Newspaper Asks For Removal Of Prison Director

WALLA WALLA (AP)—A suggestion that the state director of institutions be removed was made here Wednesday as one of many developing aftermaths of Sunday's abortive riot at the state penitentiary.

Directing its editorial fire at Dr. Thomas A. Harris, a University of Arkansas psychiatrist who took the \$20,000-a-year job as director of institutions in June, The Walla Walla Union-Bulletin suggested that after two uprisings in six weeks "it might help" if Gov. Langlie "would send Dr. Harris back where he came from."

Langlie, reached at Seattle, would not comment on the suggestion. He said he felt "something is wrong" at the prison, however, and promised an investigation.

"We have some babies at the prison who are just too tough to handle," he said.

In other developments: Warden Lawrence Delmore Jr., who led armed guards into the prison to break up Sunday's riot, identified eight convicts he said "actively participated" in the disturbance during which 15 officers were taken as hostages. Previously it was reported 12 prisoners were involved and estimates of the number of hostages ranged from nine to 14.

At Yakima, Sheriff Bert Guns said he asked the state to transfer elsewhere 15 convicts shifted to the Yakima County jail after the July 3-6 rebellion at the penitentiary. He said he requested the transfer because he felt the state was "sitting on its hands" in providing new quarters for the 15 at the Eastern State Hospital at Medical Lake.

The 15 were brought back here and placed in segregation two days before Sunday's trouble.

Alabama Releasing Bears In Forested Areas

SALEM (AP)—Noting that Alabama is releasing bears in its forests so it can have a bear population, the Oregon Forestry Department said Thursday it would like to send all Oregon black bears to Alabama.

If Alabama would pay the freight, that is.

Public and private forest agencies in Oregon now are carrying on a project to reduce the number of bears, 100 having been killed in the past 12 months.

Foresters blame the bears for much tree damage.

They think Alabama is going to be mighty sorry.

Icy Strait Beats Back Another Challenger

VICTORIA, B.C. (AP)—The icy waters of Juan de Fuca beat back another challenger Thursday as deaf-mute Douglas Rivette was pulled from the water 2 hours and 32 minutes after setting out from here for Port Angeles, Wash.

The linotype operator from Midland, Ont., and Vancouver indicated his first attempt to swim the 18.3-mile stretch of water between Victoria and Port Angeles would be his last.

"Fresh water for me from now on," he scrawled on a slate after being pulled from the water at 7:17 a.m. "My body is warm but my arms and legs are numb."

Meanwhile two other swimmers, Johnny Flower and Bill Muir, both of Victoria, expect to tackle the strait this weekend in an attempt to beat the time of 11 hours, 10 minutes set July 8, by Bert Thomas of Tacoma, Wash., first and only swimmer to conquer the strait.

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
