

Project Fund Over \$5,000

Indian Club members discussed the two most important features of their grandstand building project Tuesday night as about 25 persons turned out for a meeting in the high school gym.

Is That So!

"EACH SPRING my long-haired Bohemian friends start spouting: 'The voice of the turtle is heard in the land' and it makes me mad clear through. I insist turtles have no voice. Won't you help me put an end to this silly twaddle?" begs Mrs. T.W.L., a Bethlehem Globe Times reader.

"I know a whale isn't a fish but can you tell me which is the big-

gest fish that grows?" asks John R., Jr., age nine, via the Eugene Register Guard.

"Three of us are in a tangled-up argument. One swears grouse drum by beating their wings together overhead. Another that they drum against a fallen log. And because I've seen them, I say they drum against their sides. But I'm willing to leave it up to you to decide, writes R.W.P. via the Appleton Post Crescent.

"Are moles blind?" enquired J.R.T. via the Paterson News.

TURTLE VOICE: Certainly the turtle has a voice, Mrs. T.W.L. It is a gentle soft murmurous cooing. But it's a turtle dove. "Turtle, you see, was originally the complete name for a turtle dove. Given to them, I suppose, because of their 'tur-tur' cooing.

As for the reptile's voice, if you were to listen very closely you might catch a sibilant hiss as it pulls its head into its shell, caused by the turtle's breath being forced out suddenly to make room for its withdrawn head.

But about that quote from the Song of Solomon, it is so good for this time of year do you mind too much, Mrs. T.W.L., if I give the whole for my readers:

"For, lo! the winter is past, the rain is over and gone; the flowers appear on the earth; the time of the singing of birds is come, and the voice of the turtle is heard in our land."

BIGGEST FISH: These are sharks—the jumbo shark or whale shark which gets to be 50-60 feet long and may weigh over 27,000 pounds. The basking shark with a length of some 35-40 feet comes a strong second, with some of the blue sharks not very far behind. These are all, strictly speaking, salt water fish. John, in fresh water, the biggest fish is the Russian sturgeon. Some grow to be 25 feet long and weigh over 3,000 pounds. But it comes in from the salt water. The biggest strictly fresh-water fish—one that does not go to salt water at all—is the Arapaima or Pirarucu of the rivers of Brazil and Guianas with a length of about 15 feet and a weight of around 500 pounds.

On the other end of the scale, John, there is the tiny goby—smallest of any backbone creature. Although there are many kinds in the Pacific, the smallest lives in the Philippines. It's almost transparent and it takes four of them, lined up head to tail, to measure an inch.

GROUSE DRUMMING: Your argument is of long standing, R.W.P. simply because the drumming is so fast that the human eye cannot see what happens. Fact is, a grouse does not bang its wings together over its back. Neither does it strike its wings against a fallen log. Nor does it beat its wings against its sides as you say. So you're all wrong. What drumming the bird does is against the air itself. Motion pictures slowed down considerably show that the drumming grouse just flaps the air close beside its body.

MOLE EYES: For all practical purposes, J.R.T., the mole is blind. As you know, almost all of its life is spent in darkness, mostly underground where large eyes would be a handicap. A mole can tell brilliant daylight from darkness—but even a totally eyeless worm can do as much, with its photosensitive skin. As for the size of the mole's eyes, they are no bigger than pinheads.

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Richardson May Get Davis Job

FOREST HILLS, N.Y. — Bill Talbert, 47, S. Davis Cup captain, admitted today that he was toying with the idea of sending Hamilton Richardson into the Chicago Open Round against Australia in place of the slumping Vic Seixas.

Talbert will have to make his decision within the next 24 hours. The draw is scheduled for tomorrow and the first two singles matches will be played Friday.

"After watching Richardson's play against Seixas yesterday, I'm convinced that I'll have to do some thinking before I announce the singles assignments," said Talbert.

Richardson, a Rhodes scholar from Tulane University, impressed the captain and spectators alike when he won three fast sets against the American champion and had Seixas clearly on the defensive. Richardson won one set at love.

"I don't have the full say while we're playing in this country," said Talbert, "but I think if I decided on Richardson, the selection committee would go along with me."

"Then, too, Seixas is just shy of 32 years old and playing two singles and a doubles might be too much for him. If he didn't play singles, he might be much more effective in doubles."

If Seixas were withdrawn from singles, Talbert was asked, wouldn't it hurt Vic mentally in the doubles?

"I don't think so," he said. "He's a grown man and he knows anything we do will be for the benefit of the team."

Talbert knows the Australians, out to regain the Cup they lost Down Under last year, would love to have Seixas in the singles. They think Ken Rosewall has his number and will beat him at will for one of the precious three points required to cart the prized trophy back home.

No. 19 since he beat St. Louis July 31 and ran his season's record to 18-1. His mark is now 18-4.

The victory boosted Brooklyn's National League lead to 12 games over Milwaukee, defeated 4-3 by the Philadelphia Phillies.

The American League race, meanwhile, continued on its merry whirl with the Chicago White Sox taking over first place by two percentage points over the New York Yankees, and the Boston Red Sox only 3 1/2 games back in fourth place.

Chicago regained first place, although splitting a twin bill with the Baltimore Orioles, winning the opener 6-2 and losing the second game 10-3. The Yankees committed five errors, and Detroit thumped New York 7-2, while Ted Williams had another big night driving in four runs as Boston defeated the Cleveland Indians 8-3. This left Cleveland in third place, a game behind Chicago and New York, in a virtual tie for first, Kansas City edged Washington 4-3.

Cards Win
In other National League games, the St. Louis Cardinals beat the New York Giants and the Pittsburgh Pirates edged the Cincinnati Redlegs, both by 2-1 scores.

Newcombe, who had a 29-9 season in 1951 and was 19-11 in 1950, will be in shape to pitch his next turn, the club physician said. But getting No. 19 seems to be a jinx. Milwaukee knocked him out Aug. 4, and although the Bums rallied to win, Newcombe wasn't involved in the final decision. Then he was beaten by the Cubs 1-0, Aug. 8, and Robin Roberts and the Phillies

Don Bessent relieved Newcombe last night and posted his sixth victory without defeat when Furillo hit his 21st homer with one on in the seventh. He also had a single and a double. Duke Snider, also in a slump as the Dodgers had lost nine of their previous 13 outings, chipped in with two doubles, driving home two runs.

Stan Lopata singled with the bases full in the ninth as the Phillies scored three times to defeat Milwaukee. Jack Meyer, ace reliever, got the decision after taking over from Murry Dickson in the ninth.

Wins 13th
Four Baltimore errors aided Chicago in winning the opener, while Virgil Trucks gained his 13th victory. Bob Kennedy homered for the Sox. In the second game, however, the Sox muffed a chance to take a clear league lead when the Orioles racked four Chicago hurlers for 15 hits. Dave Philly touched off a five-run Oriole rally in the fifth inning with a two-run homer. George Zuverink got his first pitching victory of the year.

New York's defenses fell apart, and Bob Turley was wild as a March hare at Detroit, while the Tigers' rookie Frank Lary went all the way, spacing eight hits. Turley suffered his 12th defeat, against 13 wins.

Williams drove in four runs with a two-run homer, his 23rd, and a double to prevent Cleveland from joining Chicago and New York in a three-way traffic jam atop the league. Tom Brewer got his ninth victory for Boston, while Herb

Score was losing his 10th game. Al Smith hit his 17th homer for the Indians.

Bats Three Runs
Vic Power batted in three runs, two with a homer, to pace the Athletics attack over Washington. Roy Sievers blasted his 20th and 21st home runs for the Senators. With the bases loaded in the eighth inning, Bill Sarni of St. Louis dribbled a slow roller down the third base line that hit the bag for a single, scoring Stan Musial with the run that beat the Giants. Paul LaPalme pitched the last three innings to gain his fourth decision for the Cards.

Vernon Law scattered six hits to make his seasonal record 8-8 as the Pirates opened Cincinnati. Jerry Lynch opened the Pirate eighth with a triple off relief hurler Buster Freeman, and scored the winning run on Frank Thomas' sacrifice fly to left field.
