Southern Oregon Gets 95 Per Cent Of Cars Ordered

SALEM — The Southern Pacific Railroad was able to give lumber mills 97 per cent of the freight cars they ordered in Oregon last week, Public Utilities Comm. Charles H. Heltzel said Thursday.

The figure for the previous week was 98 per cent.

Western Oregon mills ordered 4,855 cars last week, and received 4,717 cars.

Heltzel said preliminary reports for this week indicate the shortage is growing more severe.

Following are the number of cars ordered and supplied by divisions of the S. P. last week:

1. Main line between Portland and Eugene—401 ordered, 393 supplied, 98 per cent.
2. Siskiyou line between Eugene and Ashland—2,202 ordered, 2,098 supplied, 95 per cent.
3. Line between Eugene and Coos Bay—609 ordered, 738 supplied, 104 per cent.
4. Westside line via Newberg, McMinnville and Willamina—185 ordered, 187 supplied, 101 per cent.
5. Westside line via Hillsboro and Forest Grove—75 ordered, 82 supplied, 108 per cent.
6. Tillamook branch—208 ordered, 197 supplied, 95 per cent.
7. Toledo branch via Corvallis and Monroe—388 ordered, 368 supplied, 95 per cent.
8. Mill City branch via Lebanon—137 ordered, 129 supplied, 94 per cent.
9. Cascade line between Eugene and Oakridge—383 ordered, 399 supplied, 94 per cent.
10. Eastside via Silverton and Brownsville—51 ordered, 51 supplied, 100 per cent.

Demos Assail Decision Of FPC On Canyon Dam

Thursday, Congress adjourned about midnight Aug. 2.

On the day of the FPC vote, July 27, the House reclamation subcommittee voted on the federal Hells Canyon Dam bill and approved it by a bare, partisan margin. Prior to that, 25 Democratic senators who co-sponsored the bill in the Senate had asked the FPC to hold up its final decision until Congress had voted on the matter. Chairman Murray (D-Mont) of the Senate Interior Committee renewed that request as late as Aug. 1.

Murray said House subcommittee approval of the bill and similar action by a Senate interior subcommittee "establish beyond challenge" that Congress wanted to retain jurisdiction over the canyon.

In commenting on the FPC decision, Sen. Morse (D-Ore) declared: "The FPC quite obviously waited until Congress adjourned to issue these licenses. . . It is remarkable that the commission could act so speedily. The FPC heard oral arguments on July 6. It is incredible that since that time it could have reviewed the voluminous record of testimony and exhibits which took its examiners over a year to assemble."

"That record consisted of over 400 documents and almost 20,000 pages of testimony. A majority of the federal power commissioners were handicapped by the Eisenhower administration to do this job and they have done it with hot and unseemly haste."

Similar views were voiced by Murray and Rep. Metcalf (D-Mont), Sen. Warren Magnuson (D-Wash), Rep. Don Magnuson (D-Wash) and George H. R. Taylor, an official of the National Hells Canyon Assn., a group fighting for the federal dam.

Asked to comment on the Democratic assertions, Kuykendall said announcement of the decision was not held up unnecessarily. The adjournment of Congress was imminent, he said, when the FPC reached its conclusions.

In other cases, he reported, issuance of lengthy and detailed opinions and orders had sometimes been held up longer than eight days. He said the primary cause of such delays was a crush of work.

Mrs. Gammon Celebrates 95th Birthday On Thursday

"I don't feel old," says Mrs. Della Winniford Gammon of Roseburg who was 95 Thursday. Mrs. Gammon is one of the county's old timers, having moved here in 1871 from Parrotville, Tenn.

Mrs. Gammon was one of 11 children of Thomas and Margaret Winfield. She was born in 1860 and at the age of 11 moved to Oregon with her family. Her father was a plantation and farm owner and had one negro woman slave. The family (11 children, three living now) made their home on the Calapaloo River near Umpqua. They lived there until her mother died in 1908 and her father in 1913.

William Gammon moved to Oregon from Parrotville in 1876. Five years later on April 14, 1881, he and Della Winniford were married. Mrs. Gammon says that her husband told her that he remembers seeing a little girl at her father's farm sale. It turned out to be the future Mrs. Gammon. She and her husband made their home in the same vicinity as her parents until 1913 when they moved their family (two boys and three girls) to Roseburg and settled on Hoover Street.

Mrs. Gammon lived there by herself following her husband's death in 1912 until about three years ago, when she has divided her residence between a daughter, Mrs. William Baird, Eugene, and a daughter, Mrs. Hugh Wells, Roseburg. She has three grandchildren and six great grandchildren.

Mrs. Gammon remembers Roseburg as being a three-store town when she moved here. She said

Red Barn Sold To Corporation From Portland

The Red Barn, a bar and restaurant on the North Umpqua Highway near Glide, has been sold, according to a report from correspondent Mrs. Arthur Selby.

The long-time owner, Mrs. Crystal Freeman sold the complete physical facilities to The Arbee Inc. Principal owners of the corporation are Mr. and Mrs. Franklyn Kucera of Portland.

The corporation will continue to operate the establishment under the assumed name of the Red Barn.

Mrs. Freeman had the Red Barn constructed and opened it in May 1942. Also included in the physical plant are three furnished apartments. Also included in the sale are the two acres on the bank of the North Umpqua on which the Red Barn is located.

Mrs. Freeman also owns the Valley Hotel building on Washington, Jackson and Main streets in Roseburg. It has seven stores on the ground floor and has 47 rooms.

The former owner says she will vacation at her summer cabin on Honey Creek and then expects to make a trip to Hawaii in the fall.

The new owner, Franklyn Kucera, has lived in Oregon for 29 years, having been graduated from Willamette University. He has been a practicing lawyer in Portland for 17 years. He has four sons and a daughter. He told Mrs. Selby the family will remain temporarily in Portland, but will soon come to Douglas County to live.

The new chef at the Red Barn will be Joe Bello. Kucera says Bello has just returned to Portland from New York where he had been chef at Jack Dempsey's "The Turf."

Kucera says the Red Barn will be closed Aug. 8 to 14 for alterations and redecorating.

Trailways Bus To Be Displayed Here On Saturday

A complete modernization of the Trailways bus service Evergreen Route between Seattle, Wash., and San Diego, Calif., has been announced by company officials.

Beginning Aug. 15, new "Vista-Liner" scenic buses will provide all service along the route which passes through Roseburg, according to local terminal manager James Lambert Jr.

A sample bus will be on display in downtown Roseburg Saturday from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. It may be viewed on Jackson Street near the corner of Washington Street and is open for public inspection. Entertainment will be provided by a six-girl accordion band from Medford, directed by Mrs. Eve Prentice.

Right now a few of the new buses are being operated along the route. On the Aug. 15 target date all old buses will be retired, Lambert said.

Several unique features have been included for passenger comfort. They include: Adjustable chair backs and head rests which may be placed in three positions; a shock absorbing springing system; two sets of seats in the rear of the upper deck which can be reversed and allow room for seating of a table between the seats.

Airliner Crash Takes 30 Persons

By RENE J. CAPPON FT. LEONARD WOOD, Mo. — A pilot kept his crippled American Airlines plane aloft for more than 30 miles in a desperate bid for a safe landing Wednesday but crashed just short of his goal.

All 30 persons aboard were killed.

"Just a little more and he would have made it," said an eyewitness, Lt. A. J. Brewster of Ft. Leonard Wood. "The plane came in very low over a housing area, then banked steeply and headed for the post airport."

"One engine was trailing flame and smoke. Then over a wooded area, the right wing fell off."

The airliner crashed on the edge of this sprawling Army post.
