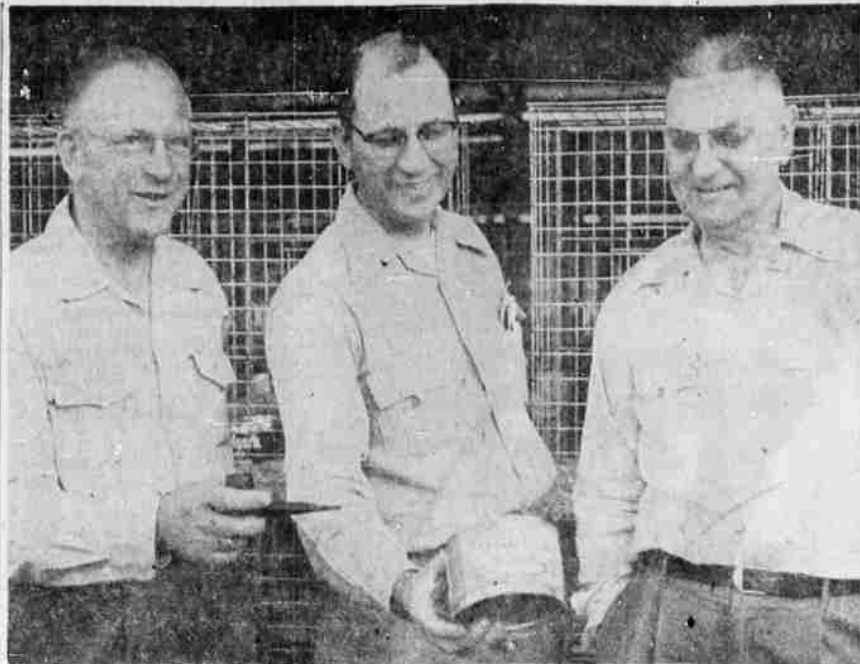

5-Stage Power Project Approved For Canada Town

ATLIN, B.C. — A five-stage industrial power project, largest ever attempted by a private company anywhere in the world, has been approved by the 200 residents of this gold-mining town in the northwest corner of Canada.

They gave their approval Tuesday, but the news was delayed as storms chopped at the communication systems along the Yukon and Alaska borders.

The \$750,000,000 project, proposed by Northwest Power Industries Ltd.—a subsidiary of Pro-bisher—will harness the huge watershed of the Yukon and raise the level of Atlin Lake 20 feet.

The decision to accept the multi-million dollar hydro-electric and industrial empire on their doorstep came on the eve of Discovery Day—the 58th anniversary of the finding of the glittering gold nugget which drew thousands to the Klondike.

No opposition to the plan was offered at the open hearing here—a hearing which has been adjourned to resume later this year in Victoria.

Northwest Power's application calls for a water licence covering the 60,000-square-mile drainage system, second in North America only to the Great Lakes system.

Main question asked at the meeting concerned the future townsites and the community was advised to approach the provincial government with reference to the allocation of land.

Most likely site suggested adjoined the town limits.

Health Service To Start Moving Housing Units

WASHINGTON — The Public Health Service will soon begin moving some 250 prefabricated housing units from Camp Pickett, Va., for use by its Indian division doctors in Western states.

Six units will go to the state of Washington for use at Colville.

Officials said the moving job will be one of the biggest of its kind on record. It is expected to cost about 4 million dollars.

The houses, 3-bedroom family units formerly used by Army personnel, will be dismantled for shipping, then reassembled at the sites.

The need for the housing lies in the fact that the service has almost doubled the number of doctors in its Indian division since it took over this work from the Indian Bureau on July 1.

At that time there were 114 doctors attached to Indian Bureau hospitals and clinics. The Public Health Service has increased that number by 86 and will add 6 more next month.

Idaho will receive two of the units for Fort Hall and one for Fort Lapwal.

Damages For Injuries From Explosion Asked

A Myrtle Creek man, Ray Shelton, has filed a complaint in circuit court at Roseburg, asking additional compensation for injuries received in a dynamite explosion.

Shelton seeks to have the State Industrial Accident Commission award compensation for permanent partial disability in line with 100 per cent loss of use of an arm, for back, head and teeth injuries; 100 per cent loss of vision to left eye; 15 per cent loss of vision to right eye; 25 per cent loss of use of right leg, and 15 per cent loss of function of right arm.

The commission now allows 25 per cent of an arm, 100 per cent on left eye and 10 per cent for right leg.

Shelton, 43, was thrown about 100 feet by the explosion on Aug. 18, 1954, while working for Upco Logging Co., east of Canyonville.

150 Elementary Teachers Will Attend Workshop

Approximately 150 elementary teachers will attend a workshop on "audio visual aids" at the Myrtle Creek Elementary School sponsored by the Myrtle Creek Public Schools August 29.

Milton Grassell, asst. prof. of visual instruction for General Extension Division will coordinate the program. He will also instruct a follow-up course in audio-visual aids for three hours.

The class will be held at the elementary school and run for 13 meetings beginning the week of Sept. 26.

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Death Penalty Sought For Slayer Of Officer

CHICAGO — The State has indicated it will seek the death penalty for police slayer Richard Carpenter.

State's Atty. John Gulknecht said Friday: "The state's demand will fit the crime."

Carpenter, 35, was hooked on charges of murder and assault to kill in the death of Detective William Murphy and the wounding of Policeman Clarence Kerr.

A coroner's inquest in Murphy's death will be held Monday. The case is expected to go before the grand jury Aug. 31.

Murphy was killed in a gunfight with Carpenter Monday night at the subway station at Roosevelt Rd. and State St. Kerr was seriously wounded Wednesday night in a theatre on Chicago's northwest side. Both officers were trying to arrest Carpenter.

Business People Pick Beans To Save Crop

SILVERTON — Almost 20,000 pounds of beans were picked Friday by some 200 businessmen and their wives who pitched in to save the crop when a shortage of pickers developed.

And a number of the housewives were in the fields Saturday. They are expected to return daily until the entire crop is cleaned up.

Silverton Mayor Harry Carson led the business men into the fields. The Chamber of Commerce sponsored the project.

The business men, who shut down during the morning hours, returned to town in the afternoon and opened their establishments.

They received 2 1/2 cents a pound for the beans they picked.

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
