She laughed and chatted merrily and seemed untroubled by world-wide speculation on whether she will now marry Group Capt. Peter Townsend, handsome 40-year-old wartime pilot and divorced father of two children.

Queen Elizabeth II at the wheel of a big black limousine, left the castle a few minutes before her younger sister.

Birthday cards and telegrams by the thousands poured into Balmoral and British National newspapers commenting on the romance rumors were sympathetic.

Most of the royal family was at Balmoral for Sunday festivities. There was no doubt the fateful birthday has whetted interest in the royal family beyond all expectations. At 25 Margaret will be free to marry — if she wishes — Peter Townsend, handsome 40-year-old wartime pilot and divorced father of two children.

On all lips was the unanswered question: Will she or won't she? The bazaar, organized by Queen Mother Elizabeth to raise money for the nearby Crathie Church, was set up at Aberglorie Castle near the royal summer residence of Balmoral Castle. It is expected to draw some 10,000 visitors, particularly in view of the impending birthday.

Margaret helped supervise the setting up of stalls on the castle lawn yesterday. Her appearance at the bazaar was expected but not guaranteed.

Meanwhile, speculation over Margaret's plans for the future has been rampant throughout Britain. British reporters, keeping tabs on Townsend in Belgium where he is British air attaché, made much of the fact he summoned his two sons to visit him at seaside Mariakerke.

They hinted broadly he wanted to tell them they soon will have the Princess for a stepmother.

Eisenhower Takes Pleasure In Coaching His Grandson On Arts Of Golf And Fishing

FRASER, Colo. (AP) — Watching a grandchild play golf, David Eisenhower took a lot of pleasure in coaching his grandson on the arts of golf and fishing.

With grandfather spouting a constant stream of advice, David banged away about 15 minutes at a chip net target up about 20 yards off.

The youngster managed to miss the target nearly every time, but came close enough once or twice to win the President's praise. Once after a good shot the President called enthusiastically:

"That's right. Hit it like that and it'll go a country mile."

When they arrived at the ranch David was dressed in true Western style — a checked flannel shirt, a cowboy hat, a blue jacket and a blue jeans shirt. The President was just as informal in a wide-brimmed Western hat, sports shirt with bright red, yellow and brown checks, tan slacks and rust shade lester style slippers.

Eisenhower was wearing a golf club in front of his cottage, and he suggested that the newsmen might like to see a bit of David's golf.

David was willing and he promptly hauled out a set of junior size clubs given to him at Christmas 1953 by former champion Bobby Jones.

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BLM Slates Sale Of Eight Million Feet Of Timber

The Bureau of Land Management office in Roseburg has scheduled sale of more than eight million board feet of timber Sept. 12, and the Forest Service has listed a sale Sept. 12 for 2,410,000 board feet.

The BLM sale includes four tracts containing 8,170,000 board feet and appraised at \$191,641.15. An O & G tract containing 1,994,000 board feet of Douglas fir is appraised at \$53,511.50. Douglas fir is appraised at \$24.05. It is located east of Glide.

Another tract, located north of Elkton, is salvage and will be sold by sealed bid. It contains 3,132,000 board feet of Douglas fir appraised at \$24.15. Total appraised price is \$75,784.30.

Other sealed bids will be received for green timber east of Myrtle Creek. It contains 2,255,000 board feet of Douglas fir appraised at \$23.35. Total appraised price is \$52,910.20.

Oral bids will be received for green-public domain timber amounting to 187,000 board feet. The 170,000 feet of Douglas fir is appraised at \$23.80. Total appraised price is \$4,135.25.

The Forest Service meanwhile has slated a sale Sept. 12 for Limpqua Forest timber in the Steamboat area. The tract contains 2,200,000 board feet of Douglas fir appraised at \$28.45 per thousand.

But two of the hits off Adams were consecutive doubles in the first inning by Harvey Zernia and Jerry Zuvela for the Rainiers' lone run. Adams was in trouble in the eighth when Leo Riehlert's single and errors by Jim Robertson and Artie Wilson loaded the bases. But he got the next two batters out on grounders to end the inning.

Grandstand Work Showing Progress

First signs of the actual structure of the new Finlay Field football grandstand being erected will be evident by next week is the word of Indian Club officials.

Building committee chairman Bob Dishman reports that "quite a bit of concrete was poured Friday and we expect to have that pretty well whinned by Monday."

Ideal Concrete is handling that phase of the work in the construction of the new 1,200 seat edifice. The carpenter crew is expected to begin building the main trusses next week. Henceforth, a noticeable difference in the structure is expected every few days.

The use of donated labor will begin in about two or three weeks when seating will be constructed. Bill Garrison, secretary-treasurer of the Indian Club informs that anyone wishing to help in the evenings when donated labor is used should contact any member of the Indian Club. Those persons will then be contacted when their services can be used.

Garrison reports the ticket-selling drive to collect funds for the building of the grandstand to be "progressing more rapidly than ever." Close to 34,500 has been collected so far with contributions arriving in both large and small sums.

Season tickets for the Roseburg High school team's 1955 schedule will go on sale soon. These persons holding preference cards will be entitled to new grandstand seating.

Indian Club members are hopeful of completing the project by the first game, Sept. 9. Anyone wishing to watch the progress of building is welcome to do so at Finlay Field.

Russians To Free Three Americans

WASHINGTON (AP) — Russia has notified the United States that three Americans held in the Soviet Union, including two soldiers missing for seven years, will be released, the State Department announced Saturday.

One of the three, named by the Soviet Foreign Office as Frederick Charles Hopkins, could not be identified by the State Department from available records. The two soldiers were named in the announcement as:

Wilfred C. Crumlish, U.S. Army private, whose next of kin is Mrs. Mary Crumlish, Amesbury, Mass. He has been missing from his military intelligence unit at Vienna, Austria, since March 24, 1948.

Murray Fields, U.S. Army private missing from his unit (presumably stationed in Germany) since June 2, 1945. His next of kin is Mrs. Herman Bailes, 69, Bay-side, N.Y.

Search Plane Hit By Allied Shell

SEOUL (AP) — The U. S. 5th Air Force said Saturday a C47 search plane, hit by an exploding shell Thursday, "was not subjected to enemy fire." It "presumably" was hit accidentally by allied artillery.

The transport was searching for a training plane shot down earlier by Communist anti-aircraft fire. The training plane crashed in Communist territory with Air Force 2nd Lt. Guy H. Bumpass of Jackson, Miss., and Army Capt. Charles W. Brown of Clay, Ky.

The U. S. command will press a demand for the flight's return at a meeting of the Military Armistices Commission set for Sunday (5 p.m. PST Saturday).

The Air Force statement Saturday said the search plane "was flying in the vicinity of a friendly ground practice artillery firing range when it was hit." This was 16 miles south of the demilitarized zone between South and North Korea.

Mrs. Emma Carr Passes Suddenly In Sutherlin
Mrs. Emma Carr died suddenly at her home Saturday morning. She had lived in Sutherlin since 1909.

Mrs. Carr was born at Mishawaka, Ind. on Oct. 8, 1881. She was married to Cecil Carr, May 30, 1899.

Her children include two sons, Ernest H. Carr of San Francisco, Calif., and Richard Carr, Sutherlin; and two daughters, Mrs. Doris Krewson, Sutherlin and Mrs. Nadine Stearns of Oakland. Four grandchildren and one great grandchild also survive.

The body has been moved to Stearns and Little Mortuary in Oakland. Funeral arrangements await the arrival of relatives.

Washington State Police Car Blasted

BURLINGTON, Wash. (AP) — Two automobiles, one a State Patrol vehicle, were blasted into ruin as they stood parked only 12 feet from a state patrolman's home near here early Saturday morning.

State Patrolman Arlie Harrison, his wife and their two small daughters were not injured in the explosion which shook — but did not damage — their home.

Harrison was at a loss to explain the "two distinct explosions" which left his car a tangled piece of metal and all but completely destroyed the State Patrol car.

State Patrol officers and the Skagit County sheriff's office started an immediate investigation of the incident, which followed only by three weeks the dynamiting of a State Patrol weighing station near Sedro Woolley.

Portland Commission Ponders Buying Track

PORTLAND (AP) — The Portland recreation-exposition commission is considering a proposal that it buy the Portland Meadows race track and lease it to horse and dog race operators.

John Carson, a member of the commission, said at a meeting Thursday that the track, adjoining East Vanport, could be purchased for slightly more than a million dollars. He told fellow commissioners that the present owners wanted an answer to the offer soon. They gave Carson until Sept. 30 to submit a detailed proposal.

Carson wants to tie the race track purchase into selection of the East Vanport site north of Portland as the sports-recreation center for which 8 million dollars was voted last year. But there has been strong sentiment for locating the center at a downtown site.

U. S., Red China Adjourn Without Reaching Accord

GENEVA (AP) — U.S. and Red Chinese representatives adjourned their meeting again Saturday without reaching agreement on the repatriation of 41 Americans detained in Red China.

It was the ninth meeting between U.S. Ambassador U. Alexis Johnson and the Red Chinese envoy, Wang Ping-nan.

A brief announcement after the session disclosed only that the two delegations were still bogged down on the first agenda item concerning the return of civilians of both sides to their respective countries.

Not until some agreement is reached on this point can the ambassadors proceed to the discussion of the second item, "other practical matters at issue between the two sides."

The next meeting was set for Tuesday.

Child Dies, 2 Recover From Refrigerator Trap

STEEPLEVILLE, Ala. (AP) — A large electric refrigerator from which the food had been removed was a death trap Friday for a baby boy, but his two sisters were revived.

Coroner Grady Moss said Jerry O'Neal Burns, 19 months, was dead upon arrival at a nearby clinic. Geraldine Burns, 10, and Elaine, 6, revived when fresh air reached their lungs.

Moss said the children were left at their farm home while the parents looked in a field. He said Terry Odell Burns, twin of the dead boy, apparently closed the door on the three after they crawled inside.

The mother, Mrs. James O. Burns, found them when she fired the food was out of the refrigerator.

Giants 49ers Meet

SEATTLE (AP) — The San Francisco 49ers and the New York Giants collided head-on in an exhibition game here Saturday, the first look Seattle has ever had at big-time professional football.

Don Heinrich, who gained All-America standing at the University of Washington, was named by coach Jim Lee Howell to start as quarterback for the Giants.

Lining up with Heinrich in the New York backfield were Frank Gifford, Kyle Rote and Eddie Price.

Portland Minister Will Hold Sutherlin Services

The Rev. Mr. Harold V. Myers, pastor of St. Paul's Episcopal Parish, Portland, will conduct the evening prayer and give the sermon at the Legion Hall in Sutherlin, Sunday at 7 p.m. for members of the Holy Spirit Episcopal Mission.

At 9 a.m. the Rev. Mr. Myers will preach at St. David's Episcopal Mission at the Drain (Cedar) school. Prior to 1940, the Rev. Mr. Myers was the pastor of the First Methodist Church in Drain.

Air Force Commander Killed in Jet Crash

WENDOVER AIR FORCE BASE, Utah (AP) — An F8H jet fighter crashed in the barren western Utah desert near here early Saturday scattering wreckage 500 yards and killing the commander of Clovis, N.M. Air Force Base.

He was Col. H.H. (Hank) Norman, 38 of Hardy, Ark.

He was graduated from West Point in 1940. He was a veteran of the African campaign in World War II and was a prisoner of war. He had been at Clovis since last October.

Double Shifting Planned At Dillard Elementary

Both double shifting and pre-school physical examinations drew comment today from C. A. Dye, principal of Dillard Elementary School.

Southern Pacific Plans To Build Freight Cars

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — A plan to buy or construct 2,725 new freight cars was announced Thursday by the Southern Pacific Railroad.

D. J. Russell, vice president, said the program will cost more than 23 million dollars. He said the railroad now has acquired or ordered some 47,000 cars, more than 28,000 of them boxcars, since World War II.

Most of the new cars will be built in the S.P.'s Sacramento shops, Russell said. He added that deliveries are expected to start this fall and continue through next year.

Elkton School To Open Sept. 12, Says Board

Elkton schools will open Sept. 12, reports school board member Eugene Fisher.

It is now well established that the male also is subject to the same neuro-endocrine imbalance which occurs in women during the menopause. That is, men also goes through "change of life."
