

DRAIN BLACK SOX WIN FOURTH SOL CROWN

Defending Champs Scuttle Roseburg Chiefs In 2 Tilts

Drain's incomparable Black Sox rang up their fourth straight Southern Oregon League baseball title with weekend wins of 15-5 and 12-2 over Roseburg's Chiefs at Drain and at Finley Field. It was Drain's 17th and 18th consecutive triumphs of the year.

The Sox generally made life miserable for the man-shy Chiefs, scoring with comparative ease in both games to ring up easy wins. Drain was ahead all the way in both tilts.

Boros Claims Tam Gold Pot

CHICAGO, (AP)—Stolid Julius Boros, a golfing son of a Connecticut machinist, yesterday struck Tam O'Shanter's gold lode for the big gest haul in the history of the game — \$105,000.

Boros' coolie carved 70 for a 7 under-par 281 in Tam's World pro meet yesterday captured for the 35-year-old shotmaker from Southern Pines, N.C., via Fairfield, Conn., a \$50,000 cash prize and a \$55,000 exhibition contract.

Boros, the 1952 U.S. Open champ, finished two strokes ahead of another "old pro," Fred Haas, whose closing 68 was the final day's best round.

Boros won a playoff triumph in the 1952 World meet when he hauled in \$25,000 and in 1953 copped \$1,200 with an also-ran finish.

It was a fabulous windup at Tam yesterday, witnessed by an estimated crowd of 53,000.

The huge crowd actually sewed it up for Boros. His errant tee shot on the 70th hole was deflected by the closely packed throng and bounced onto the green to set up a par 3.

In the concurrent World women's pro tourney, Patty Berg won her third straight title and a \$5,000 top prize with a 298 total, one stroke ahead of Mary Lena Faulk.

The World men's amateur went to Doug Sanders, of Cedarhurst, N.Y., a University of Florida star who shot a 4-under-par 284 for an eight-stroke triumph.

The World women's amateur meet was captured by Wilfrid Smith 18-year-old from St. Clair, Mich., with a 309.

Boros swept past Bo Wingard, the 54-hole leader, and Wally Ulrich and Gene Littler, who shot a one stroke off the three-quarter pace, in his drive to the rich prize.

Haas took the \$10,000 second prize in the World pro, while a three-way tie developed at 284 between Littler, British Open champion Peter Thomson and Henry Ransom. Each collected \$3,500.

Ulrich finished in a tie with Tony Cerdia at 285, worth \$1,950 to each; while two deadlocked at 286, Fred Hawkins and Lionel Hebert, collected \$1,750 apiece.

Wingard, faltering to a final 75, wound up in a three-way tie at 287 with Jay Hebert and Bob Roseburg with \$1,423 going to each.

Roseburg got life in the fourth when the Chiefs loaded the bases off southpaw strikeout ace Jerry Cade with none out. But Cade lived up to his notices, fanning both Zurcher and Dan Luby before allowing one run to score and then retiring the side.

For the game, Cade struck out eight in seven innings and walked four. Ron Whittaker went the distance on the mound for the Chiefs, getting tagged for 14 hits, Rutschman again led batting, hitting two for four, while Ted Wilson and Pat Wohlers each had 2-5 including one double apiece.

There were no home runs hit in the two-game series.

The Chicago White Sox, despite their third place position, appeared today to be in the most enviable spot among the four top contenders for the American League pennant.

Cleveland's inability to pull away from the field together with Chicago's apparent easy schedule ahead as compared to those of the Indians, New York Yankees and Boston Red Sox gave the White Sox a seemingly big advantage.

The White Sox got a lift yesterday when they defeated Detroit 5-4 while the lowly Kansas City Athletics snapped Cleveland's six-game winning streak with a 7-3 triumph. Although they slipped to third place because the Yankees took two from Baltimore, the White Sox cut Cleveland's first-place margin to one game.

Only 3 1/2 games separated the first four teams as the fourth-place Red Sox also won two, defeating Washington 9-6 and 2-1. The Yankees climbed into second place, a half game behind the Indians, by mauling the Baltimore Orioles 7-2 and 20-6.

Roberts Wins
In the National League, Robin Roberts and Don Newcombe staged a thrilling pitching duel. Victory No. 19 was at stake for both right-handers. Roberts won 3-2 in 10 innings, to give Philadelphia a split, in the double-header with Brooklyn. The Dodgers won the second game 5-4 in 13 innings.

Runner-up Milwaukee shaded Chicago 4-3 in 10 innings but they still trailed Brooklyn by 15 1/2 games. The New York Giants to within a game and a half of the Braves, knocking off Pittsburgh twice 4-2 and 3-1. In still another 10-inning tussle, the St. Louis Cardinals overcame the Cincinnati Reds 5-4.

Billy Pierce's pitching and the hitting of Jim Rivera combined to bring victory to the White Sox. They now have 42 games left to play in the remaining six weeks.

Local Golf Tourney To Draw Top Stars

A professional field second to none in the Pacific Northwest is promised for the \$3,200 Roseburg Open Golf Tournament this weekend as golfers from throughout Oregon and Washington and some from California return here for a third successive golf tournament year.

In fact, the \$2,600 prize money for the pro Invitational is again the top money offered by any privately-sponsored tournament in the Northwest.

A change in this year's program from the preceding two tourneys has been the breaking down of competitive prizes into four divisions. There will be both senior professional and senior amateur divisions for men of 30 years of age and over in addition to the regular pro and amateur divisions.

Greater Interest
This promises to create even greater interest and possibly stir even more entrants into competing in what has up until now been almost exclusively a younger man's tournament.

Tournament play again this year will consist of 72 holes of Friday and Saturday and a 36-hole Sunday finale. The whole tournament is open to the public without charge.

If both Al Zimmerman and Bob Duden compete, then the field will include both the 1954 and 1953 defending tournament champions. But neither has made a definite commitment as yet. Both, however, were last-minute entries in the 1954 derby.

The pro entry list does include at present these familiar names in addition to host pro Ed Oldfield: Harold West and Wendell Wood, both Eugene; Al Williams, Medford; Al Feldman, Tacoma; Tom Boucher, runnerup last year from Walla Walla; Joe Greer, Yakima; Fred Hill, former Roseburg and Grants Pass pro now at Mt. Hood Golf Club; Eddie Hogan, Portland; Bunny Mason, Salem and Ron Caperna, Astoria.

Other pros include Don Wilkie, Spokane; Ray Whiteside, Coos Bay; Clark Gode, Klamath Falls; Vern Martin, Corvallis; D. A. Strite, assistant at Waverly; Don Smith, assistant at Portland Golf Club; Bill Eggers, Portland; Glenn Solive, Rose City; Harry Terrell Jr., Grants Pass; Tom Marlowe and Fielding Abbott, both assistants at Portland municipal courses.

Amateur Field
The amateur field figures to be paced by George Harrington of Medford and Don Dick of Coos Bay, if neither defending champions Sid Milligan nor George Beecher from the past two tourneys enters. Milligan appears to be a certain late entry while Beecher's appearance at the tourney may be curtailed because of recent illness.

Harrington has gained considerable following here after winning the Roseburg Invitational Tournament for the past two years each spring. Bick was runnerup this year.

Benny Hughes, Eastmoreland; Woody Ball, Portland; Marshall Smith and other local amateurs figure to round a strong amateur field.

In the senior pro divisions, popular entries are Hugh Starkweather, formerly of Medford; Joe Moxel, Lloyd's of Portland; Ted Longworth, ex-Waverly pro and Jack White and Don Dumphry.

The senior amateur field figures to be paced by M. L. Hallmark, Roseburg veteran and Marvin Clark, Grants Pass. Certain to make this year's Roseburg Open is Roseburg's Ward Cummings Sr., who is sidelined by illness.

Tall New Yorker Wins Soap Box
AKRON, Ohio, (AP)—Maybe it's because he grew so fast that Richard T. Robber, a 6-foot-4 high school sophomore from Rochester, N. Y., wears the All-American Soap Box Derby crown today.

Dick, 14, shot his home-made, gravity-powered racer down a 975-foot slope yesterday in 27.25 seconds, faster than any of his 153 competitors. He won a \$5,000 college scholarship he said he would use to study medicine at Georgetown University.

And what did growing fast have to do with it? Well, says Dick: "I grew about eight inches last year. I grew out of the first car and was lucky because I had to rebuild it, and I must have done all right."

The racer Richard took more than 500 hours to build came a half length ahead of David C. Thayer, of Detroit. Albert Cobble, of Long Beach, Calif., was third in the championship heat.

"What can I say," he added, "I was in there with the greatest middleweight in the world."

The non-title fight, seen by a crowd of 8,349, was the first of a series of warmup bouts for Olson before he defends his title against Sugar Ray Robinson in November.
