Favorite Hits 310-Yard Shot

Bob Duden, who returns for a third whack at the top apple in the \$3,200 Roseburg Open, getting under way today, impressed on-lookers at the Roseburg Country Club Thursday evening, after winning the day's long-driving contest. Duden carried away \$25 first prize money after a 310-yard effort.

Winners of second place money of \$15 apiece were Bunny Mason of Salem and Bill Eggers, unattached golfer from Portland. Top amateur honors were taken by Dr. Byron Woodruff of Roseburg.

The crowd at the clubhouse was treated to a clinic of golf shots by pros Duden; Tom Boucher, Walla Walla; Len Strup, Walla Walla; Tom Marlowe and Fielding Abbott, both Portland, and Vern Martin, Corvallis.

Field Ties Off With the complete field having teed off for 18 holes by 2 p.m. after an 8 a.m. start, the total entry list may have swelled to 100. There were 92 entries by Thursday evening, including 31 professionals, five senior pros, 46 amateurs and 10 senior amateurs.

Money and prizes in the \$3,200 pot will be split up among the four divisions with the pros getting about \$2,000 of it.

With late entries quite firmly established and defending pro champion Al Zimmerman of Phoenix not included in the field, there was considerable jockeying for prize money and favored roles.

Duden and late entry Okie Eliason, the Northwest Open champ from Seattle, were rated the top choices to win. Last year's runner-up, Boucher, Joe Greer of Yakima and Al Feldman of Tacoma were given the best chance outside the top two if either of them failed.

Two amateurs, division, it was last year's runner-up, Bob Gasper of Cottage Grove, and Benny Hughes of Portland, the national public links tourney champion of past years, who had equal support.

Two other late pro entries from California were Mel Babics of Eureka and Dave Martin of San Jose, according to host pro Eddie Oldfield.

Qualifying will continue through Saturday over 18 holes with the 36-hole finals scheduled Sunday.

Public attendance is invited to the entire tournament at no admission charge.

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CO-FAVORITES in pro and amateur divisions of the \$3,200 Roseburg Open Golf Tournament which got under way today were professional Bob Duden (below), 1953 champion, and Bob Gasper, 1954 amateur runner-up from Cottage Grove, Duden, along with Ookie Eliason, the 1955 Northwest Open Champ from Washington, are co-favorites to capture tourney title.

Sidelineer

There is hope for reviving the Southern Oregon Invitational Swim Meet to its original standing and purpose in future years if the plans of Roseburg Municipal Pool Director Mike Popovich and the Roseburg Junior Chamber of Commerce materialize.

The meet, originally scheduled for this weekend and an annual event for the past six years in Roseburg, was forced to the sidelines this summer as a result of what was called "a general disinterest toward competitive swimming by local boys and girls."

Both Popovich and the Jaycees, the latter sponsors in years past, were very understanding of the situation, however.

IT HAS NOT been easy for local swimmers to compete against year-around swim clubs which entered the meet and then to be "too perfect" hosts and lose every race. Last year, things reached a head when only a small number of local participants raced while the visiting Salem and St. Helens swim clubs dominated the meet.

After the swim meet had been cancelled in mid-summer an aquacade of sorts was suggested as a substitute. But this idea, too, was discarded with only limited time left to plan it.

Bob Popovich and Bob Blackwell concurred that losing all the awards to the visitors was tougher on the competitive spirit of the local youth than all the good that was coming from the meet.

"Should we beat our heads against the wall because it feels so good when we stop?" The answer was obvious; so the two interested parties came up with some likely solutions.

THE JAYCEES would like to see this aquacade idea developed next year. "We feel by this change to a 'watercade' that we would be doing something with local interest and local participants for local people," obliged Blackwell.

Popovich would like to see the beginnings of competitive swimming through inter-city competition. These races could be run off between aquacade acts by local entrants only.

"Maybe we can build the thing up to where we have competitive swimming with outside clubs again," both agreed.

The 1 1/2 month training season which the locals can salvage each summer will continue to be a handicap compared to the 12-month a year indoor swimming of the up and down states. But the intracity

An attractive semifinal over the best of three falls or 30-minute route pits Macera against the Catalina Kid, George Drake. The latter has adopted an aggressive and rugged wrestling style and used it to good advantage last week in beating Henry Lenz.

Macera, who is very popular here because of his fiery and aggressive style, will be favored to get back into the win column in this one, but the battle figures to develop into a real tussle.

Gerry Guerrero returns to tackle Swedish Thor Hazen in the opening match. This one will go 20 minutes or one fall. Guerrero appeared in two TV matches last Friday on a film from Hollywood and the other a live match on channel six in Portland.

Putts Go Awry But Carole Wins

FLORENCE, S.C.—Two teenagers far from home, Carole Jo Kahler of Roseburg, Ore., and Joanne Gunderson of Kirkland, Wash., met here Friday in an 18-hole match for the U.S. Golf Assn. girls' junior championship.

Each registered a 2 and 1 victory in Thursday's semifinals. Carole Jo, whose awkward-appearing swing belies the strength of her game, eliminated Betty Cullen of Tulsa, Okla., and Joanne prevailed over Anne Quast of Marysville, Wash.

Miss Kahler, women's and junior tournament winner in Oregon this year, missed seven putts of eight feet or under, but still was only two over par for the 17 holes around the Florence Country Club course, which has a tournament par of 74 and runs 6,053 yards.

Last weekend she set a girls' competitive record 71 here in a warm-up event for the national meet.

Against Miss Cullen, Carole Jo was out in par 38 and 4 up. She won the 10th, then lost the next three before putting down her opponent's rally to win fairly well in hand.

Miss Gunderson made it two victories in a week over Anne Quast whom she defeated as Western junior champion in a 21-hole final battle at Lake Geneva, Wis., a week ago. Anne, who reached the second round of the national tournament three years ago, won the sixth and ninth holes to turn even, but her state rival won 10 and 12 to go ahead to play.

Miss Kahler, beaten in the first round last year by Wilkie Smith who went on to take the title, has played 76 holes in winning her five matches. Six more than Miss Gunderson. Both finalists are entered in next week's National Amateur for women at Charlotte, N.C.

Progress Good On Fish Ladder

Steelhead and salmon will find the South Umpqua falls mighty easy this fall and winter if all goes well on the fishway now under construction.

According to George Kernan, chief engineer, Oregon Game Commission, low water flows have favored construction and the Toller Construction Co. of Portland, contractors on the job, have been progressing well ahead of schedule.

All excavation and forms for the concrete fish ladder have been completed with the reinforcement steel now being installed. The first concrete will be poured within the week. Construction of the ladder will be completed before high water this fall.

South Umpqua falls has long been a stumbling block for migrating fish. Only at certain stages of water flow were steelhead, salmon, and other fish able to pass. During extreme low flows all fish were forced to remain below the falls, seriously reducing the number which were able to spawn successfully.

The new ladder will allow passage at all stages of water flow, enabling fish to reach the vast spawning reaches to the headwaters.

MOVES INSIDE
