As a result, the White Sox still have their one-game lead over the Yanks, but Cleveland has fallen two games back and Boston four. Fifth-place Detroit, 7 1/2 games behind, outslugged Washington, 13-10, and Baltimore tumbled Kansas City 5-1.

Throneberry swatted a triple to make it 2-1 and Howell, up from Memphis, went 3-2 against Eddie Joost before getting him on a game ending fly.

Three singles made for one run in third off loser Tom Brewer and Jim Rivera belted a homer for the winning margin in the fourth.

Collins, with just two home runs in the last two months, made it 1-1 in the fifth inning with his first homer of the night. Then he broke up a duel between Byrne and Early Wynn, another 35-year-old guy, with his one-out poke in the 10th.

The Indians' run came in on Al Smith's leadoff triple and Bobby Arvill's sacrifice fly. From then on, Byrne shut the door — giving just six hits the rest of the way for his 10th victory against two defeats. Wynn, who had counted the Yanks three times in his 13 victories, took his sixth defeat.

Gold Cup Entries Start Qualifying

SEATTLE (AP) — With only four days to go, five Gold Cup race entries were set to "rooster tail" the waters of Lake Washington Wednesday in attempts to qualify for the 48th running Sunday of the big hydroplane racing classic.

Guy Lombardo, orchestra leader and speedboat enthusiast, and his wife arrived Tuesday night to watch the performance of their entry, the Tempo VII.

Danny Foster, Detroit, was at the controls in two impressive runs by the New York boat Tuesday, averaging two laps at 116 miles an hour but a technicality prevented his running another lap to qualify. Three runs around the 3 1/2 mile course, averaging 85 miles an hour or better, are required.

Lombardo had failed to sign a liability release required by the American Powerboat Assn. to protect the sponsoring club and committee. Foster also said he wanted to hit that "magical 120" mark before he makes his official runs.

Also scheduling runs to qualify Wednesday were Stan Sayres' Slo-Mo-Shun IV and V of Seattle, and the Gale IV and V, Detroit entries of Joe Schoenith. Slo-Mo-Shun V hold the official qualifying record of 111.632, set last year with Lou Fagol at the controls a few days before it went on to win the big event its second time.

Its sister craft, the Slo-Mo IV, has won the 3-lap, 90-mile classic three times since the Sayre entries began their reign in 1950.
Only 12 boats of the 23 here may qualify for Sunday's race.

Boater Plans Test Of Speed Record As Gold Cup Nears

SEATTLE (AP) — Donald Campbell's talk of a water barrier isn't likely to scare any speedboat owners and the Briton will have to push the world speed mark quite a jump higher than 202 mph to make it safe for the jet jobs.

Ted Jones drove the two Slo-Mos unofficially around 215 miles per hour, which was as fast as Campbell's top speed when he cracked the world mark recently. Jones believes his own Rebel Sun and the Miss Thriftway can top 200 with souped-up power plants.

And he plans to take a shot at the mark before long if Campbell doesn't push it out of sight. Given perfect conditions, Campbell's Bluebird might reach phenomenal speeds (202 would have been phenomenal half a dozen years ago.)

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Ram Pass Defense Better This Year

LOS ANGELES (AP) — It's still early but Coach Sid Gillman of the Los Angeles Rams says he believes his ball club is going to have a good pass defense this season.

The Rams lost several games last season because of the sieve-like quality of their aerial defense and gave up 2,567 yards and 129 first downs to enemy passers. The Rams ranked ninth among the National Football League's dozen teams in pass defense, having intercepted only 23 passes.
