

# French Call 60,000 Reserve Troops

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### 2,000 Estimated Dead In Clashes In North Africa

PARIS (AP) — France recalled 60,000 young reservists to the colors Wednesday to bolster her forces in Morocco and Algeria, strained by nationalist uprisings over the weekend.

At the same time Premier Faure and President Coty hurried to Paris for urgent consultations on consequences of the clashes which took an estimated 2,000 lives.

The Defense Ministry said recall of the reservists, most of them in the 23 to 24 age bracket, will be spread over a three to four month period.

France already has an estimated 125,000 troops in Algeria and more in Morocco.

Faure flew to Paris from the French Alps resort of Aix les Bains, where he and four of his cabinet have been conferring with Moroccan leaders in an effort to find a political solution to the crisis in the protectorate. Coty came to Paris from his country residence at Rambouillet.

Meanwhile, there was relative quiet in French North Africa as French troops continued cleanup operations.

Faure had to deal with the first signs of political dissension within his government.

The Premier was under attack from some rightist backers of his (Continued on Page 2 Col. 3)

### Eisenhower Says America On 'Peace Crusade,' But Can't Accept Soviet Wrongs

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — President Eisenhower declared today that America is on a "crusade for peace" but can never accept Russian wrongs to men and nations in an "eagerness to avoid war."

In a prepared address to the American Bar Assn., he voiced confidence that the Geneva summit conference spells opportunity to advance toward a peace "based on justice and security."

"Can we achieve that sort of peace?" he asked. "I think we can."

Yet, without naming the Soviet Union, he said the division of Germany, the domination of captive countries and the use of international subversion are "violations of the rights of men and nations."

They probably result, he said, from "a compound of suspicions and fear." But he added quickly, "That explains it, I cannot excuse."

"In justice to others and to ourselves," he said, "we can never accept those wrongs as a part of the peace that we desire and seek."

The President spoke at the annual convention of the bar association, which is observing the 200th anniversary of the birth of John Marshall, fourth chief justice of the United States.

Eisenhower extolled Marshall as a "foremost leader in developing and maintaining the liberties of the people" of the United States, as a man whose decisions "made of the Constitution a vital, dynamic, dealable charter for free and orderly living."

He said he will appoint nobody to the federal judiciary who will not serve in the tradition of Marshall.

In general, the presidential speech took a somewhat unflinching, philosophical approach to global rather than domestic problems, drawing lessons from the career of Marshall.

### Robert Tice, Portland Man, 21st Victim

Death claimed its 21st highway victim this year in Douglas County Tuesday night when a huge Consolidated Freightways truck and trailer plunged over a 55-foot embankment and exploded. Consequently, flames formed a ghastly pyre for the truck's already lifeless driver.

The accident took the life of Robert Tice, 43, Portland, Coroner L. Powers said he was killed on impact, and his body was burned beyond recognition after death.

The accident occurred at about 3:55 Tuesday night on Canyon Mountain about 34 miles south of Roseburg. Also involved was John L. Yarbrough, 22, Roseburg, driver of a pickup truck. He suffered head injuries and fractures of ribs and an arm. He is in Douglas County Hospital in Roseburg.

State police said details of the accident were uncertain because Yarbrough's truck threw up a cloud of dust.

### Flood-Ravaged Eastern States Get New Hope

The worst confusion was clearing up Wednesday in flood-ravaged sections of the Northeastern states.

Even in the most severely wrecked communities, where life was still badly disrupted, there was new hope from President Eisenhower's promise of massive federal aid for rehabilitation.

Pennsylvania solved the problem of providing for children in flood-damaged and isolated summer camps by shipping them home.

In sudden, prostrate factories at Woonsocket, R. I., workmen energetically tackled the job of getting things in running order again.

Management representatives were "amazed" and gratified by the turnout of volunteers for rehabilitation work.

"We knew some would turn out but this is a happy surprise," they were quoted as saying.

The death toll came in for a recount, revising the number of known dead from 180 down to 170.

The death figures by states were: Pennsylvania, 100, with an unknown number still missing; Connecticut, 49, with 71 known missing; Massachusetts, 13; New Jersey, 6; New York, 4; Rhode Island, 1; Virginia, 3.

But not further repairs were made here and there another road was opened. The New England Telephone and Telegraph Co. reported 50,000 of the approximately 60,000 telephones put out of service had been restored.

Voluntary contributions of clothing, food and money came to the aid of flood victims. The Red Cross launched a special flood relief drive with the strong backing of President Eisenhower, who handed his own personal check to national Red Cross chairman E. Roland Harriman.

"His gift was a generous one—an example to others who have not yet acted," Harriman commented later.

In Washington the CIO opened a flood relief fund with an initial allotment of \$100,000 to help an estimated 50,000 members made homeless or jobless by the catastrophe.

Tentative damage estimates by the various states tallied around three billion dollars. Connecticut figured its losses at more than one billion; Massachusetts, one billion; Pennsylvania, half a billion; Rhode Island and New Jersey, 100 million or more each; New York, 15 million.

### Berserk American Kills 3, Wounds Six In S. England

MANSTON, England (AP) — A crazed U. S. Air Force man embarked on a deadly shooting spree Wednesday, killing three persons and wounding at least six at a South England fighter base.

With a rifle in one hand and a .45 automatic in the other, the berserk gunman commandeered a car by threatening the driver and fled to a nearby beach resort, spreading terror among the bathers.

Air Force police and British civil police trapped him on the beach. In the ensuing gun battle, the American was wounded. British police reported the fugitive committed suicide, but the U. S. Air Force headquarters said he was killed by U. S. Air Force police.

The Air Force in Washington identified the gunman as Airman 2 C. Napoleon Green, a 21-year-old Negro, son of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Green, Chicago, Ill.

Before his death, Green killed two American servicemen and a Royal Air Force airman. Reports on the number wounded conflicted. The U. S. Air Force put the number at six, but British police said they totaled eight. The wounded included American military personnel and British civilians. One of the Britons is a woman.

An official spokesman named the American dead as Airman 2 C. Nelson Gresham of Philadelphia and M. Sgt. Laurence Velquez of Colorado. He did not give their ages or complete addresses, but said Velquez' wife and four children live in England.

The British victim was identified as RAF Corp. H. B. Gray.

### Joe Brumbach Family Chosen For Fair Honors

Thirty-eight years ago, at the age of 21, Joe Brumbach started farming in Douglas County.

This week Joe and his family were named the "Douglas County Farm Family of the Year." Announcement of the selection by a secret panel of three judges was made Wednesday by fair board member Homer Grow.

Brumbach, 59, lives with his wife, Alda, in the Deer Creek area. He came to Douglas County from Illinois at the age of 9. Mrs. Brumbach has lived in the county for all of 57 years. She was born in Glade of pioneer parents.

The outstanding farmer owns 712 acres in the Deer Creek area, now valued at \$50,000. Major crops on the land are wheat, oats and vetch hay. In the livestock line, Brumbach raises sheep, cattle and hogs.

In addition to his farm work, Brumbach is an outstanding civic leader. He is a director of the Northwest Turkey Show, agriculture chairman of Pomona Grange, president of the Douglas County Farm Bureau Federation and a former 4-H club leader.

The Brumbachs have two sons: Lt. J. W. Brumbach, 33, now serving with the Navy; and Donald Brumbach, 28, a dairy farmer in Grants Pass.

While the boys were young, Brumbach was very active as a 4-H leader. His interest in youth (Continued on Page 2 Col. 3)

### Pacific Plywood Plans Addition To Dillard Plant

Beside its new fibre board plant (see other story), Pacific Plywood Co. of Dillard is expected to begin immediately construction on another addition to the main plant.

It will be a 60 by 70 foot building to allow additional storage space for dry veneer, and it will house additional veneer patching facilities, reports President William F. Forrest.

P. F. McKee, assistant general manager, reports the new addition will allow room for a new sander and relocation of other sanders and saws.

Forrest said after the addition of more storage space, plywood production will include sheathing (a rough plywood) as well as finished plywood.

The building will be erected by Timber Structures of Portland, and machinery will be installed by employees of Pacific.

### Animal Auction Slated Saturday At County Fair

A number of 4-H pigs, lambs and beef animals will be auctioned at the Douglas County Fair Saturday afternoon, reports William F. Forrest, chairman of a Roseburg Rotary Club committee in charge.

The auction is scheduled at 2:30 p.m., immediately following the free barbecue. Auctioning will be in the beef and dairy arena.

Approximately seven beef animals, 12 market lambs and nine market pigs will go on the block. The stock is being shown by 4-H members at the fair. Buyers will be protected, Forrest said, by grading. Weights will be on the basis of 12-hour shrinkage.

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### Hill's Shoe Service Takes New Location

Hill's Shoe Service has moved to a new location at 305 N. Jackson St., a site formerly occupied by the Record Music Shop.

The shop had been located at 108 E. Washington St. for seven years. The shop opened at its new location Tuesday.

Owner Harry Hill reports the move to bigger quarters was made necessary because of increased business and a desire to incorporate increased service.

Alterations to the shop will not be completed for about a week or 10 days, Hill says he will stage a grand opening shortly after that.

### Three California Youths Sentenced For Vagrancy

Three young men from the Los Angeles area were remanded to jail Wednesday after being given five-day sentences by Judge Warren A. Woodruff.

Edwin Gardner O'Neil, 19, Dennis Herschel Fay, 20, and Wilbur Wayne Howard, 18, were arraigned Tuesday on charges of vagrancy. They pleaded guilty, and Judge Woodruff took the cases under advisement for one day.

The Californians were arrested by Sutherland Police Chief Richard Crumal and a deputy sheriff at a swimming spot about six miles east of Sutherland. Officers said two guns were found in the car, and the matter is still under investigation. The trio gave Lake Wood Village, Calif., addresses.

### MAN TO PAY BILL

Harvey Ray Snook, 35, Sutherland, was fined \$25 in district court Tuesday after he pleaded guilty to defrauding an innkeeper. Judge Warren A. Woodruff then suspended the fine on condition Snook pay his board bill and \$5 court costs.

Snook was arrested by sheriff's officers after a complaint was filed by Hallie Carlson.

### Fliers Lunch In New York, Have Dinner In London

LONDON (AP) — Two British aviators had dinner at home with their families last night just as they planned—after flying to New York for lunch.

Pilot John Hackett and navigator Peter Monneyney made the double transatlantic flight of 6,914 miles in 13 hours 46 minutes 56.2 seconds. It was the first London-New York-London round trip in one day.

"We expected it to go right, and it did go right," Hackett, 32, told the news conference.

### MOTHER DEEDS CHILD

GREENWOOD, N.C. — The clerk of court's office here has received a deed signed by a woman to "grant, bargain, sell and release" her minor child.

The deed, made out in 1951 but just recorded, carried the sum of \$1.

## Wood Waste Venture Announced

Pacific Plywood Co. of Dillard is laying plans today for a venture to pioneer use of wood waste in Douglas County.

William F. Forrest, president of the company, announced today that construction will start soon on a new plant to manufacture a wood fibre board for use as core stock (veneer covered panels) underlayment and sheathing for the cabinet and building trade. He said cost of setting the plant in operation would be more than half a million dollars.

This is the first full-scale step in the direction of recovering the tremendous waste resulting from lumber and plywood manufacturing in Douglas County.

Forrest stated the company has approximately 50 tons of waste materials a day in manufacture of its plywood. He said this would be used in the new manufacture as well as greater use of unused material on logging operations. He said it would also be supplemented by waste from other mills.

Forrest estimated production would be near five million square feet surface measure per month when peak production is reached with the new mill. He said the plant is scheduled to go into operation sometime early next summer.

Forrest was expansive in his predictions for the fibre board. "I think it has a great future," he said. He explained that the new board has strength and has been used for outside building.

The new industry in the county will have a two-fold effect on the vital timber and lumber production, he pointed out. It will not only use up waste but will stretch the use of timber.

### Senior High Registration Slated For Aug. 30-Sept. 2; Classes To Start On Sept. 6

Registration for Roseburg High School pupils will start in the Library Arts Building Aug. 30, reports Principal Harry Jacoby.

Pupils will register by classes in the following order: Freshmen, Aug. 30; sophomores, Aug. 31; juniors, Sept. 1; and seniors, Sept. 2. No evening registration is scheduled.

Classes actually start Sept. 6. Buses will not go into operation until then.

Jacoby urged that all pupils appear for registration Aug. 30, as their classes are scheduled. Hours will be from 9 a.m. to 12 and 1 to 4 p.m. each day.

An orientation assembly is scheduled at the auditorium Aug. 30 at 9 a.m. All freshmen have been requested to report then. They will be welcomed and given some general information about the high school program and the staff by Principal Jacoby.

Immediately after the assembly, freshmen whose last names begin with the letters A through K will go to the library to register. Those with names beginning with the letters L through Z will start registering at 1 p.m. Pupils are requested to bring sack lunches if necessary. Normally, however, registration does not take more than two hours for any pupil.

Members of other classes on the succeeding days will follow the same alphabetical procedure. Those with names beginning with A through K will report in the morning, and those with letters L through Z in the afternoon.

Transfer pupils and others who did not complete pre-registration in the spring are advised to call at the high school before Aug. 27. They will be assisted in choosing their courses by the deans.

By coming before registration week, they will avoid delay and have a better selection of classes. It will be necessary for pupils to have some money with them to cover fees and other costs, Jacoby said.

These will include locker deposit and towel fees (\$3) for those taking physical education and a 75-cent book deposit for those not taking it; class fees for purchases of magazines and supplies and for rental of some textbooks (Industrial arts classes, homemaking, agriculture, English-social studies).

It is also recommended that pupils pay the following charges: (1) student insurance covering accidental injuries as provided through the Oregon School Activities Assn., \$1.50; (2) student body membership card, \$4; (3) school annual, \$3.

Pupils are also requested to buy their textbooks at the student body bookstore at registration time. Cost of the books will be between \$8 and \$13 on an average.
