

Roseburg Chiefs Host 'Jacks, Sox This Week

One of the standout baseball weekends of the local season and all of southern Oregon is on tap in the next four days when Roseburg's semi-pro Chiefs meet the Coos Bay - North Bend Lumberjacks and the Drain Black Sox in home-and-home games.

A Thursday night game with the Lumberjacks at Finlay Field inaugurates the toughest and most colorful week of Chief scheduling this season. Friday night the two teams meet at North Bend.

Manager Hal Zurcher's fourth-place Chiefs of the Southern Oregon League meet Drain Saturday night at the Black Sox stadium and then return to Finlay Field Sunday afternoon in a series that will probably decide the SOL championship.

Two wins by Drain would clinch for the Sox their fourth straight league title. Roseburg must win both games to keep Drain from nabbing at least a tie for the championship.

CB-NB, winner of 28 games this season, is recognized by many as the top semi-pro baseball team in the state after topping most of the best semi-pros in Oregon and the Northwest. The Lumberjacks hold an early-season 10-0 decision over Drain, a second-best choice of many baseball men for top team in Oregon.

The Lumberjack lineup lists such well-knowns as Jack Henkel, ex-Eugene High and Oregon right-hander; Ron Webb, southpaw from Washington State; pitcher Ward Rokey, ex-PCL performer; outfielders Johnny Kovenz and Dick Wenner; and infielders Roy Nicely and Jay Ragini, all ex-Pacific Coast League players.

Henkel is the probable starting mound choice for CB-NB while Ron Whittaker, ex-Eugene High pitching mate of Henkel's nod for Roseburg.

Game Commission To Free More Fish

Although the hunting season preparations have stolen the limelight among Oregon's sportsmen, fishing devotees are still getting in some good lucks in the lakes, streams, and reservoirs of the state.

Adding substantially to the angler's catch have been the trout, steelhead, and salmon released from the Oregon Game Commission fish hatcheries. As to date, approximately 2,500,000 legal sized fish have been stocked in fishing waters throughout the state, with another 500,000 yearlings yet to be planted. Angler creel census has shown that hatchery released legals have made up a goodly portion of the catch.

In addition to releases of legal-sized fish, hatcheries have kept well ahead of schedule with the stocking of fry and fingerlings into the reservoirs and lake basin groups. Most allocations for lakes and reservoirs at the lower elevations have already been completed, with mobile units now making releases in waters at higher elevations previously blocked by snow.

Although no records are yet available as to the number of fry and fingerlings stocked to date, approximately 10 million are scheduled to be released before the summer ends.

Aerial planting of the high lake basin groups in the Willows and Cascade mountains got underway about Aug. 8.

College Passers May Upset Pros

CHICAGO (AP) — The college all-stars will fight fire with fire when they meet the Cleveland Browns Friday night. On the arms of some of the nation's top quarterbacks ride the possibilities of an upset.

After last year's 31-6 loss to Detroit, fourth straight suffered by the stars, sponsors of the game finally decided the pros couldn't be beaten without an efficient passing attack.

The late Arch Ward, sports editor of the Chicago Tribune and originator of the game, announced after the defeat that the stars would employ professional coaches in the future.

Curly Lambeau, football pioneer at Green Bay and later coach of the Chicago Cardinals and Washington Redskins, was named to the job.

Lambeau and his pro assistants decided to pick out the players they wanted. They selected big, fast linemen; hard-hitting, good-blocking fullbacks; and halfbacks who can do everything.

In addition, they named five quarterbacks, including All American Ralph Guglielmi of Notre Dame; Dave Leggett, the brain trust who led Ohio State to a national championship; Paul Larson, California's pass master; Oregon ace George Shaw; and Tom Carey of Notre Dame.

If the stars do upset the Browns, who are favored by 12 points, it will be with passing. Hank Anderson, former Chicago Bear line coach who is one of Lambeau's assistants, said, "You can't score on the ground in pro football unless you're lucky. You have to throw touchdowns."

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
