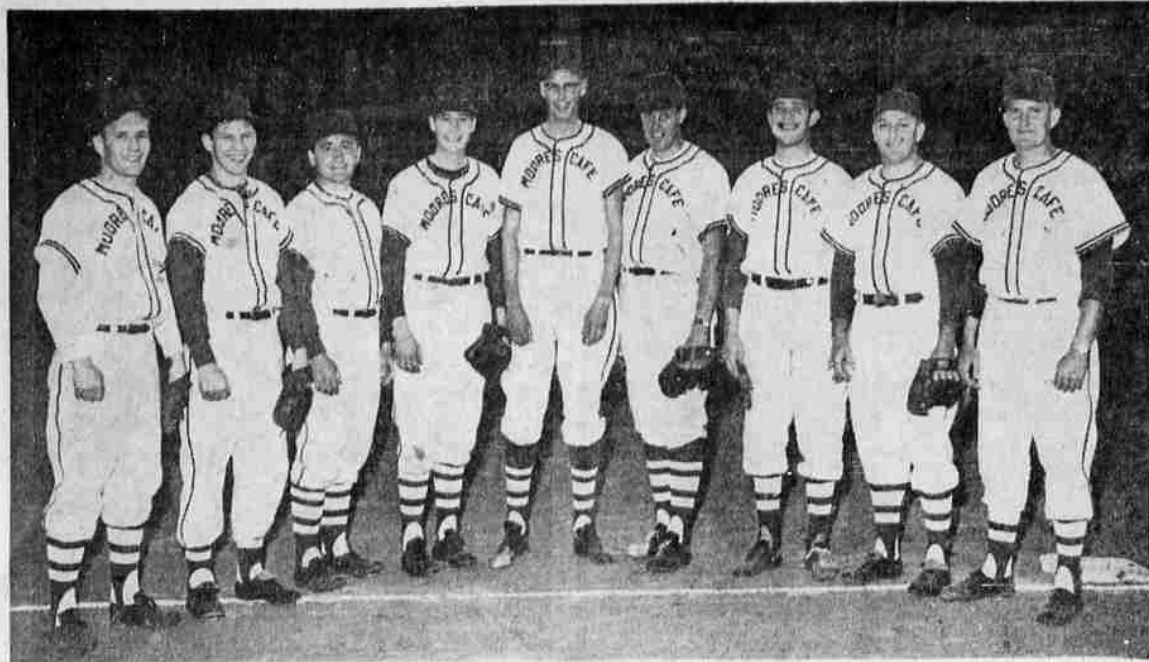

Moore's City Softball Titlist; Series Set With Coos Team

First half Industrial League champion Moore's Cafe trimmed Nordic Plywood of Sutherlin 8-5 Friday evening at Scherlin Field to capture the league's softball championship.

A sixth-inning grand-slam home run by Frank Moore brought the first-half league champions from behind a 5-4 deficit to a second straight postseason playoff victory over the second-half league champions from Sutherlin.

Moore's now meets the Coos Bay-North Bend area champion in a best of three-game series beginning at Coos Bay tonight at 7:30. The series will be played entirely at Coos Bay.

Friday night's winners beat Nordic for a second time this week to win the title in the best of three-

game series. On Tuesday, the cafemen had taken a 16-4 win.

Two Lost In First Half
The winners stormed back after having lost two games in second-half league play while Nordic's had gone unbeaten in six contests.

Nordic had also beaten Moore's in a postseason exhibition game before the cafemen had given an omen of things to come with a 2-1 exhibition victory a week ago over the plywoomen.

Moore's was unbeaten in seven first half league games.

The hitting of Moore and Jake Leicht for the winners, getting four of the seven safeties between them, and Phil Telford's relief pitching carried Moore's to victory Friday night. Hal Sievers led hitting for the Sutherlin team with 2-3.

Base-Loaded Homer
Moore, team sponsor and catcher, uncorked his home run blast in the sixth frame after Bob Potter and Jake Leicht had singled and Bob George had reached base on the left fielder's error. This loaded the bases.

Nordic had built up a 5-4 lead with two runs in the first, two in the fourth and a single marker in the fifth. Moore's tied it 2-2 in the second frame and led 4-2 in the fourth before Nordic's tied it again in the bottom half of the fifth. Nordic scored its fifth run in the fifth.

In the Nordic's first inning scoring, Elmer Plueard singled Earl Plueard and Don Hess across the plate after the latter had walked and singled to reach base.

Winners Build Lead
Moore's tying runs in the second inning came on consecutive doubles by Leicht and George and an infield out.

The winners took a 4-2 lead in the fourth frame as Moore hit for two bases, Wayne Mosher was hit by the pitcher, with an infield out and a flyout following.

Team Wins Replay, Edges Out LaVera's

Twilight League champion Wilbur Lumber won its way into the finals of the league's postseason double elimination softball tournament Thursday evening with a pair of close triumphs.

Wilbur first edged the VA Employees 8-6 in a replay of two innings of a protested game and then edged LaVera's Beauty Salon 8-7 in the semifinals.

Replay of the final inning and one-half of the Wilbur-VA Employees game resulted when a protest lodged by the Employees at the end of the contest Wednesday night was ruled upon and allowed by softball officials.

An Employee player, Ed Simmons, had protested to Umpire Burke during the game that Wilbur pitcher, Ernie Stovall, was throwing before he (Simmons) had a chance to get into the batter's box.

Commissioner Overrules
The protest was disallowed by Burke at the time, but Softball Commissioner Lewis McAllister in a ruling issued before game-time Thursday allowed the protest after hearing testimony of managers of both teams and the official.

Wilbur had earlier finished the seven innings of play with a 7-5 lead. With the replay of the final inning and one-half, the lumbermen merely added another run to their final total for a final 8-6 decision.

The Employees threatened to win in the final half of the seventh inning, however, when they loaded the bases with one out. But Wilbur pitcher Stovall fanned one batter and forced another into a bounceout.

Wilbur Scores Late

In Thursday's semifinal game, Wilbur scored three runs in the seventh inning to overtake LaVera's which had built up a 7-2 lead in the first two innings of play. But the losers were unable to score for the remaining five frames of play while Wilbur added six to its first inning total.

Frank Rutter of LaVera's and Gorman of Wilbur stroked home runs.

Wilbur now meets PAL Club Monday night in the finals of the tourney. Wilbur must win two games in order to win the tourney title, but a win by PAL Club Monday night means that they are champions. PAL Club finished in second place in regular season play.

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—The San Francisco 49ers and the Washington Redskins open their 1955 National Football League exhibition schedules at Kezar Stadium Sunday in a game scheduled for 2 p.m.

SEATTLE (AP)—A complete backflip by the Slo-mo-shun V after it "took off" from the water traveling around 100 miles an hour took the defending champion out of this year's Gold Cup picture Friday and probably ended the racing career of Lou Fageol, daredevil driver.

A squabble among the drivers, precipitated by the resignation of referee Mel Crook, Montclair, N. J., over the issue of "flying starts," also threatened to end the field for Sunday's "World Series of racing," drastically. Ten boats had qualified by nightfall Friday night.

Fageol, of Kent, Ohio, dove from the somersaulting Slo-mo V to escape death, as he has before in accidents of a long career, but suffered probable broken ribs and a punctured lung, as well as back injuries.

Thousands See Mishap
Thousands of spectators and officials watching Fageol's qualifying attempt from the shore and additional thousands watching in television witnessed the spectacular Slo-mo V accident.

Fageol was roaring down the back straightaway toward completion of his third and final qualifying lap when disaster overtook the V.

The sleek craft started rocking from side to side as a northerly wind caught under the sponsons. The bow started to lift, almost imperceptibly.

Then the wind whipped under the boat in force and the bow started a rapid rise until only the propeller of the craft remained in the water, leaving a thin, white wake.

Boat "Takes Off"
As Fageol fought for control, the Slo-mo V lifted completely out of the water, literally taking off as a plane would.

Her stern kicked forward and the boat took a complete back somersault, landing upright on the water again.

Fageol kicked himself from the cockpit of the boat and landed on his back on the water and struggled feebly as a Coast Guard boat rushed to rescue him from the lake waters.

Up until accident Fageol had rammed the V two and three-quarter lengths around the Gold Cup course at an average speed of approximately 117 miles per hour.

Baltimore and Washington, reluctant tailenders, have made the American League race as tight as a cork in a bottle.

The Orioles and Senators, supposedly the soft touches who were to give Chicago and Cleveland the edge on their Eastern swing sent the first place brawl into a virtual three-way tie last night.

Baltimore topped the White Sox 2-1 in 11 innings and Washington rapped the Indians 7-5 while New York moved up from third place

with a 3-0 decision over Detroit on Yogi Berra's 200th home run.

And while the last place Orioles and seventh-place Nats were having a ball, sixth place Kansas City knocked off fourth-place Boston 5-2.

Chisox Still Lead

The White Sox still hold the lead, but by a mere two percentage points over the Yanks and Indians. Boston is two games away in the standings.

Chicago errors figured in both Baltimore runs, with the clincher coming home as reliever Millard Howell muffed Willie Miranda's slow roller with the bases loaded.

Until the last of the 11th, it had been a pitching duel between Jim Wilson, poison for the first division, and ex-Oriole Harry Byrd.

The Sox had the bases loaded with none out in the 10th, but Wilson, who gave up the Chicago run in the first inning, worked out of it with a double-play and George Kell's infield out.

Maglie Loses For Tribe
At Washington, the Nats gave Sal Maglie a rude howdy to the AL. The veteran right-hander, belted by the National League so much the New York Giants sold him to Cleveland last Sunday, gave up five runs in the first two frames.

Dean Stone tamed the Tribe on four hits until the Indians broke out for their five runs in the ninth.

Berra, joining Bill Dickey, Gabby Hartnett and Roy Campanella as the only catchers ever to slug 200 or more homers in the major leagues, belted a 3-1 pitch in the fourth inning after Tiger rookie Jim Bunning had issued his only two walks. Don Larsen, winning his second since coming back from the minors, had some wobbly moments but fanned pinchhitter Jack Phillips to end it with two men on base in the 9th.

Bauer Nails Drive
Moments earlier, Hank Bauer had stretched into the right field stands to rob Frank House of a two-run homer.

Kansas City snarled the Red Sox with Gus Zernial's two home runs and a double and the relief work of Tom Gorman. The right-hander saved Vic Raschi's fourth victory by allowing just one run after coming on in the eighth with the bases loaded and none out. Frank Sullivan, Boston's 14-game winner, lost his ninth.

In the National League, Brooklyn lost to Chicago 10-8, but held its 15 1/2 games spread as Pittsburgh bumped Milwaukee 8-5. New York beat Cincinnati 12-9 and Philadelphia defeated St. Louis 7-4.

Banks, Snider Homer
Ernie Banks clubbed his 37th home run for the Cubs, but Duke Snider smacked two for the Braves to regain the undisputed homer lead with 38. The two clubs combined for seven home runs.

Pittsburgh blasted Warren Spahn for five runs in the first inning an ex-outfielder Dick Hall held the Braves in check until Dino Donoso had to put down a four-run rally in the eighth.

Footings for the new football grandstand at Finlay Field will be dug in Monday by carpenters hired for the job, according to building committee co-chairman Bob Dishman of the Indian Club.

Concrete is expected to be poured about Wednesday for the 1,250-seat structure which will be ready for the first football game at Finlay Field Sept. 9.

Another load of lumber was hauled to the building site Friday, Dishman reports, and most of the steel is said to be on the job. Most of the past week has been consumed in delivery of materials.
