## Northwest States Receive Benefits For Airport Work

WASHINGTON (AP) — Pacific Northwest states and Alaska will benefit to the tune of \$2,788,456 from an enlarged airport construction program approved by the 84th Congress.

The money will come from an additional 42 1/2 million dollars voted for this fiscal year and signed by President Eisenhower Wednesday. The 48 states and the territories also will share in 63 million dollars marked for airport work for each of the next three years.

Secretary of Commerce Weeks announced allocations recently to permit local agencies to begin "the immediate development of revised airport programs."

Weeks said the 42 1/2 million dollars is in addition to 20 million dollars previously appropriated for the 1955-56 fiscal year. Allocation of the 20 million dollar fund will begin within a few days, Weeks said, but distribution of the larger fund will be held up for 90 days so that revised applications for airport development may be submitted.

Allocations by states (first figure additional money for the current fiscal year; second figure allocation for each of next three fiscal years) included: Idaho: \$463,324, \$694,585; Oregon: \$241,438, \$362,157; Washington: \$378,714, \$568,070; Alaska: \$1,125,000, \$1,350,000.

## Russell, Morse Would Support Cabinet Post Pay

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two Senate Democrats who helped to prevent pay raises this year for Cabinet members and other top administration officials said here they will support salary boosts next year.

Sens. Russell (D-Ga.) and Morse (D-Ore.) teamed up in the final hours of the adjournment rush this week to block Senate action on the salary changes asked by President Eisenhower. But both said today they favor some increases.

"I was against Senate action on any legislation of this importance without adequate public hearings and proper consideration," Russell said.

"I'm confident the Senate will approve some pay increases early next session although I favor a number of changes in its present form," he added.

Morse, who offered to talk the pay hike to death if necessary, went beyond Russell.

He not only forecast Senate approval, after hearings and amendments, but said he is willing to make the increases retroactive to the current month.

Congress voted pay raises for its own members, judges, the military services, postal and civil service workers this year, but quit before reaching the top executive levels. President Eisenhower in a personal letter July 15 asked Senate and House committee chairmen to win approval "before this session adjourns."

VANCOUVER, B. C. (AP) — A penguin egg has thrown Stanley Park Zoo keepers into a tizzy of expectation.

Their big question: Will it hatch?

The egg arrived last week. "A courtship had been going on for quite a while," explained zoo keeper Alan Best. "I had put rubber mats on the concrete floors so that an egg wouldn't break when laid."

Penguins don't make nests of any kind, and Best said the male does most of the work during the 64 days' incubation period. The egg is about four inches long and nearly round. It is incubated by the penguin placing it between his feet and lowering a fringe of feathers—sort of a male substitute for a petticoat—around it.
