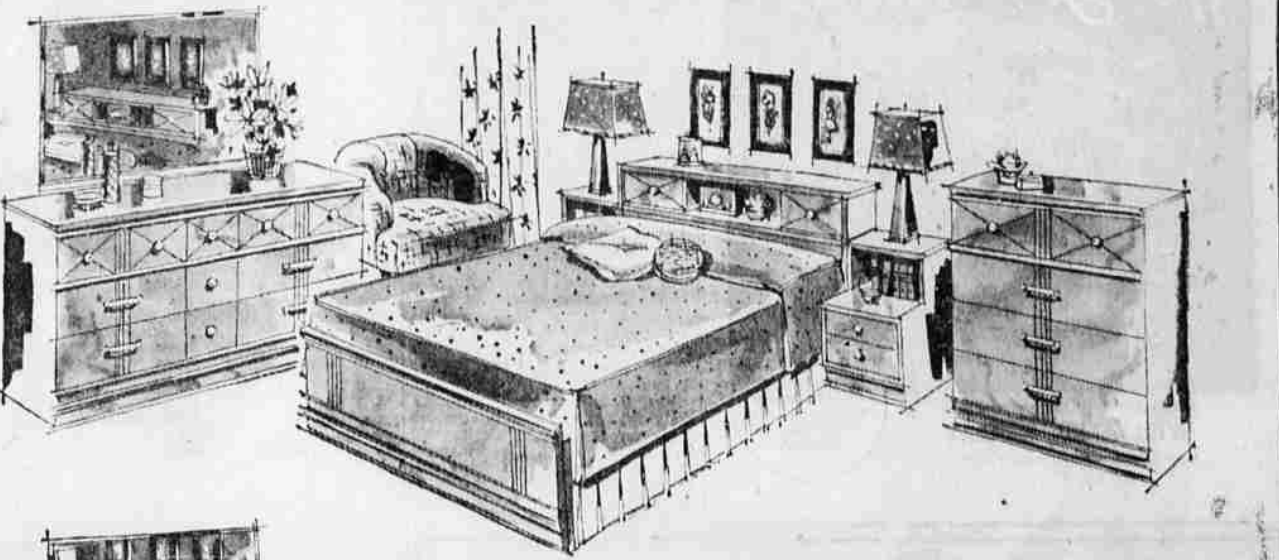
Ringquist's regular league average in Salem the past season was 178 but he averaged 189 in his 40 consecutive games here.



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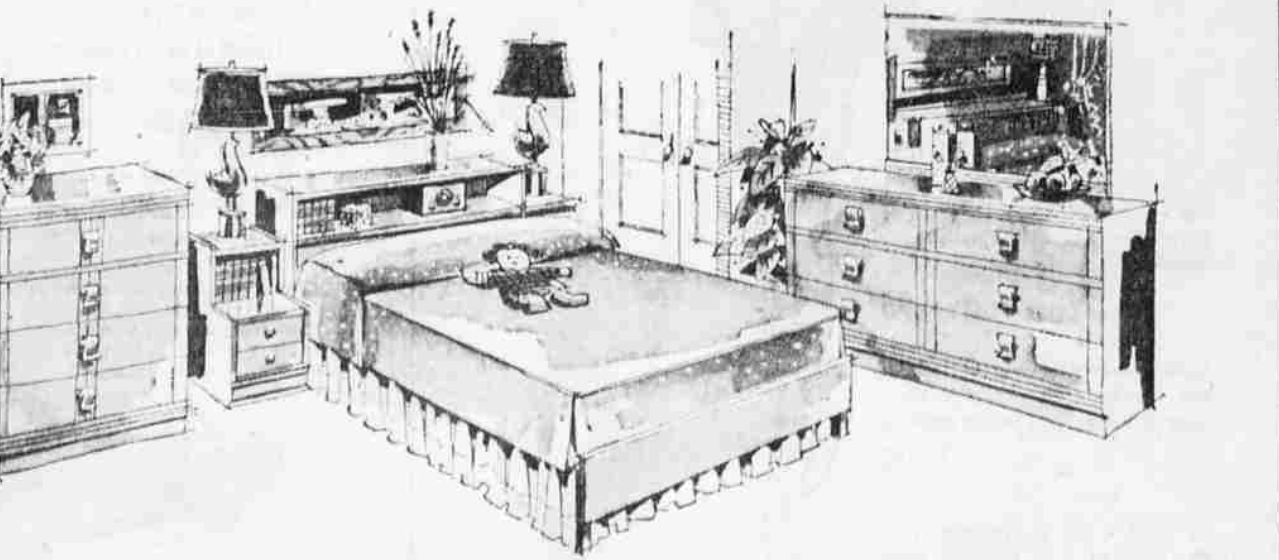
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
