We speak of Tony Arana, the Vale High quarterback who since the first of June has resided with his parents in Sutherlin. The Tony Arana Sr. family moved here after the end of the spring term.

ATHLETICALLY TALENTED as they are, the three boy members of the family quickly stepped into the sports picture of the county. Tony became a Roseburg Chief for a while, playing second base, while young seventh-grader, Dennis Arana, pitched Sutherlin to

There are 14 schools represented on the State team this year among the 24 players, including two each from Roseburg and Vale. Arana's Vale teammate is Glenn Evans, a 205-pound guard. The two were instrumental in leading Vale to the state A-2 football title last fall, with Arana throwing a last-second touchdown pass in the championship game that gave Vale the title over St. Helens.

Illini Star Flunks; Declared Ineligible

CHAMPAIGN, Ill. (AP)—Illinois' hopes of emerging from the Big Ten cellar and back into national football prominence were dealt a shattering blow yesterday when J. C. Caroline, one of the most exciting backs in Illinois history, was declared ineligible.

The No. 1 man in Illinois grid plans, Caroline was declared scholastically ineligible to play football after failing a summer school course in psychology.

J. C. dropped out of school "in good standing" last spring because of the death of a grandfather and the serious illness of his mother.

At the time, Illinois officials announced he would return to make up his work in summer school to regain eligibility this fall.

Football Coach Ray Eliot shook his head sadly after hearing the news. "He was my No. 1 offensive man, No. 1 defensive man, No. 1 punter and we planned to use him on kickoffs and extra points. There's not much to say except this is a serious blow to Illinois."

"Right now, I guess we'll have to move Harry Jefferson in Caroline's spot with Abe Woodson at the other half. From there on will just have to fill the gaps. Looking over the situation, we'll probably have to start four or five sophomores."

Caroline virtually came from nowhere in 1953 when he led Illinois to a share of the Big Ten title. The fleet-footed Negro from Columbia, S.C., led the nation in rushing offense with 1,258 yards in 194 carries.

Duck Hunting Season Extended By New Rule

WASHINGTON (AP) — Ten to 15 additional shooting days were added Monday to duck hunting seasons in three flyways in anticipation of a bumper crop of wild ducks.

"Flights on all flyways are expected to be the best since 1952," the Fish and Wildlife Service said in announcing the new basic migratory waterfowl hunting regulations for 1955-56.

The service said intensive surveys in Canada and the Far North indicated "substantial improvements in the reproductive success of waterfowl throughout important parts of their breeding range."

It forecast a considerable increase in the Atlantic Flyway and a slight increase in the Pacific Flyway.

Season Extended
The new regulations fix the overall length of the season for hunting migratory waterfowl to run from Oct. 1 to Jan. 15, 1956. This is an extension of five days over last year's basic framework.

Within those dates, hunting seasons for the individual states will be selected by their game administrators. Pacific Flyway states, which got an increase of five days last year in the only 1954-55 season lengthening, will retain an 80-day season.

States desiring split instead of continuous seasons may elect to have them by giving up 10 percent of the permissible shooting days. Those that choose split seasons may, for the first time, divide them into unequal periods.

General shooting hours under the federal regulations will be from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

The service recommended discontinuance of the practice of having a noon opening on the first day of the season. States, however, may establish noon openings under the regulations.

Summary
The Fish and Wildlife Service summary of the new regulations by flyways included:

Pacific Flyway—(Arizona, California, Idaho, Nevada, Oregon, Utah and Washington):

For ducks, geese and coots, a season of 80 consecutive days or split periods of equal or unequal length, minus the 10 per cent penalty.

Lou Kretlow Sports 12 Straight Triumphs

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Unbeaten Lou Kretlow, riding a string of 12 straight triumphs, continued to dominate Pacific Coast League pitching Tuesday.

The big right-hander, a major league castoff, has been one of the prime reasons for the Seattle Rainiers' hold on first place. He has pitched 102 innings since joining the club and walked only 31 men while striking out 74.

A pair of Hollywood aces, George (Red) Minger and Bob Garber, topped the winners in official statistics with 18 triumphs apiece, but Minger has been beaten seven times and Garber has 11 losses, although his strikeout total of 161 leads the circuit.

Three hurlers — Al Gettel of Oakland, Bob Hall of Portland and Bob Greenwood of San Francisco — hold the dubious honor of losing the most games. Each has been beaten 13 times.

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The Dalles '9' Gets To Final

BILLINGS, Mont. (AP) — Spokane plays Billings and the winner goes against undefeated The Dalles, Ore., Tuesday night in finals of the Region 11 American Legion junior baseball tournament.

A victory for The Dalles will send the Oregonians into a Western regional elimination tournament. A loss would set up one more tourney game here Wednesday night.

The Dalles handed Spokane its first tournament loss, 8-2, Monday night, and Billings eliminated Lewiston, Idaho, 1-0, in a marathon 19 innings.

The Dalles scored five runs—two on Dan Head's triple—in the seventh inning to beat the Washington nine.

The Billings-Lewiston game went four hours and 10 minutes and was decided in the 19th when relief pitcher Dick Montee singled, moved up when an attempted pick-off failed, and crossed the plate on an error by Lewiston shortstop Duane Miller.
