Cities' Bypassing Custom Put Up To Legislators

SALEM (AP) — The Legislature's interim committee on highways heard a request from the League of Oregon Cities here that the committee look into the question of bypassing cities.

With the highway commission now constructing highways around cities, the League wants the committee to study the effect that bypassing has on cities and the state.

The committee, which was instructed by the Legislature to include state parks on its agenda, indicated it might permit a committee of newspaper editors to do the job.

The question is whether the state parks system should be transferred from the highway commission to a separate parks commission.

Gov. Paul Patterson appointed the six editors, headed by William Tugman, Reedsport, to study the parks question.

The interim committee said it would invite Tugman to appear to tell what his committee plan are.

Members of the interim committee said they don't believe they should duplicate the work done by Tugman's group.

The interim committee, of which Sen. Warren McMinimee, Tillamook, is chairman, met last week to discuss the question.

It probably will study whether to transfer the permit section of the public utilities commissioner to the motor vehicle department.

U. S. Warns Slavs' Anent MIG Making For Soviet

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia (AP) — Informal sources declared here the United States has warned that Yugoslav construction of Soviet MIG fighters might seriously affect American aid to President Tito's government.

Branko Draskovic, the foreign minister's information chief, conceded there is a disagreement in interpretation of the multimillion dollar aid pact, but said this disagreement "has nothing to do with the MIG rumors."

Draskovic referred to reports circulating here recently that Russia has expressed a willingness to give Yugoslavia's aviation industry a license to build MIG jets. He refused to confirm or deny that Russia had made such an offer. He said the "disagreement in interpretation" is being discussed through regular channels.

Spearer Shark Gives Diver Two-Mile Ride

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. (AP) — A six-foot shark, maddened by a skindiver's spear, pulled the fisherman two miles out into the Atlantic here.

The fisherman, James Jones, 24, held on grimly until the spear pulled out of the shark's head and then swam back to his boat and resumed spearfishing. He said he didn't want to turn loose and lose his expensive spear.

The long haul and return took two hours. Jones speared the shark in an underwater hole, thinking it was a "small fish." He held to a 10-foot line during the tow through water about 15 feet deep, managing to get to the top often enough to breathe.

The shark made no attempt to attack him, Jones said.

Children 5 To 9 Slated For Polio Shots In August

WASHINGTON (AP) — Private physicians and public health agencies will start getting Salk polio vaccine this month for inoculation of children 5-9 years of age.

The Public Health Service announced yesterday it has allocated enough for 846,000 shots. That amount will become available as soon as individual states report how much is to go to health agencies and how much to physicians.

More vaccine will be apportioned as it is manufactured and cleared for use.

The distribution is the first under the department's voluntary program for placing the vaccine where it is most needed. Except for limited supplies which moved into commercial channels last April, the vaccine is the first to go to private physicians.

Additional Supply Needed

The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis has received almost all the vaccine manufactured to date for use in its free immunization of first and second-grade schoolchildren. It reported Saturday its current needs have been met, although it said three million cubic centimeters more will be necessary to complete its program this fall.

Apportionment to the states was based on the number of children each has in the 5-9-year age group not included in the free vaccination program.

That age group is most susceptible to the disease.

Older and younger children will become eligible later when more vaccine is available.

Each state governor has designated officials to oversee the distribution of vaccine. State and local medical societies also are expected to see that physicians limit the inoculations to children in the age priority groups.

Hungarians Crash Wire In Flight To Austria

VIENNA (AP) — Three Hungarians drove a traitor through their Communist homeland's barbed wire border to sanctuary in Austria, Vienna press reports said here.

Hungarian farmer János Vighogyl, 37, who did the driving, was slightly injured in the escape Thursday, the reports said.

With him were his 15-year-old son and another farmer, Desoe Lantosch, 34. They said they had long planned to flee the Reds but had waited until the Austrian independence treaty came into force Wednesday.

They had not been sure before that they would be granted political asylum in Austria.

Repayment Contracts For Water Users Okd

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House Interior Committee has approved new repayment contracts for water users of the Rogue River Valley and Medford irrigation districts in Oregon.

The proposal now needs only approval of the Senate Interior Committee. No further congressional action will be necessary.

The proposal calls for repayment of the \$1,712,000 rehabilitation work planned by the government in the irrigation districts.

Of this \$1,475,466 is to be charged to the Medford district and \$236,534 to the Rogue River district. The Rogue district is to pay in 40 equal annual installments the Medford district to pay 1-80th of the cost annually through 1968 and the rest in equal annual installments during the balance of the 40-year repayment period.

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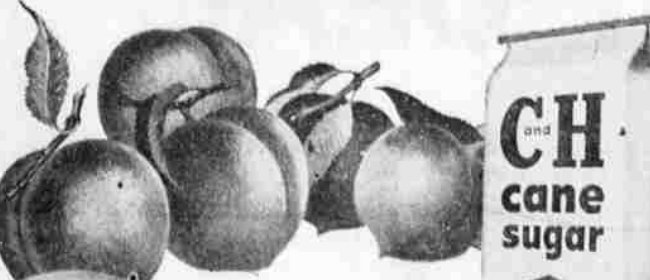
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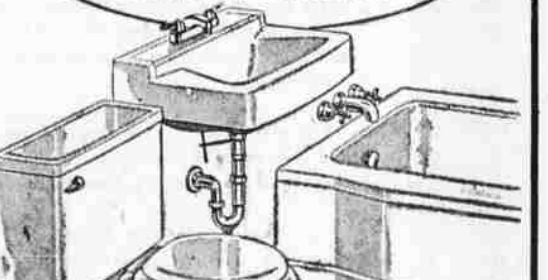
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
