Stores Make Meatcutters New Offer On 48-Hour Basis

A new wage proposal, boosting the proposed salary for journeyman meat cutters two dollars to \$100 for a 48-hour week, has been submitted to the Roseburg Meat Cutters Union by the Roseburg Independent Meat Dealers Employers' Committee.

Red Cross Flood Relief Quota Set For Douglas Co.

Douglas County's "rockbottom" quota which will go toward assisting residents of disaster-stricken areas in the northeastern United States is \$1,020, according to county Red Cross Chapter Chairman Ira Byrd.

Chairman Byrd received a wire Thursday from national RC Chairman E. Roland Harriman. It cited the continuing and increasing need for financial assistance. The Red Cross leader said in excess of "eight million dollars" would be required. He set the county quota.

County Executive Secretary Mrs. R. E. Herman said by Wednesday evening \$88 for the relief fund had been turned into the Roseburg office, 114 W. Lane St. Of the sum \$48 came from Roseburg and 40 from Myrtle Creek.

The first contribution for \$20 came from an 80-year-old county resident, according to national volunteer officer Gen. Curtis T. Beecher.

Thursday Byrd termed the need "very dire." He said "We'd appreciate any and all donations" and added they could be turned into the RC office in Roseburg.

He said RC workers would pick up contributions if persons were unable to bring them in. The Red Cross telephone numbers in Roseburg are OR 3-3235 or OR 2-3008.

President Eisenhower says he will call a special session of Congress IF NECESSARY to appropriate money needed to restore to normal the flood-devastated states in the eastern part of our country.

He made the statement to newsmen after a conference with the governors of the Northeastern states and representatives of the governors of North and South Carolina. He had previously flown over the devastated areas for a direct look from the air at the damage wrought by the storms and the ensuing floods.

What do you think of it? I think it's SPLENDID. It will spread among all of us the burden of a disaster that is borne by only a few of us would be tragic and awful.

That's what government is for.

Civil Defense Administrator Val Peterson estimates that 73 million dollars will be needed from the President's emergency fund to aid the devastated areas.

Put it like this: Seventy-five million dollars SPREAD AMONG ALL OF US will amount to a shade better than 50 cents per head.

Yoncalla Seeking Lower Insurance

The Yoncalla City Council will be asked whether the city can make fire — fighting improvements to bring about a lower insurance rate to residents, reports Chief Stacey Adams.

Adams says he has received a letter from the Oregon Rating Bureau which recently surveyed the city's fire-fighting equipment and methods, etc. Presently, Yoncalla is placed in Class 8.

But, with a few improvements, or even one change — acquisition of a 500-gallon-per-minute pumper — the city could be in Class 7. Class 7 would mean a reduction in insurance rates of about 10 per cent.

The city is nearly out of Class 8 now, and with adoption of several recommendations by the bureau, could jump to Class 6 and reduce rates about 20 per cent.

Adams said the rating bureau will hold up on this year's rating if the council requests a delay to make improvements. The matter will be presented to the council at the next regular session on Sept. 6.

Striking Allis Chalmers Workers Return To Jobs

MILWAUKEE — Striking union members at the main Allis-Chalmers plant here returned to work in full force Thursday after a company-union agreement to turn the problems of a new contract over to mediation.

Some 2,000 members of the Local 248 of the CIO United Auto Workers heeded urging by their leadership at a mass meeting Wednesday to return to their jobs.

A total of 17,500 A-C workers were on strike in six plants where employees are covered by UAW contracts.

Air Force Colonel Flies Plane At Record Speed

WASHINGTON — Air Force Col. Horace A. Hanes has been credited with the first official record for faster-than-sound flight.

The National Aeronautics Assn. yesterday confirmed that a North American F100 Super Sabre jet fighter piloted by Hanes topped 800 miles an hour last Saturday over southern California. Hanes' flight reportedly was made at 35,000 feet where the speed of sound is 663 miles an hour.

Airman Schmidt, Una Make Up

Couple Meets In Portland, Leave On Trip

PORTLAND — A surprise reconciliation put Airman Daniel Schmidt and his wife Una on a belated honeymoon Thursday and wiped out his plans for a divorce.

She came here Wednesday after he had talked with her by telephone at her hideout near San Jose, Calif. And their reunion, said by a neighbor, "was something wonderful to see."

They promptly went into seclusion and were reported to be at an Oregon beach resort.

Schmidt was released from a Red Chinese prison last month to learn his wife said she had thought him dead and had married another man. In California, where he spent three weeks trying to untangle his problem, Schmidt filed for divorce and asked custody of their small son.

But, said the neighbor, "He loved her and she loved him and they never had a chance to get together. Since he got back they had only seen each other across a desk with a lawyer present. You can't settle anything that way."

The neighbor — Mrs. Robert Thomas — said arrangements for Una's trip here were completed shortly after Schmidt arrived here Monday to visit his mother, Mrs. Ray Peters.

Late Wednesday afternoon Mrs. Thomas and Mrs. Peters' husband went to the Portland airport to meet Una. They missed her, though, when her plane from California was early, and she reached the Peters home, in a modest auto court, by cab.

Mrs. Peters said her son and Una embraced as she got out of the car.

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3 Douglas County Women To Attend Library Session

Three Douglas County women will attend the Pacific Northwest Library Assn. annual conference in Gothenburg next week.

The session is to last three days and is for librarians and library board members. Miss Bess Clough, Canyonville, Mrs. Jack Randall, Drain, county board members; and Miss Carol Trimble, county librarian, will be present.

Prominent library authorities and authors will take part in the program. They include: John Richards, Seattle, president of the American Library Assn.; William E. Ireland, Victoria, B.C., president of the Canadian Library Assn.; and Sen. Richard Neuberger.

Miss Trimble said the group would devote considerable discussion to allocation of a \$50,000 sum recently granted the association by the Ford Foundation. Purpose of the sum is to raise educational facilities through improvement of the area's public library.

The county librarian will attend a special pre-conference workshop on adult education Sunday evening. It will be conducted by Miss Eleanor Phinney of the national association.

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Morocco Nationalists Offer France Terms For Peace

AIX LES BAINS, France — Morocco's nationalist Istiqlal (Independence) party Thursday demanded revision of the French protectorate's treaty and a chance for deposed Sultan Mohammed Ben Youssef to return to the throne.

In the course of a 2 1/2 hour meeting with French Premier Faure, delegates of the outlawed nationalist movement stated their party's views on points at issue between France and Morocco.

This meeting was regarded at the key session in talks aimed at ending the bloodshed in Morocco. In a statement to the press, an

Istiqlal spokesman outlined his party's position as follows:

Removal of the present sultan and recognition of Ben Youssef's continued right to the throne. The Istiqlal considers that Ben Youssef is still the legal sultan and that the present sultan, Mohammed Ben Moulay Arafat is a usurper.

The French deposed Ben Youssef two years ago and installed Ben Moulay Arafat on the throne.

Ben Youssef should be brought back from exile in Madagascar and allowed to live, at least for the time being, in France.

A new Moroccan government should be formed which will negotiate a new link with France to replace the protectorate. Finally, an opportunity should be given for the Moroccan people to decide whether Ben Youssef should come back to Rabat, the capital.

Secretary of State Dulles said Thursday East-West negotiations at the forthcoming Big Four foreign ministers meeting will put to the test the "true spirit" of amity developed at the summit conference at Geneva last month.

Dulles told newsmen that this was a point intended to be made in President Eisenhower's foreign policy speech before the American Bar Assn. at Philadelphia Wednesday. Dulles said there was no new policy in the speech.

The secretary of state spoke with reporters before flying from Washington to New York where he will address the Council on Foreign Relations Friday afternoon.

Eisenhower said the United States would never make a "false" peace with the Soviet Union by selling out the rights of other peoples. Specifically, he said there was no justification for continuing the division of Germany, the Red domination of Eastern European countries and the organization of international communism as an instrument of subversion.

The New York Times said the Eisenhower administration has made a policy decision to "put a brake on the optimism created by the Big Four conference last month at Geneva."

Longshoremen On Jobs After Wildcat Strike

NEW YORK — Longshoremen returned to their jobs Thursday, ending a three-day wildcat strike on a number of Hudson River piers.

However, the president of the International Longshoremen's Assn. (ILA) indicated a portwide strike of dock workers may be called in two weeks.

The unauthorized work stoppage was touched off Monday when the New York-New Jersey Waterfront Commission canceled a work permit held by a longshoreman with a long criminal record.

The union has been pressing for a 15-cent hourly package increase and a modified union shop, two concessions which the waterfront association with the big Bunker Hill & Sullivan Mining and Concentrating Co.

H. J. Hull, a spokesman for the 16 operators, said the companies would not agree to the union shop provision.

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New Hurricane Now Forming Out In Atlantic

MIAMI, Fla. — The year's fifth hurricane, Edith, spun ominously over the open Atlantic Thursday and one of the top storm warning experts predicted its winds would have a force of 125 miles an hour or better by Saturday.

Gordon Dunn, chief storm forecaster in the Weather Bureau's hurricane center here, said Edith's winds at present were about 80 miles an hour. She was centered Thursday morning 580 miles northeast of Puerto Rico.

That location placed its center about 1,500 miles southeast of Miami and the same distance south-southeast of Cape Hatteras, N.C.

"Edith is a smaller, more concentrated storm than either Connie or Diane," said Dunn.

"Conditions are such that Edith probably will move in a westerly direction—either northwest or west northwest—for the next two days, at least. That's the same old route that Connie and Diane followed. Edith will require a lot of close watching."

The storm's forward movement was about 13 miles an hour. Gales extended outward 150 miles to the north and east and 50 miles to the south and west of the center.

Government Puts Money, Manpower Into Flood Relief

WASHINGTON — The Army Engineers Thursday estimated flood damage in Northeastern states at \$1,600,000,000 and said the area faces "one of the biggest, toughest flood rehabilitation jobs since the one Noah faced after the great flood of Biblical times."

Lt. Gen. Samuel D. Sturgis, chief of engineers, made the statement after a personal inspection of the disaster areas. He said the "loss of life and the utter destruction we saw had a most appalling effect upon us."

Sturgis said "no one can estimate" what will be required to put the flood-stricken areas back on their feet again.

He said his "preliminary estimate" of the physical damage will "undoubtedly have to be revised in two or three weeks" after the engineers have completed their survey of the devastation.
