

Walla Walla Pro Equals Record Of 62 Champion Carole Jo Eyes Bigger Stakes

Oldfield Cards 67; Hallmark Sets Senior Amateur Pace

A record-equaling 18-hole round of 62 strokes by tall Tom Boucher of Walla Walla, Wash., snagged most of the attention as a strong field of pro and amateur linksmen opened play in the third annual Roseburg Open golf tournament Friday.

Boucher equaled the mark set in 1933 by Bob Duden, nailing eight birdies, one eagle and nine pars en route. His score put him four strokes ahead of his nearest rival, Duden, while Roseburg pro Eddie Oldfield held on to third place in the pro field with a round of 67.

Second place in the tournament and leader among the amateurs was Woody Ball, golfer from Colwood Golf Course in Portland. Ball fired a 65 to top the simon-pure field.

In all, 14 contestants busted par of 72 and four equaled regulation figures from the bulky field of 101 entries in the third annual tournament.

Leading the senior pro division of the tournament was Joe Mozel of Lloyd's Golf Course of Portland with a round of 37-66. Roseburg's Maurice Hallmark took over the lead in the senior amateur division with 40-35-75 round.

Contestants will fire 18 holes Saturday to qualify in Sunday's 36-hole finals. The field will be trimmed for Sunday's finals to a size suitable for 36 holes of golf by each contestant.

Professionals Tom Marlowe of Eastmoreland and Eddie Hogan of Riverside, both of Portland, Mel Babica of Eureka and Bobby Linton of Vancouver, Wash., trailed the leaders in the pro field with 70's.

There were five contestants tied at 71, including Roseburg amateur Joe Perrault who was third in the amateur field.

Sans Bogey
Boucher toured the course without a bogey. He birdied three holes on the first nine and took an eagle three on the 510-yard fifth hole. On the back nine he connected with five birdies and four pars to equal Duden's 1933 record.

When Duden first set the record he went around in 32-39 including a hole-in-one on the final nine.

Boucher was hitting the greens, connecting on 17 of them. He took 27 putts for the 18 holes, sinking among them 15-footers on the 13th and 17 holes.

On the 285-yard par four 12th hole he drove the green and two-putted for a birdie.

A Dark Horse
Boucher, along with Al Feldman of Tacoma was listed as a pre-tournament dark horse. But he had a substantial lead over pre-tournament favorite Ocky Elison of Tacoma who fired a miserable 37-40-77.

Boucher tees off at 1:31 Saturday with Benny Hughes of Eastmoreland and Kent Myers of Salem. Duden goes out at 1:10 with Carl Schmidt of Medford and Perrault. Oldfield's round begins at 9:55 a.m. with Bob Patterson of Colwood and Bob Norquist of Columbia while Ball's round starts at 12:49 with Marsh Smith of Roseburg and Bunny Mason of Salem.

The spirit of the Country Club was in a holiday mood as word was received of Carole Jo Kabler's national championship in the East. It was the largest and most colorful field to open a local tournament with eight entries from California and 11 from Washington spicing the field.

First round lap money went to Boucher for his 31 first nine and to Eddie Hogan who took a 32 on the second round.

Boucher's scorecard read 348 424-334 — 433 354 324.

Robin Roberts pitched the National League back into the headlines last night — shoving the American League race into the shadows for the moment — as he matched the record of four modern-era baseball immortals by winning 20 games in six consecutive seasons.

To do it, the Philadelphia ace out-dueled Brooklyn's big Don Newcombe for the second time in six days, beating the league-leading Dodgers 3-2.

Only Lefty Grove, Christy Mathewson, Walter Johnson and Mordecai (Three Finger) Brown—all Hall of Famers—had managed the six year success since 1950. The battle between Roberts and Newcombe (18-4) at Philadelphia and its record-equaling climax took the play from the AL scrap, which

remained unchanged as all four contenders won.

New York's Yankees maintained a full game lead over Chicago and Cleveland by whipping Baltimore 8-0 behind Whitey Ford's two-hitter. The White Sox stayed three percentage points up on Cleveland by defeating Detroit 3-0 while the Indians went 11 innings to edge Kansas City 2-1.

Boston, still 3 1/2 games shy, walked Washington 8-0.

Roberts, the meticulous right-hander combined his usual control with tight fielding support and some luck to win No. 20. He walked only one, but gave seven hits—

one on Campanella's 27th homer—and needed three double-plays to hold Brooklyn's lead to 2-0 going into the eighth.

Ten Newcombs, beaten by the same score by Roberts last Sunday, gave way. After checking the Phils on two hits and retiring 15 men in order, the Dodger right-hander was smacked for singles by Eddie Waitkus, Jim Greengrass and Andy Seminick and his lead was trimmed to 2-1.

In the ninth, Newk didn't even get a man out, and enabled the tying run to score on his own throwing error. Then Willie Jones laced a single to left, driving in the winning run and handing Newk who didn't walk a batter, his fourth loss in a row.

The 29-year-old Roberts, who

came up in 1948 and since 1950 has won 20, 21, 28, 23 and 23, made it tough all around for Newcombe. The Dodger ace, a hitter in his own right, fanned twice.

The Yankees bombed Baltimore with home runs by Gil McDougald and Mickey Mantle (his 31st) for a 2-0 lead in the first. Only Dave Philley's great stab saved Jim Wilson from giving up three homers in succession as Yogi Berra lined one toward the right field stands between the McDougald and Mantle blasts.

Billy Pierce brought the White Sox home safe, holding the Tigers on six hits while striking out six and walked one while Walt Dropp delivered a two-run homer off Steve Gromek in the fourth. The Tigers now are 10 1/2 games behind.

The Indians stayed on pace as Don Mossi and Ray Narleski saved the day. Mossi relieved Mike Garcia with none out and runners on third and first in the 11th. He fanned Harry Simpson. Narleski then fanned Hec Lopez and got Jim Fingen on a force out to end the A's threat. Hal Naragon's lead-off single against reliever Tom

Summer steelhead fishing has picked up in the Steamboat area but has been slow elsewhere. In most of the Cascade Lakes the customary pattern of slow fishing in August has been noted. Most sections of the Rogue have been fair to good for trout angling.

Joanne held her even though the next 10 holes, but the damage had been done. At the turn Carole Jo was one over par with a 29 and 3-up as only two of the nine holes were halved. A winning par four on No. 15 closed out the match for the Oregon girl, who holds her state women's and junior titles.
