800 Nationalists Marching On Goa

Portuguese Follow Firm Policy Of Resisting Threat

BELGAUM, India (AP) — Eight hundred determined Indian nationalists who missed the "peaceful invasion" of Portuguese India Monday trudged Wednesday toward the Goa frontier.

They wanted to enter the colony despite the 15 or more killed in Monday's march.

The marchers had covered 40 miles late in the day and had another 30 miles to go before reaching the border of the Portuguese enclave.

Portuguese authorities have followed a firm policy of resisting any penetration by Indian demonstrators.

Most of India returned to normal Wednesday after protesting the Monday killings. But in Calcutta, the nation's largest city, a general strike continued.

Wednesday's marchers were only part of some 3,000 who had assembled at Belgaum, less than 50 miles from Goa's northeast border.

Leaders of the all-party Goa Liberation Committee here tried to persuade them all from entering the Portuguese colony in view of Monday's events. But the 800 insisted

they would enter at Banda, where Portuguese guards were reported to have killed at least three Indians in the recent invasion.

Demonstrators at Calcutta Tuesday sacked the Portuguese consulate and halted all but essential services.

New Delhi, Bombay, Nagpur, Hyderabad and other large cities were reported quiet again today after anti-Portuguese riots and strikes in which nearly 100 persons were injured. The worst violence was in Bombay, a headquarters for the Indian "peaceful invasion" Monday of the three small Portuguese territories on the west coast.

Prime Minister Nehru offered his "deep regrets and apologies" today to the foreign missions attacked in the rioting. In addition to the Portuguese consulates in Bombay and Calcutta, the office of the deputy British high commissioner in Bombay was attacked because its staff refused to lower its flag in mourning for those killed by the Portuguese.

Douglas County Polio Chapter Will Share Funds

A real "help your neighbor" move was made Tuesday by the Douglas County Chapter of the National Foundation of Infantile Paralysis.

Board members meeting in Roseburg voted to send one half of the chapter's surplus funds, approximately \$4,000, to national headquarters for distribution to chapters in epidemic areas.

Chairman Vernon Anderson said the amount was ascertained by deducting necessary working expenses from the money on hand. The remainder was then divided. Dr. Anderson pointed out that the money, and more if needed, would be returned here if necessary.

The local chapter answered a call from national headquarters. Severe polio epidemics have hit the Boston and Los Angeles areas, Anderson said. Boston has had some 1,500 new cases in 1955 as compared to 128 in 1954.

Both Los Angeles and the Massachusetts city have depleted available funds.

The surplus from Douglas County was available, Dr. Anderson continued, because nationally asked for much lower percentage of March of Dimes collections than in the past few years.

He added that total funds available for patient care in this county are "greater than the amount spent in 1954."

Other action the board appointed two new board members, Mrs. Robert Green and Jack Gamet, both of Roseburg.

AGREEMENT SIGNED

The County Court has signed an agreement with Gene Johnson for a cruise of timber on 632.16 acres involved in a 1949 land sales contract with E. G. and Jim Whipple. Johnson will make a 20 per cent, four-run cruise for the county for \$1 per acre. The work is to be completed by Sept. 10. The land is in the Drain-Yoncaia area.

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Diane's Force Dwindles; Floods Hit

Rising Water Tides Proving Greater Threat

WILMINGTON, N.C. (AP) — Hurricane Diane, after menacing the South Atlantic Coast eight days, hit into North Carolina early Wednesday, but did relatively little direct damage. Northeast of her path, though, winds whipped high tides into business houses at Elizabeth City, Washington, N.C., and other points.

Sixty-mile gusts along the mile-wide Pasquotank River at Elizabeth City sent water to one-foot depths in river-front establishments.

The Weather Bureau warned that the Pasquotank would continue to rise until about 1 p.m. (PST), probably sending water to a three-foot depth in riverside stores. Highways to the south and west were reported impassable. Routes north to Norfolk, Va., remained open.

Wind-whipped tides of the Pamlico River rose into streets of low areas at Washington. A civilian defense spokesman there called the situation critical. National Guard trucks were ordered into the area to help evacuate households.

Diane pushed into central North Carolina with ever-falling force. Her route was north-northwest toward Raleigh and the Virginia line. Her forward speed was about 12 miles an hour. Before noon her winds had fallen beneath hurricane force and her eye was becoming disorganized.

The office of North Carolina Gov. Luther Hodges said scattered and "very preliminary" reports indicated damage along the beaches was "almost miraculously light."

Adult Education Courses To Start Here August 29

Adult education courses in central Douglas County get under way this fall with a special upholstery class, starting Aug. 29. Instructor Mrs. Mae Frye will conduct the two week class in the new Community Building at the fairgrounds near Roseburg. Mrs. Frye is a regular staff member of the Eugene Vocational School. Her class will end Sept. 9.

Three classes will be taught each day during these hours: 9 a.m. to 12; 1 to 4 p.m.; and 7 to 10 p.m. A person wishing to complete the course in one week could enroll in two sessions daily, according to A.E. Director Richard Ross.

The completion of the course requires that a student take 30 hours of instruction. A moderate fee is charged.

Additional information concerning the course and the type of material needed for the classes may be secured by calling Boss at OR 3-5132 or Dick Turley at OR 6277. Registration will be made at the first class period, Boss said.

Two Vehicles Collide Head-On Near Dillard

Two vehicles collided head-on Tuesday at 12 p.m. north of Dillard on Highway 99. State police reported that a dump truck operated by Robert Porter, Roseburg, swerved into the left lane to avoid running into the automobile it was following and hit a station wagon driven by Walter Sweeney, Anaconda, Mont.

Both vehicles received smashed right front fenders. The grill on the station wagon was also damaged. Porter was cited by state police.

4-H Club Members Told To Return Entry Blanks

Douglas County 4-H Club members were reminded Wednesday by 4-H agents Jane Gates and Frank von Borstel that entry blanks for animal exhibits at the county fair should be returned before Saturday.

Purpose of the blank is to enable the agents to know: (1) how many animals will be shown; (2) get a veterinarian's check; (3) assign stalls and pens before fair time; (4) arrange meals and housing for members; and (5) know how large the fat stock auction will be.

All 4-H entries must be in place by 6 p.m. Aug. 25.

Nebraska Prison Rebellion Ended As Troops Arrive

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — A 12-hour prison rebellion at the Nebraska State Penitentiary collapsed Wednesday when armed troops and National Guardsmen marched into the cell block with orders to shoot to kill if necessary. One shot was fired accidentally. No one was hit.

Gov. Victor Anderson said about 225 prisoners who had set fire to six prison shops and spent the night smashing furniture and equipment in their cell block offered "no difficulty at all" after Warden Joseph Bovey told them to be back in their cells within two minutes or the troops would shoot.

When the troops and guardsmen marched in to the cell block they found all prisoners within their cells.

Shortly afterward Jack Stover, 64, an inmate, was carried out on a stretcher. Bovey said he had been attacked in his cell and other inmates apparently had tried to kill him, then set fire to the mattress and bedding in the cell. The governor said Stover was in such condition when officers found him that he was first thought dead.

Four or five of the prisoners involved in the rioting were among the eight prisoners who selected two guards last March and held up in the security building for 3 1/2 days before they were starved out.

Heltzel Plans To Hold Hearing On Nightcrawler

SALEM, Ore. — Public Utilities Commissioner Charles H. Heltzel announced Wednesday he would appeal to the State Supreme Court from Marion County Circuit Judge Val Sloper's ruling in the Portland traction case.

In that case, Judge Sloper ruled Saturday that the traction company can reduce its passenger service on the Portland-Oregon City line pending a hearing before Heltzel.

Heltzel contends the company can't reduce service until after a PUC hearing.

Heltzel also announced he would hold hearings in Southern Oregon soon on passenger service to that area. The Southern Pacific Railroad, despite Heltzel's order to the contrary, dropped its passenger service to that region by taking the "Rogue River" train off the run between Portland and Ashland.

He said he doesn't know just when the hearings will be held. Sloper's decision in the traction case has a direct bearing on the Southern Pacific dispute as to Heltzel's authority.

Case Of Illegal Real Estate Deals Bared; Chicagoan Gets 15-Day Sentence, \$200 Fine

Dist. Atty. Robert M. Stults today issued a warning to the public to be wary of any quick-money schemes or operations which may be outside the law.

The warning came on the heels of a district court case in which a man was convicted of acting as a real estate broker without a license.

The story of the activities of Michael (or Meyer) Chernoff, alias Marty Clayton, is still unfolding. Working for Coast-to-Coast Brokerage Corp., Chicago, Chernoff is known to have collected \$6,770 from 18 Oregon businessmen in an 11-day period, Stults said. Three cases involving \$1,375 have come to light in Douglas County.

Arraigned shortly after his arrest in Roseburg on Aug. 4, the 32-year-old Chicagoan pleaded innocent. But, in a trial before District Judge Warren A. Woodruff, the defendant was found guilty.

A fine of \$200 was imposed, and Chernoff was sentenced to 15 days in the county jail. He was given credit for 11 days already spent in jail. Attorney John H. Hall of Newport, former governor of Oregon, appeared for the defendant at the trial.

Chernoff's activities allegedly spread over several western states and 10 Oregon counties. Stults said there are now on hand for Chernoff's arrest, two warrants from Walla Walla County and one from Wasco. His sentence here will be served by Saturday.

As the result of the arrest, arrangements have been made with the company for restitution of all money collected in Josephine, Jackson and Lincoln counties.

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Third Charge Is Filed Against Floyd Wilson

A third charge in two days was filed Tuesday against a 24-year-old Camas Valley man, Floyd Dale Wilson, who was involved in a traffic accident Sunday.

A complaint of driving while intoxicated was filed by George Peck of Roseburg, the driver of a car hit by Wilson.

When arraigned in district court, Wilson pleaded innocent and was released on \$500 bail bond set by Judge Warren A. Woodruff.

Trial on the charge has been set for Aug. 29 at 2 p.m.

Corvallis Man 20th Fatality In Douglas Co.

The grim march of traffic fatalities in Douglas County continued Tuesday when a Corvallis man became the 20th victim of 1955.

Coroner L. L. (Jim) Powers said Merle A. Dilley, 66, was killed instantly when he was struck by a car driven by Donald M. Cooke, 35, Portland. The accident occurred 25 miles north of Roseburg on Highway 99 about 2:05 p.m., the coroner said.

State police said the tragedy occurred in front of the Yeater Daurone home, just north of the Rice Valley Road. They issued no citations.

According to Coroner Powers, the Dilley vehicle had been headed south to Powers when it became overheated. Dilley's daughter, Roxie, who was driving, pulled the car to the roadside. Her father crossed the highway to get some water.

On his return, he crossed the pavement in front of the Cooke vehicle which was heading south. The family told police Dilley was hard of hearing. Both car horns were honked vainly as Dilley continued on his way, apparently unaware of the oncoming vehicle.

With the Corvallis man in his car was his wife Ethel M., and another daughter, Glen.

Coroner Powers said Dilley died from multiple injuries. His body was removed to Roseburg Funeral Home. It was sent to Corvallis Wednesday.

The traffic death rate in Douglas County this year is ahead of 1954. The 20th fatality last year was recorded Oct. 30 when LeRoy Jesse Gallagher, Roseburg, was killed in a log truck crash.

The Roseburg Trades and Professions, Inc., an organization of local business people, has voted 2-1 against having all downtown stores open on Friday nights.

The action came Wednesday morning at a meeting of the group. It followed long discussion, a poll and a preliminary vote in which only 11 of the members participated.

Executive Secretary Vernon Murdoch said it will still be the personal prerogative of the individual businessman as to whether he keeps his place open Friday nights.

The organization's action will not affect openings slated in connection with display of Christmas merchandise, Murdoch added.

Back-to-school promotion plans for Saturday were discussed at the meeting. Russ Osborn, chairman of the event, reminded that there will be continuous free bus transportation from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. Saturday between downtown Roseburg and a free parking area in the vicinity of the Pine Motor Theater.

Man Pleads Innocent To Drunken Driving

A Roseburg man and woman have pleaded innocent, through their attorney, to drunkenness charges and have been released on bail.

District Judge Warren A. Woodruff set bail of \$500 on Robert Joseph Gibbon, 38, 124 N. Jackson St., and set Aug. 29 as the date of trial. Gibbon is charged with driving while intoxicated.

Bail of \$25 was set on Lois Gibbon, 30, same address, on a charge of being drunk on a public highway. Trial date is Aug. 22.

Both were arrested over the weekend by a state police officer.

Roseburg Paving Co. Bids Low On Street Job

A bid of \$3,531 by Roseburg Paving Co. for improving Cummins Street has been accepted by the Douglas County Court.

There was only one bid submitted for the work on the street, which joins the North Umpqua Road just east of Riffe Range Road in east Roseburg.

The work involves surfacing with two inches of asphalt concrete, besides grading and ditching and installation of driveways, etc.

Fire Hoses Used To Stop Mob In Buenos Aires

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP) — New disorders broke out Wednesday front of the Roman Catholic Metropolitan Cathedral on Plaza de Mayo in central Buenos Aires. Police used fire hoses to break up a demonstration. Several persons were reported arrested.

Witnesses said the disorders erupted as Catholics emerging from Mass in the cathedral began shouting anti-government slogans and were met by an antagonistic group.

The outbreak came less than 24 hours after a shaky two-month truce between the Catholic church and Argentina's dominant Peronista party apparently ended. The Catholic church is the state church in this country.

Meanwhile the Radical party, chief opposition group to President Peron's regime, introduced in Congress a demand that the government "remove any barrier" to the return of two Catholic prelates expelled from office by the government June 15.

The prelates, Bishop Manuel Tato, auxiliary bishop of Buenos Aires, and his assistant, Msgr. Ramon Novoa, were stripped of their government-paid duties on charges of inciting disorders. This was followed by the Vatican's excommunication of Peron and others who had any part in the expulsion. The day after the prelates left an unsuccessful revolt against Peron broke out.

The Peronistas' Supreme Council indicated Tuesday night its open anti-church campaign would be revived. The council issued a statement condemning "those who use religious dogma and their church as instruments of low political ends." The council added the time had come for it to resume all-out political activity.

Gallagher Rebutts Statements Made By Ex-Prisoners

NEW YORK (AP) — Sgt. James C. Gallagher, in final testimony at his military trial for murder, said Wednesday he would kick anybody he caught stealing from him or his squad—including the prosecutor.

"If you stole my clothes, I'd boot you in the fanny," he told Maj. James J. Jenkins, the prosecutor. "Stealing is stealing."

The matter arose in connection with previous testimony by Emanuel Turner, of Evans, Ky., that Gallagher kicked him down a hill because he took a pair of trousers from Gallagher's hut in a Korean POW camp.

Pressed by Jenkins as to Turner's "moon" shape and ill health at the time, Gallagher, visibly angry, said:

"Regardless of what shape he is in, if I caught him stealing something that belonged to me or my squad, I am going to boot him in the fanny for taking it."

Gallagher, 23, a tall, red-blond soldier, is accused of causing the death of three fellow American prisoners in Korea by throwing them from a hut into the cold where they died. He faces a possible life sentence if convicted.

In his final rebuttal testimony, he denied he had sold food to other prisoners. He said he didn't accuse prosecution witnesses of "deliberately lying" but said there had been a "lot of rumors" about him in camp, and "rumors and actual facts got intermingled."

Man Fined For Letting Livestock Run At Large

Everett Oscar Ross, 50, was fined \$50 and \$8 court costs in district court Tuesday after he was found guilty of permitting livestock to run at large.

A jury of three men and three women returned a unanimous verdict to Judge Warren A. Woodruff after about 20 minutes deliberation.

Ross, who lives on Rice Creek Road southwest of Dillard, pleaded innocent when he was cited into court on June 17. He was arrested after a complaint was filed by Harrison Rice.

Rice contended Ross' pigs roamed under a fence and tore up a clover field.

Mrs. Daniels Takes Over Riddle Recorder Post
Mrs. E. E. Daniels, city treasurer for several years, Tuesday night became Riddle's new city recorder. She succeeds Mrs. Ruth Gelling, who resigned last week.

Succeeding Mrs. Daniels as treasurer is E. E. Daniels, member of a Riddle accounting firm. Both will complete unexpired terms.

Up for consideration also for the appointment of recorder was Mrs. Orval Tull. But it was found she was not legally qualified, reports correspondent Mrs. Irma Best.

The appointments were made Tuesday night at a special City Council meeting.
