

## Burbank Workers Are Overcome By Noxious Fumes

BURBANK, Calif. (AP) — An investigation is under way to determine why noxious fumes felled 89 workers, most of them women, at a Burbank plant.

Seventeen of the workers remained under observation early Friday at St. Joseph Hospital, Bur-

bank. The others were sent home after treatment.

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began to complain of dizziness Thursday morning as fumes spread through an assembly department.

"They all walked out before it hit them," said Nurse Jean Merner. "They went out into the air, and then, bang, they keeled over."

All available ambulances rushed the stricken workers to the hospital, driving in relays, as firemen and medical staffers from other industrial plants gave first aid to those who had collapsed on the sidewalk.

Doctors said that all those hospitalized would recover. Most of the stricken workers suffered dizziness, nausea and abdominal cramps.

Company officials said that the fumes escaped from a large container labeled iso amyl alcohol, an industrial alcohol used for cleaning.

### Determining Minors' Ages To Be Simplified

A new simplified procedure for determining the age of young purchasers seeking to buy alcoholic liquor becomes effective this week.

The state law previously required that licensees of the Oregon Liquor Control Commission who doubtful as to the legal age of a purchaser secure a written statement of age. This still is required, but the form on which the statement is made has been simplified, and the commission hopes it will encourage greater vigilance on the part of licensees, and deter minors from attempting purchases.

Fines up to \$250 and jail sentence up to 90 days are penalties for misrepresenting age to secure alcoholic beverages. The commission emphasizes that anyone under the age of 21 years, male or female, married or single, is a minor.

## Commission Denied Naval Grad Because His Mother Was A Former Communist

KINGS POINT, N. Y. (AP) — An honor graduate of the U. S. Merchant Marine Academy—whose mother quit the Communist Party at his insistence—has been denied a naval reserve commission because of her former activities.

Cadet Midshipman Eugene W. Landy, 21, received word of his rejection on the eve of exercises at which his 34-year-old mother is to watch him graduate Friday with three of the academy's highest awards.

"I wish they'd punish me instead of him," his mother, Mrs. Deborah Landy, told reporters while visiting a sister in New Jersey.

She acknowledged she was a Communist Party member from 1937 until 1947 or 1948, when she quit under urging from her son.

"He sort of gave me an ultimatum that I quit or he would leave home. He reformed me and yet he is suffering for it. I wish they'd punish me instead of him. I'd rather go to jail than have him suffer."

### Big Four Conference Proposed For Oct. 3

BERLIN (AP) — Soviet sources said this week the Big Four foreign ministers conference would open Oct. 3 in Geneva.

Officials here said their superiors advised them the first Monday in October had been selected as the starting time for the meeting agreed upon at the summit conference in July. The U.N. secretary in Geneva has been asked to provide facilities for five weeks.

## Chance Phone Call Ends In Death For Two Persons

GARY, Ind. (AP) — A telephone solicitor's chance call this week sent a Gary policeman on an investigation that resulted in a gun duel and ended in death for the officer and a 32-year-old steelworker.

Police Sgt. Ray Hahn said Patrolman John Moore, 37, although wounded three times, killed Arthur Wright with five bullets from his revolver at Wright's home.

Wright was dead when Moore's fellow officer George Vinchur, who was in the patrol car, reached the back of the house. Moore, shot twice in the chest and once in the head, died in a hospital 45 minutes later.

The solicitor, Mrs. Virginia Sofranoff, had called Wright's home by chance. She said she heard a young girl say, "Call the police to 655 Indiana Ave." The girl repeated the address and then hung up. Mrs. Sofranoff called police.

Vinchur said the house was quiet when he and Moore arrived. He

said Moore went to the rear, and moments later he heard shots. He ran around the house and found Wright dead and Moore dying.

Two sisters, 15 and 8 years old, who were in the house, told police they were Wright's nieces. They said their parents were separated and they had been living with Wright and his wife.

Sgt. Hahn said the girls stated that after Mrs. Wright left for work in the steel mills Wright locked the younger girl and his 2-year-old son in a room and then tried to molest the 15-year-old girl.

The girl said she repulsed Wright, and he beat her for about two hours, finally threatening to attack her sister if she did not submit.

The younger girl said she escaped from the locked room and answered the telephone when Mrs. Sofranoff called.
