

Archie Moore Tells Rocky He'll Capture The Crown

NEW YORK (AP)—If Rocky Marciano belts his sparring partners around with extra vigor in the next few days, it can be said that he is ready to go.

The heavyweight champion has been doing a slow burn since the 38-year-old Moore, a psychology student, tossed the gauntlet to Rocky at their contract signing ceremony yesterday afternoon.

It happened when the fighters posed for television and newspaper cameramen and were asked to make statements. Commission Chairman Julius Helfand sat between them.

Archie, sporting a mustache and flourishing goatee, was the first to speak. Facing the cameras, he said:

"Rocky, it's been a long time and it should be a great fight and make us a lot of money."

Then he turned to face Marciano and added:

"Rocky, I do expect to win your title."

Marciano's eyebrows shot up at the unexpected thrust. After a moment's pause, he turned to Archie and replied:

"Archie, you sure have created a lot of interest in this fight. I'll be ready on Sept. 20 for the fight of my life."

The confident light heavyweight king said before that he expects to beat Rocky but the surprising part was that he said it to his opponent's face. It usually isn't done. As a matter of fact, no one present at the ceremony in Helfand's office could ever recall any fighter ever going beyond the usual "I'll be out to do my best" statement at such an affair.

Archie seldom does anything on the spur of the moment and the chances are that he deliberately planned the remark in his "war of nerves" with the heavyweight ruler.

Class Titles Up In Shoot

VANDALIA, Ohio (AP)—The little fellows had their crack at gold and glory Tuesday in the 56th Grand American Trapshoot.

In all but Tuesday's competition the less talented marksmen are forced to fire on even terms with the holshots. In Tuesday's class championships, however, they compete only against those of comparable ability.

National titles in five divisions were at stake in the 200-target event. They are Class AA for shooters who have averaged 96.5 or better this year on at least 500 targets at 16 yards, Class A for those with an average of 94 to 96.5, Class B for 91 to 94, Class C for 88 to 91 and Class D for under 88.

Trapshooting officials hoped for better weather than experienced Monday in the 200-target introductory event.

Moss, Quillian In National Doubles Semi

BROOKLINE, Mass. (AP)—Jerry Moss and Bill Quillian, lost in the glitter of big names a week ago, now appear strong bets for the men's title in the 75th National Doubles tennis tournament.

In effect, Moss, the 19-year-old San Francisco University freshman, and Quillian, 21-year-old University of Washington graduate from Seattle, have reached the semifinals by playing only two matches.

When play resumed Monday on the outdoor Longwood courts flooded much of last week by heavy rains, Moss and Quillian went the five-set distance to knock off fourth-seeded Cliff Mayne and Eddie Moylan. The scores were 6-4, 6-4, 1-6, 3-7, 6-3 in the three hour, third round match.

The rains—which forced the top-seeded American and Australian Davis Cup team members to withdraw—had delayed the first round meeting of Moss and Quillian with the No. 3 foreign team of Orlando Sirola and Nicola Pietrangeli last week. They finally met indoors Friday and the unseeded youngsters went five sets and four hours to eliminate Italy's finest.

Their second round opponents defaulted and Tuesday it is a mere formality to await the match time by default over Italy's Giuseppe Merlo and Dick Gaines of Edgartown, Mass. Merlo had to leave because of previous commitments elsewhere.



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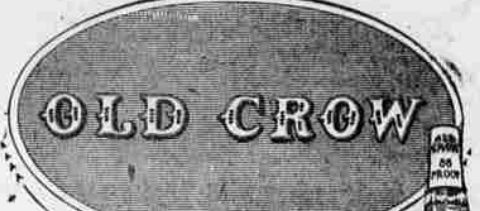

The twin victories, by 14-4 and 6-5 margins, put the Broncos a single percentage point ahead of the Salem Senators, who split a pair at Tri-City. Both contenders are 4 1/2 games back of the pace-setting Eugene Emeralds, who were idle.

The double loss dropped Wenatchee 2 1/2 games back. Salem beat Tri-City 5-1 in the seven-inning opener at Kennewick, but the Braves bounced back to take the regulation nightcap, 4-2. Yakima outlasted Spokane, 7-5 in 10 innings, at Spokane.
