City Council Approves New Curfew Ordinance

The city of Roseburg has a revised curfew ordinance. City Council members Thursday evening passed an ordinance which states, in part, that a person under 18 years of age must not be in a public place or at any private place where the public is entered between the hours of midnight and 4 a.m.

Councilmen approved the ordinance after its second and third readings. Their vote was unanimous. A person under 18 may be out, if accompanied by a parent. Likewise, he may be accompanied by a parent, guardian or other person over 21, who is authorized by the parent.

He may be out if he is engaged in some lawful pursuit, such as delivering papers.

Action by the council came after Municipal Judge Randolph Slocum last month said the old ordinance allowed little enforcement. Under the new ruling penalties for violations by a minor can bring a \$50 fine or confinement in jail for five days.

Parents, guardians or others with responsibility for minors can be fined \$200 or sentenced to serve 30 days. The ruling also applies

to persons in charge or in control of a private premises where the public is allowed. Both sentence and fine can be imposed on adults.

A complete copy of the ordinance may be viewed at the city hall.

In other action, the council:

1. Approved a new business license for the J. J. Newberry Store, 117 S. Jackson St.
2. Approved paving of Hamilton Street between the center section of Main Street and the center section of Rice Street.
3. Authorized that warrants for city expenditures be equally divided between the Douglas County Bank and the United States National Bank of Portland, Roseburg Branch. Both banks offered to buy the warrants for 3 per cent interest.
4. Gave approval of City Manager George Farrell's plan for economical street paving in some areas. The areas will individually be approved by the council.
5. Okayed a recommendation by the city manager and city recorder that an electrical accounting machine be purchased by the city.

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Polio Fatalities Show Drop As Result Of Salk Vaccine, Preliminary Reports Reveal

WASHINGTON (AP)—Doctors have given over a million American youngsters their second Salk polio vaccine shots, with the South leading the way.

All told, 6 1/2 million first and second-graders received a first shot.

Somewhere around 60 to 70 per cent of those with access to the second shot have had it.

These figures were turned up today in a nationwide survey conducted by The Associated Press. It showed:

1. The number of polio fatalities has dropped 46 per cent below last

year's level. In the key states supplying second shots, the decline has been 65 per cent.

2. Of 6 1/2 million inoculated youngsters, there have been 247 cases of the disease and nine died of it.
3. Outside the South, there has been considerable resistance to launching the second-shot campaign, which was delayed by uncertainty and shortage of vaccine. Eighteen of the 48 states are waiting for fall to renew the campaign. Few states have made any plans for a third injection.

These figures were tabulated on the basis of nearly complete reports from the 48 states and the District of Columbia:

Given shot No. 1 — 6,458,996.
Given shot No. 2 — 1,080,329.
Polio deaths this year — 191.
Polio deaths to this time last year — 355.

It is impossible, of course, to draw definite conclusions from the statistics, since some figures are tentative, they have not been evaluated scientifically, and the possibility of coincidence is too strong.

There can be no doubt, however, that the number of polio fatalities has been reduced sharply from the level of last year, a fairly average year.

Biggest decline in deaths has been in the eight states which

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American Fliers Arrive Back In United States

Plane Touches Down At Travis Air Force Base



TRAVIS AIR FORCE BASE, Calif. (AP)—Eleven American airmen, coming home from 32 long, lonely months in Red China, flew in from Hawaii Friday—one day closer to the long awaited reunions with their loved ones.

Six of the airmen landed in Gen. Douglas MacArthur's former plane, the C-54 transport "Bataan." The other five touched down moments later in a sister ship.

This was a high point of the journey along the road of freedom that began in Hong Kong late last month. But the best was yet to come.

Later the airmen will leave Travis in Air Force planes on the last leg of the journey to home and family.

A crowd of about 1,000 men and women of the Air Force was on hand to greet the returnees. There was no mass reunion here with their families. The men said they preferred it that way.

Dr. Robert D. Arnold, Sunnyvale, Calif., was the only relative on hand. He was here to meet his brother, Col. John Knox Arnold.

Colonel Arnold's sister-in-law, her face streaked with tears of joy, covered Arnold's gaunt face with lipstick.

"This is wonderful!" Arnold exclaimed. "I didn't ever expect to see them again. My brother here is the only relative I have besides my wife and four children."

Arnold, who underwent the most severe torture the Chinese Reds dealt the airmen was nervous but otherwise well composed.

Center of attention by the crowd was Airman Daniel Schmidt of Portland, Ore., whose wife remarried while he was gone because, she said, she believed Schmidt was dead.

Schmidt spoke freely to the newsmen but whenever he was asked about his tangled marital affairs he replied firmly, "I won't discuss that now."

Firefighters Mop Up South Douglas Timber Blaze

Douglas Forest Protective Association was "mopping up" the fire in valuable felled and standing timber in southern Douglas County today.

Dispatcher Wayne Miller reported that about 50 acres of timber were destroyed in the county's biggest forest fire this year. The fire was located about 11 miles from Days Creek on the divide between Days Creek and the South Umpqua River.

The fire started Wednesday on land being logged by the Triangle Logging Co., Canyonville. Miller said an estimated half million board feet of cut timber was blackened and a like amount threatened for a time.

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Ex-Governor Martin Of Washington Dies

CHENEY, Wash. (AP)—A several years' illness brought the death Thursday night of Clarence D. Martin, two-term Washington governor under whom the sales tax and tax tokens entered the state's financial picture.

Martin, 69, died in the town of his birth, where he became a wealthy flour miller and wheat farmer. He took office at Olympia Jan. 1, 1933, in the dark depression years. His second wife, Lue, and three sons by his first marriage survive.

His death was blamed on a respiratory ailment brought on by Parkinson's disease, which affects the central nervous system, an attending physician said.

Storm Loses Some Of Punch In Carolinas

WASHINGTON (AP)—Hurricane Connie, losing some of its punch but still a menace, raked northward along the North Carolina coast today with 75-mile winds and destructive, pounding high tides.

The Weather Bureau here said the whirling tropical storm, on an erratic course, bore inland at 9 a.m., near the resort and fishing town of Morehead City, N. C. Two hours later it was 60 miles west of Cape Hatteras, N. C., lashing small fishing villages along the Carolina coast and the mainland along Pamlico Sound.

Cherry Point, N. C., just north of Morehead City and the site of a giant Marine base, reported top wind gusts of 75 miles an hour, reduced from the 100-mile wallop packed around the hurricane center as it approached the shore.

The advisory said continued northward movement is expected at about 12 miles per hour, and the storm can be expected to weaken gradually after another six hours.

Red and black hurricane warning flags flapped along hundreds of miles of coast line from Myrtle Beach, S. C., to the Delaware Breakwater and northeast storm warnings extended to Provincetown, Mass.

Meanwhile, Connie's little sister, Diane, reached full hurricane force with 80 to 90-mile winds about 1,150 miles east of Miami. She was moving northwest or north.

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Former Deputy Sheriff Held On Fraud Charge

Thomas James Moore, 52, former deputy sheriff for the southern part of the county, is being held on a charge of defrauding the county.

Retained here from Albany Thursday evening, Moore was arraigned before District Judge Warren A. Woodruff Friday morning.

At that time, Moore asked time to obtain legal counsel, and the case was continued until 9:30 a.m. Saturday.

Ball of \$1,000 was continued against Moore, who was arrested by Linn County officers on a Douglas County warrant.

The formal complaint against Moore charges him with being a "trustee converting subject matter of trust" in the amount of \$75.

Sheriff Byrd, who signed the complaint, said Moore is accused of misuse of a \$25 monthly payment made to him for trailer house rental. Although not a part of the charge, the sheriff said Moore also had incurred a \$126 telephone bill in a period of about two weeks, and that he had run up a large board bill at Canyonville.

Under the law the misdemeanor carries a penalty for conviction of three months to one year in jail or a fine of \$50 to \$100, according to Dist. Atty. Robert M. Stults.

Moore, hired to be resident deputy at Canyonville by former Sheriff Calvin Baird, went to Albany last weekend.

Thursday, Sheriff Byrd announced that Eugene Wyatt of Glendale would replace Moore in the deputy sheriff's post.

Simon, Scallon Elevated To Senior High Positions

Two promotions in the staff of Roseburg High School were announced today by Cliff Norris, acting superintendent of Roseburg Public Schools.

Kenneth Simon, for the past three years the dean of boys, has been appointed vice principal to replace Robert Sabin, who recently resigned to take the superintendency of Coburg schools.

Joe Scallon has been named dean

of boys. Last year, he was vice principal of Central Junior High School.

This summer, Simon completed the master of arts degree in education administration at the University of Minnesota. He received his bachelor of science degree from Mankato, Minn., Teachers College in 1949.

During World War II, Simon spent three years in the Navy, some in the South Pacific. He, his wife and three children live at 1201 Center St.

Proposed Sewer System Will Get Special Study

The city of Roseburg's current and proposed sewer systems are in for thorough study in the next months.

Mayor Ernest Barker's citizens' committee on sanitation met Thursday evening in City Hall to elect committee officers and lay ground work for future action. They named temporary chairman Councilman Sidney C. Moon Jr. as permanent chairman and elected Ralph W. Sanstedt secretary.

The sanitation committee met in joint session with the city council. With the council, nine Roseburg citizens comprise the sanitation group. Their target in months ahead is to study a report by consulting engineers Cornell, Howard, Hayes and Merryfield, Corvallis, concerning the city's sewer needs and then formulate plans for improved sewer service in Roseburg for presentation to voters.

Committee members Thursday expressed a wish that residents would help them. They have invited anyone interested to attend their sessions. The committee meet next Aug. 25 in the City Hall to discuss the problem with a Corvallis firm representative.

A long range project, the sewer renovation is expected to take several years before final completion of all phases. First problem to face the group will be the setting up of an official agenda and enumeration of the necessary steps, Moon said. When completed, the project is expected to nose past the two million dollar mark.

Committee members Thursday pointed out that the work on sewers in Roseburg is a good distance behind schedule. Some thought at least 10 years.

MC Board Asks Plans Revision Of Arts Section

At a special school board meeting Thursday night, the Myrtle Creek school board requested revised plans for an industrial arts section of the high school. It also hired a new industrial arts teacher, according to correspondent Ruth M. Evans.

On hand for the special meeting was Al Beck, Salem, state building inspector, and Van Svarvad, Roseburg, resident architect for Freeman, Hayslip & Tuft, architectural firm of Portland.

The school board requested that revised plans have all floor space on a single floor. The original plans had called for a 50 by 100-foot area with a mezzanine. Beck advised that it would be cheaper to have all floor space on one floor, making it 66.2 by 100 feet, Supt. Al Neet said.

The revised plans will be returned to the board at its next regular meeting Aug. 22. Meanwhile, bids for sale of construction bonds will be received Sept. 1.

The new industrial arts teacher hired was James Olson of Walker, Minn. This leaves only one position to be filled, that of vocal music teacher.

It was also reported that all five eighth grades in the district will be taught at the upper elementary building. Last year one of the eighth-grade classes attended Tri-City Elementary.

Rhee Ultimatum For Truce Team To Leave Pends

SEOUL (AP)—A South Korean was shot and killed Friday and riots continued in rising tension over President Syngman Rhee's demand that pro-Communist truce inspectors get out of Korea by Saturday midnight. Two other Koreans were wounded.

An informed source said, meanwhile, that Rhee advised the U.S. government he could not control South Korean demonstrators unless U. S. troops guarding truce team personnel put away their weapons.

An informed source said Gen. L. L. Penninger, United Nations commander, in a Thursday conference with Rhee, charged—and Rhee heatedly denied—that the Korean demonstrations were government inspired.

It has been common knowledge that South Korean officials in the past have ordered "spontaneous" demonstrations supporting other Rhee objectives.

The source said Rhee told Penninger the United States also must promise to help in peaceful eviction of Communist members of the Neutral Nations Supervisory Commission.

At Panmunjom U. S. Maj. Gen. Harlan C. Parks told a stormy Military Armistice Commission session that "illegal" activities by Polish and Czech NNSC members had provoked South Korea's seething demonstrations.

An 8th Army spokesman said a U. S. soldier guard aboard a ship in Incheon Harbor had fired his carbine at three Koreans in a boat. He said the guard spotted them trying to steal canned milk from a barge.

The guard's action, he said, had no connection with any anti-truce team demonstration.

Nightcrawler Case Sequel Argued At Hearing In Salem

SALEM (AP)—Whether Public Utilities Commissioner Charles H. Helzel has authority to prevent railroads from discontinuing or curtailing passenger service was argued here Friday before Circuit Judge Val Sloper.

This case was brought by the Portland Traction Co., which announced it would reduce its passenger schedules next Sunday.

The case also is expected to decide whether Helzel can make the Southern Pacific Railroad resume operation of its "Rogue River" passenger train between Portland and Astoria. This train was taken off the run last Sunday.

Clarence Phillips, Portland Traction lawyer, argued that the law doesn't give Helzel authority in the case.

John R. McCullough, Helzel's lawyer, contended that the law does. He cited a section that railroads must maintain adequate service.

Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton also appeared on behalf of Helzel.

The traction company has made two attempts in recent years to abandon all of its passenger service between Portland and Oregon City. Helzel denied the application both times.

When the company announced its proposed reduction in service, Helzel issued an order that the service must be continued on the present basis. The company then went to court.

Robert Colvin Acquitted Of Drunk Driving Charge

A district court jury Thursday acquitted Robert Colvin, 40, Roseburg, in a trial which grew out of Colvin's arrest on a charge of drunken driving.

The jury of five women and one man deliberated about an hour before returning a verdict to Judge Warren A. Woodruff.

Colvin was arrested June 11 near the south city limits of Roseburg, by a sheriff's reserve officer.

Freight Car Shortage Said Reaching Serious Condition

SALEM (AP)—The freight car shortage on Southern Pacific lines in Western Oregon grew more serious last week, with the railroad able to give lumber shippers only 87 per cent of the cars they ordered.

The figure, compared with 97 per cent the preceding week, was the lowest percentage since June.

While the number of cars needed by the shippers is increasing steadily, the number supplied by the railroad has dropped.

Following are the numbers of cars ordered by lumber shippers and the number supplied, with the percentage of orders filled:

Division 1, main line between Portland and Eugene—323 ordered, 343 supplied, 94 per cent.

2, Sixty-five line between Eugene and Astoria—2,270 ordered, 1,953 supplied, 86 per cent.

3, Line between Eugene and Coos Bay—665 ordered, 579 supplied, 87 per cent.

4, Westside via Newberg, McMinnville and Willamina—184 ordered, 172 supplied, 93 per cent.

5, Westside via Hillsboro and Forest Grove—82 ordered, 75 supplied, 91 per cent.

6, Tillamook branch—182 ordered, 173 supplied, 95 per cent.

7, Toledo branch via Corvallis—395 ordered, 300 supplied, 76 per cent.

8, Mill City branch via Lebanon—115 ordered, 112 supplied, 97 per cent.

9, Cascade line between Eugene, Westfir and Oakridge—476 ordered, 443 supplied, 93 per cent.

10, Eastside line to Silverton, W. Staylor and Brownsville—34 ordered, 50 supplied, 93 per cent.

11, Westside line via Dallas, Independence and Oswego—230 ordered, 175 supplied, 80 per cent.

Total, 5,007 ordered, 4,390 supplied, 87 per cent.

Total for previous week, 4,655 ordered, 4,717 supplied, 97 per cent.
