### PHOTO TIPS

The home, churches, buildings of historical interest are just a few of the subjects of architectural photography — a field that nearly every photographer enters into at times.

With the expenditure of little effort, interesting pictorial value is added to otherwise plain record photographs. Important to this end is the selection of a viewpoint. If one can be found that permits "framing" the building through the branches of a tree, the picture is almost sure to be a success.

Appearances of buildings change with lighting conditions, according to the time of day. If it is desired to accent the texture of the structure, the picture should be made with the sun at a sharp angle, skipping across the side facing the camera. Long shadows from a late or early sun are also effective pictorially. With black- and white films, filters enhance the results by darkening the sky.

If possible, the camera should be level in order to avoid convergence of vertical lines. If the camera must be tilted to show the entire structure, convergence will necessarily result (except with special cameras), but this is not entirely unnatural, as the eye experiences the same effect when turned upward.

Detail and sharpness are of prime importance; a tripod will eliminate camera movement as a source of fuzziness. Architectural studies can be made with nothing more than a camera and film, however, use of the mentioned accessories will improve results. ### Union Oil Co. Subsidiary Buys Station Chain

PORTLAND (AP) — A subsidiary of Union Oil Co., a California firm, has purchased control of 150 gasoline stations in Oregon and Washington, the Oregonian said in its Friday edition. The transaction involved lease control of Sunset Oil Co. stations carrying the Golden Eagle name in the Pacific Northwest. The buyer was Westway Petroleum Corp., a Union branch firm incorporated in California to operate the Golden Eagle outlets.

Union Oil financed the change-over for approximately \$1,500,000, the newspaper reported. Last year the Golden Eagle firm, operating as Sunset Oil, purchased holdings of United Petroleum Corp., at that time one of the largest independent gasoline retailers in the northwest. The new sale included the Golden Eagle and United Petroleum names in Oregon and the Eagle brand in Washington.

### Strange Object Seen In Air Over Roseburg

Two alert Douglas County residents called the News-Review Thursday afternoon to report that unidentified floating objects were visible in the air above their homes. They were Mrs. Eli Sanders Melrose, and Mrs. Gladys Burr, Tenille.

Mrs. Burr's call came first. She described the object as seemingly transparent, resembling a balloon. Mrs. Sanders called later around 4 p.m. She said her husband had been watching the object for about two hours, and that it appeared to resemble a moon yet travelled slowly.

Both women reported the sight to the Air Force filter center in Portland. No report as to what the object actually was, was phoned to the newspaper. An observer at the Dillard Ground Observer Corps Post said it could be a "Moby Dick." It is a balloon which checks air currents and also lets the Air Force know how alert citizenry in the area is.

### Polio Fatalities Drop As Result Of Vaccine

have given 75 per cent of the reported second shots. Of those eight, seven are Southern or border states. They are Florida, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, Oklahoma, South Carolina and West Virginia. The eighth is California. The greatest number of polio deaths this year has been in Massachusetts, which has reported 24. Texas has the second highest total, 22, with California third with 11. No other state has had more than 9. Last year, at the same time, California had reported 34 deaths; Texas 35 and Massachusetts 15. Others with high totals for the comparable period of 1954 include Arkansas, Florida, Illinois, Kentucky, Massachusetts, New York, Oklahoma and Pennsylvania.

The nine deaths listed among children inoculated with the Salk vaccine included three in Idaho, two in Pennsylvania and one each in Louisiana, New Mexico, New York and Texas.

Twenty-four of the 48 states said little demand had been detected for the private supplies of polio vaccine now becoming available. Only 11 states reported an "appreciable" demand. Five of these were in the South—Alabama, Florida, Louisiana, Mississippi and South Carolina. The others: Kansas, Nevada, New Mexico, Utah, Vermont and Wyoming.
