CAA Gets Application From Boeing For Jet

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Civil Aeronautics Administration said here that it has received an application from Boeing Airplane Co. for certification on its 707 jet transport.

A CAA spokesman said it may take several years to completely certify the new plane.

Boeing is building a military version of the 707, the KC135, for use by the Air Force as its first jet tanker.

The 707 Stratoliner has accumulated 193 flight hours in 127 flights "with highly satisfactory results" and appears to be a 600-mile-an-hour plane rather than in the 550-mile-an-hour class.

Oregon To Receive Commercial Vaccine

PORTLAND (AP)—Enough Salk polio vaccine to inoculate 5,000 persons is expected to arrive in Oregon soon for commercial use, and a medical committee recommends it be given to 5- to 9-year-olds.

This is in line with government proposals.

Oregon doctors will receive the 10,431 shots which is the state's share of the first national commercial distribution of the vaccine. This is enough for about 5,000 youngsters since each should receive two shots.

The advisory committee, which met here recently, includes representatives of the State Board of Health, the State Medical Society, the State Pharmaceutical Assn. and the PTA.

The vaccine is being released for commercial use since the National Foundation of Infantile Paralysis has filled its present needs.
