

**Police Fear Worst When Car Puffed From Water**

EUGENE — Fearing the worst, state police today towed a car out of Big Fall Creek, about 20 miles southeast of here. But the car was empty.

The driver, Jony Romane, 18, of Fall Creek was home in bed with a black eye the only injury she suffered when her car skidded down a 25-foot bank into the creek.

State police checked the car's registration and traced it to Miss Romane, who told them the accident had occurred early Tuesday. She said she crawled through a window of the car, waded through four feet of water, and walked home.

A neighbor, Mrs. Anna Jenkins, saw the top of the car sticking out of the creek shortly after 5 a. m. and called the state police.

Airman C.C. Daniel C. Schmidt was imprisoned along with his companions last November after being accused of spying. His mother suffered a heart attack upon hearing of his prison sentence, and spent three months in a hospital.

"I had myself a good cry," Mrs. Peters said after learning of her son's release. She added that his freedom "is the best medicine I could get."

**Young Girl Gulps Poison, Putting End To Triangle**

HOLLYWOOD — A 20-year-old girl gulped a handful of sleeping pills early Tuesday, ending her life and the triangular pattern in which she, her 41-year-old sweetheart and his wife shared a bungalow court apartment, police reported.

Dead is Alice Huff, who lived, officers said, with Jacob Traub and his wife Ada.

She left a note giving custody of her 2 1/2-year-old daughter, Caroline, to Traub "as long as Ada Traub has no say in the matter."

Police quoted Traub as saying Miss Huff was three months pregnant and that he was the father of her unborn child.

He told officers Miss Huff was "devoted to me" and that his wife agreed to the situation. He added sadly:

"Alice and Ada used to race each other to see who would make my breakfast in the morning."

Police detectives A. E. Urrlik and C. B. Turner said in their report, "The wife condoned her husband's affair with the deceased." The report did not say how long the three had been living together.

Asked his wife's views of the love affair, Traub said with a shrug: "When you get in your late thirties those things don't mean so

much to you."

Mrs. Traub said she, too, wanted custody of Miss Huff's child, whose father, the Traubs said, is unknown to them.
