

Black Sox Win 19 Straight, Rally In 9th Beats Coos Bay

Drain's Black Sox established themselves as mythical Southern Oregon semi-pro baseball champions Wednesday evening after edging the Coos Bay-North Bend Lumberjacks 4-3 with a two-run ninth inning rally.

The Sox won their 19th straight contest of the season for an overall record of 31-4 and gained revenge for an earlier season 1-9 pasting by the CB-NB team.

Record Tops
Drain, which closes its season games against Bend and Bandon on successive weekends, has now lost only to the Lumberjacks, the Eugene Emeralds and two games to the Coquille Loggers.

Bobby Bub was the hero of Wednesday night's ball game, clutching in the bottom of the ninth with two out and men on second and third.

The Sox went into the ninth trailing 3-2. Pat Wehlers opened the inning with a flyout.

The rally started when Jerry Rottendorf took first on a walk and was singled to second by Ted Wilson. Pinch hitter Dick Olson then hit to the shortstop, whose only play was to first base, advancing both the base runners.

Bub then hit hard off the second baseman's glove into center field to score both runners.

Cade Whiffs 11
Left-hander Jerry Cade went the distance for the Sox, striking out 11 and walking six. His opponent, Ron Webb, fanned five Sox and walked three.

Drain opened the game's scoring in the sixth inning, taking a 1-0 lead. But the visitors registered twice in the seventh and once in the top of the eighth for a 3-1 margin. Drain cut it to 3-2 with a one-run eighth.

Vern Marshall, who shared hitting honors with catcher Bill Beard on three hits in four times at bat, opened the sixth with a base hit. Glenn Stetter took a bases on balls and Beard singled Marshall home.

Coos Bay Ahead
Coos Bay went ahead 2-1 in the seventh as pitcher Dick Allison doubled, Webb sacrificed, Ken Jensen doubled Allison home, Jensen advanced to second on an infield out and scored on John Kovens' safety.

In the CB-NB eighth a wild throw figured in the scoring. Jay Ragni singled and then toured the bases on the next play when Wenders' infield ball was played from third to first. With the third base

man out of position, the fleet-footed Ragni streaked past second on the fielder's choice and into third. A relay to the uncovered bag at third to try to get the runner went astray and Ragni registered.

Drain narrowed the margin to 3-2 in the eighth. Marshall again started the rummaging with a base hit. He was forced at second by Stetter and the latter advanced

Roseburg Open Qualifying Rounds Starting On Friday

Numerous post entries are expected for the \$3,200 Roseburg Open Golf Tournament which gets under way with 18 holes of play Friday afternoon.

The meet continues with 18 additional qualifying holes on Saturday and the 36-hole finals Sunday. About 100 of the Northwest's top professionals and amateurs will be vying in the biggest money-paying privately-sponsored tournament held in either Oregon or Washington this year.

After having held that enviable status for the past two tournaments, the current test figures to again draw the cream of pros from both Northwest states. Listed among the certain entries are Tom Boucher, Wally Walla; Joe Greer, Yakima; and Al Feldman, Tacoma, all high finishers in last year's tourney.

The three, led by Boucher, rate the favorite's tag this year if neither defending champion Al Zimmerman of Phoenix, Ariz., nor 1953 champion Bob Duden of Portland

participate. Both were late entries last year, and their return to the Roseburg Country Club site for this year's tournament will come as no surprise.

Duden won the 1953 tourney with a 15-under par 273, but Zimmerman bettered that mark with a 270 last year. Duden's 18-hole of 62 is still the best in that phase of past tournaments. Zimmerman fired rounds of 68-67-68-67 for the par 72 layout last year to win nine strokes over his nearest rival, Boucher.

Duden's winning margin over second place Bob Harris of San Jose, Calif., in 1953 was eight strokes.

With defending amateur George Beecher still an uncertain entry, 1953 lister Sid Milligan of Eugene and Medford's George Harrington share the favorites' role among the non-pay ranks. Harrington has won the Roseburg Invitational Tournament each spring for the last two years and finds the nine-hole layout favorable.

Beecher paced the amateur field with a 289 last year, one stroke over the 290 par for 72 holes. Milligan won in 1953 with 302. Harrington was third last year with 291.

Beecher, one of the shining lights in Northwest amateur golf this year, is still a questionable entry because of illness. He is from Ontario in Eastern Oregon.

The field will contend in four divisions this year. Pros and amateurs over 50 years of age will contend in the senior divisions. The pros will split the \$2,600 prize money and amateurs contend for the rest of prizes.

Leading figures in the senior divisions figure to be Hugh Starkweather of Medford, Joe Moezel and Ted Longworth of Portland in the pro bracket and local golfer Maurice Hallmark in the amateur field.

Neither a swimming meet nor any other form of swimming entertainment will be held this summer as part of the Southern Oregon Invitational Swim Meet which has been held in Roseburg for the past six years.

It was originally announced several weeks ago that the swim meet had been called off because of a lack of local interest by participants. It then was announced that an adequate number of synchronized swimmers might be held.

But the turnouts locally for both events were so discouraging that Roseburg Municipal Pool Director Mike Popovich recommended discarding the entire idea of a swim meet this summer to a Roseburg Junior Chamber of Commerce committee.

The event usually has been held for the past six years on the third weekend of August, drawing many of the top swim clubs in Oregon. Last year, St. Helens and Salem swim teams swept away most of the ribbon awards.

Scheidel, Cross Named Captains
PORTLAND — Neal Scheidel, halfback from South Salem, and Freeman Cross, tackle from Primeville, will be co-captains of the State team in the annual Shrine football game with the Portland area All Stars Saturday night.
