held a 6 1/2-game lead. The only one of the top five clubs that is not piling up victories, they are now trailing the leaders by a game.

Another booming outfit, the Boston Red Sox, pulled up yesterday to within one game behind the third-place Yankees by beating the White Sox 7-3. Since Boston started the Yanks' slide July 4 with a double-header victory, they have compiled a 20-9 record.

Jensen Wrecks Chicago
Jackie Jensen, discarded by the Yankees in 1952, drove in four runs for the Red Sox with a triple, sin-

gle and sacrifice fly.

Since July 4, Chicago has a 20-12 record, Cleveland 20-11 and fifth-place Detroit 21-13. The Tigers dropped a 9-6 verdict to Washington yesterday.

Adding to Manager Casey Stengel's cup of woe, ex-Yankee Ed Lopat of the Baltimore Orioles whipped Kansas City 8-1 yesterday in his first start since leaving the Yankees.

Most of the noise in the National League came from the bat of Chicago shortstop Ernie Banks, who walked three home runs in the Cubs' 11-10 victory over Pittsburgh. He batted in seven runs and tied Duke Snider of Brooklyn for the home run lead with 36.

Catcher Roy Campanella relieved Snider of the home-run-hitting burden as he walked a three-run homer that brought the Brooks an 11-10 victory over Milwaukee and a lead of 15 1/2 games over the Braves, their biggest margin of the season.

Relief pitcher Joe Nuxhall of the Cincinnati Redlegs started a double play with the bases loaded to preserve a 4-3 victory over Philadelphia.

Tom Poholsky of St. Louis stopped New York on only four hits for a 3-0 victory. He threw only 88 pitches, missing the plate on only 28 of them, and one of the National League's quickest games of the year was over in an hour and 47 minutes.

Vic Wertz put over the crusher for Cleveland with a three-run home run, while Al Rosen blasted for hits in as many times at bat. Mickey Mantle of the Yanks took the league lead with his 24th home run in the ninth inning.

Jimmy Piersall, the third man in Boston's outfield with Johnson and Ted Williams, contributed a home run, double and single, while Norm Zauchin also had a homer. Ancient Ellis Kinder, making his 30th relief appearance of the season, retired the final five batters on 13 pitches.

The extra-inning jinx continues to hex the Seattle Rainiers.

Battling to retain the top berth in the Pacific Coast League, the Rainiers have forced half a dozen games into extra innings in recent weeks, only to blow them in the overtime.

It happened again Thursday night. Seattle tied Hollywood 2-2 in the ninth but lost 3-2 in the 12th, and the Stars moved to within four games of the front-runners.

In other contests, Portland beat San Francisco twice, 4-1 and 7-5. Los Angeles defeated San Diego 5-4 and Oakland took two from Sacramento, 2-3 and 4-3.

Hollywood's first two runs came on successive homers in the eighth by Bobby Del Greco and George Vico. The Rainiers already had one run on Harvey Zernia's homer in the first. Then in the ninth they tied the game with singles by Zernia, Vern Stephens and Myron Ginsberg.

Vico started the 10th with a double. He scored on a single by Carlos Bernier for the winning run.

Portland scored three unearned runs in its first victory over San Francisco. Singles by Luis Marquez and Ed Mickelson accounted for the Beavers' only earned tally. Bill Serena homered for the Seals.

The Seals opened the nightcap with five runs and blasted out starter Bill Werle in the first inning. But Bob Alexander, pitching in relief, shut out the Seals for the rest of the game. In the 9th the Beavers caught up. In the tenth Luis Marquez singled, went to second on Ed Mickelson's sacrifice and came home on pinchhitter Ed Basinski's single.

PHOTO TIPS

One of the most certain ways of achieving striking results in a color photograph is through the fascinating field of flower photography.

Full views of a garden are tempting, but the most satisfying studies are close-ups of individual flowers and clusters. This naturally involves close camera distances. Close-up attachments can be used when there is no provision for close focusing.

A means of supporting the camera at low heights is a help. Certain tripods can be used, or an inexpensive camera clamp can be fastened to a stake driven the ground.

In close-up work, cameras with a viewfinder separate from the taking lens (the majority fall into this class) will not show an accurate field of view. This is because the viewer is in a different position than the taking lens, the two not seeing quite the same field, especially at close range. Use of accessories will overcome this, or judgment can easily be gained that will allow for its compensation.

Three pieces of cardboard—blue, white, and black—are also useful. The blue is used as a background, simulating sky. The white serves as a reflector, lightening dark shadows. It should be placed at such an angle that it "bounces" sunlight on the shadow side of the flower. The dark piece is used as a nonreflecting windbreak; when needed, to prevent movement of the flower.
