BIRTHDAY PARTY GIVEN AT YONCALLA

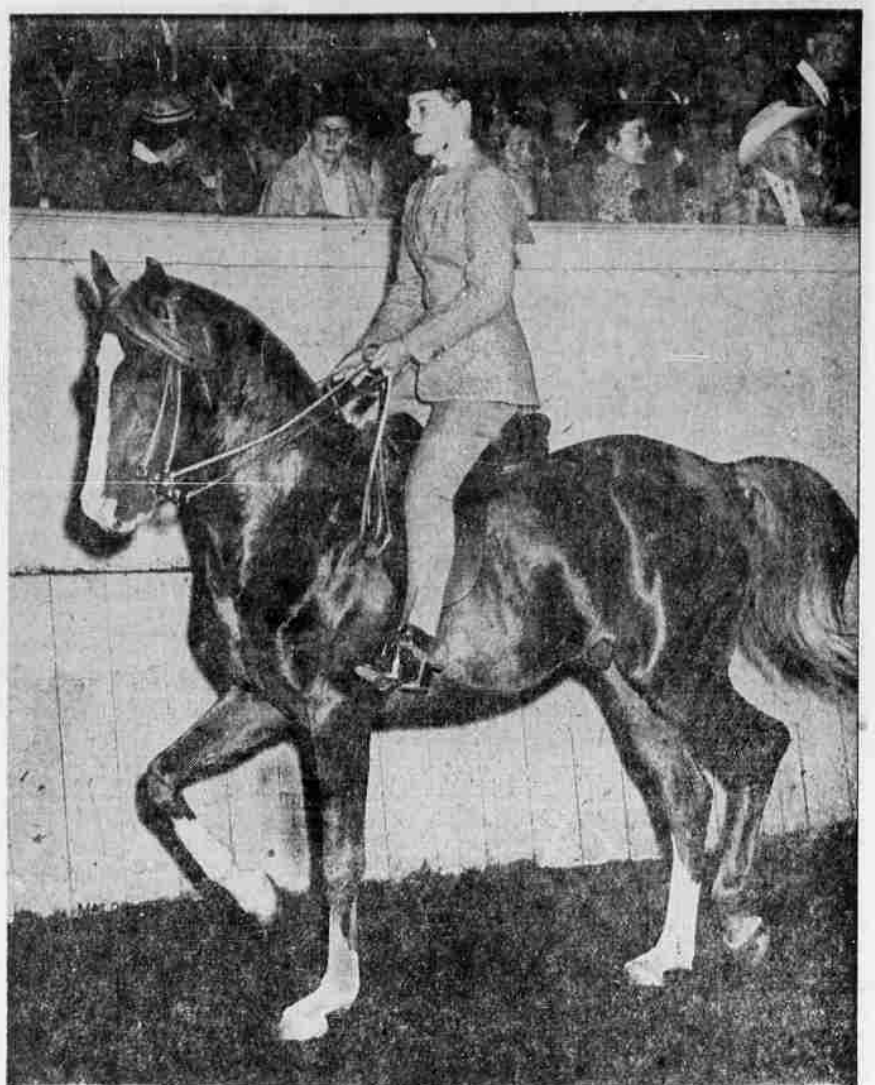

Shakespearean Festival Opens Monday Evening

Monday evening proved indeed a happy occasion for Angus L. Bowmer, professor of drama at Southern Oregon College and founder and producing director of the Shakespearean Festival which celebrated its 20th anniversary by presenting "Midsummer Night's Dream." Even the weather cooperated to perfection with soft warm air and a star-studded sky, making the outdoor Elizabethan theatre in Ashland's Lithia Park everything one could ask for. Bowmer, who started the Festival 20 years ago, now stands in the limelight of the Shakespearean world with people coming from many, many countries to enjoy the Shakespearean Festival, which plays nightly throughout the month of August.

It was a happy evening too for Dr. Margery Bailey, professor of English at Stanford University, Palo Alto, who was introduced before the play as the Shakespearean Festival's "angel." Dr. Bailey, in a short talk, declared that no Stratford on Avon in all the world was as perfect as that in Ashland and that students of Shakespearean drama were coming from all parts of the country to learn and act in the plays.

Ed Slingerland acted as master of ceremonies at the press and radio dinner held at Tally Ho and again just preceding curtain time in the open-air theatre. Among those taking bows besides the founder Angus Bowmer, Dr. Bailey and the Festival president, Dr. Beverly Cope, were John R. Richards of the state board of higher education, Supreme Court Justice and Mrs. James T. Brand, Dr. and Mrs. E. Stephenson, Secretary of State and Mrs. Earl Newberry and Bishop and Mrs. Barton of Bend, Ore.; J. Marx, drama editor for the Oregon Journal and H. Larson, drama editor of the Oregonian.

The residents of Ashland are not only to be congratulated upon their beautiful park, but for backing Angus Bowmer in perfecting the Festival, which has become one of Oregon's greatest attractions. The Festival founder and his co-workers are already making plans far into the future to make every coming year surpass each preceding year, so those who have been loyal supporters of the Festival have much to look forward to with the advancing years. It doesn't seem possible that the Festival could be improved on, but Angus Bowmer, and the people of Ashland, all of whom have brought so much to the theatre world, will without a doubt go on and on to greater and greater successes.

Tickets to the Festival may be secured by writing "Shakespearean Festival," Ashland, Ore. Adult admissions are in three price ranges. Children, 12 and under, are half-price. Those having seen one of Bowmer's productions need no urging to go back year after year but to those who have never attended one of the plays, it is to be hoped that this year they will be among the 25,000 enjoying the Festival.
