Many New Innovations Set For This Year's State Fair

SALEM, Ore. — The Oregon State Fair is in the last stages of preparing to welcome over a third of a million visitors to its eight-day stand starting Saturday, Sept. 3. On the entertainment side, the brightest new spot this year will be a new roller coaster and a new "tunnel of love," representing a \$100,000 investment.

Of the new farm-side features, the one causing the most interest is the Aberdeen Angus breeders' exhibit, to be held for the first time in the Pacific Northwest. The event is scheduled to bring 158 of the best Aberdeen Angus cattle in the 10 Western states. The exhibit will be housed in the fair's new beef barn.

Officially, the grounds will be open from 8 a.m. to midnight Sept. 3 through Sept. 10. Actually, the fairgrounds gates never close during the eight days.

Among the features of the fair will be a circus which is headed for an engagement at Disneyland, a nightly, feature-length stage revue and thoroughbred and harness horse races each afternoon except Sunday. Free acts are to be presented on the midway each day.

Farm and city wives will be back to compete for "queen of the kitchen" honors in the food department, which will be presented in enlarged quarters. Pie baking competition has been added.

The land products show has been greatly enlarged and the produce will compete for more than 500 cash prizes.

The garden and flower show, one of the most popular features during recent years, will occupy nearly 50 per cent more space this year.

Additional picnic tables have been erected. Entries are running high in the textile department, with emphasis on quilts.

The circus, scheduled three times on Sunday and twice on other days, will be the Bally Bros. and Cristiana Combined Show which has winter quarters in Florida. Headline acts feature the Cristiani family, a team of acrobats.

Other major departments at the livestock end of the fairgrounds include dairy cattle, dual purpose, beef, draft horses, sheep, goats, swine and poultry. Future Farmers of America and 4-H youths will contribute to the competition as will adult farmers.

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Circuit Court

Default Order — Leslie C. and Doris E. Fisher vs. Donald R. Weaver. Walter R. Emra appointed receiver of personal property of defendant, who is declared in default. Aug. 30 set as date for testimony by plaintiffs as to their damages.

Complaints Filed — Bert Edwards vs. State Industrial Accident Commission. Plaintiff seeks compensation for total disability, or for temporary total disability until condition becomes stationary, then award equal to 100 per cent loss of vision of eye for right eye, 10 per cent loss of vision in left eye, 100 per cent of arm for head injuries. SIAC on June 18, 1953, closed out claim without award for permanent disability. Plaintiff was hurt June 7, 1954, while picking up trim ends at Pacific Lumber Distributors plant, Riddle, when hit in side of head by 2x6.

State Industrial Accident Commission vs. Shannon Sammy Drake. Plaintiff seeks judgment of \$206.42, allegedly due under provisions of law.

Rolland Ray Cox vs. Harold Cox. Plaintiff charges since formation of partnership for operation of Walt's Tavern in Sutherlin, the defendant has failed to live up to contract. Requests accounting of all property, accounts receivable and money, sale of business and equal distribution of proceeds as well as half of net profits since partnership was formed Aug. 1, 1954. Also, plaintiff asks that receiver be appointed.

Sleeping Man Killed In Roll Off Divan — ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. — Mack Hopson, 37, rolled off a divan where he was sleeping, struck his neck on the ragged edge of a coffee can used as an ash tray and bled to death.

Hopson, a construction worker, severed the jugular vein in his neck. After his two-foot fall Tuesday, Hopson walked into the kitchen, then shouted for help and collapsed. He died 35 minutes later.

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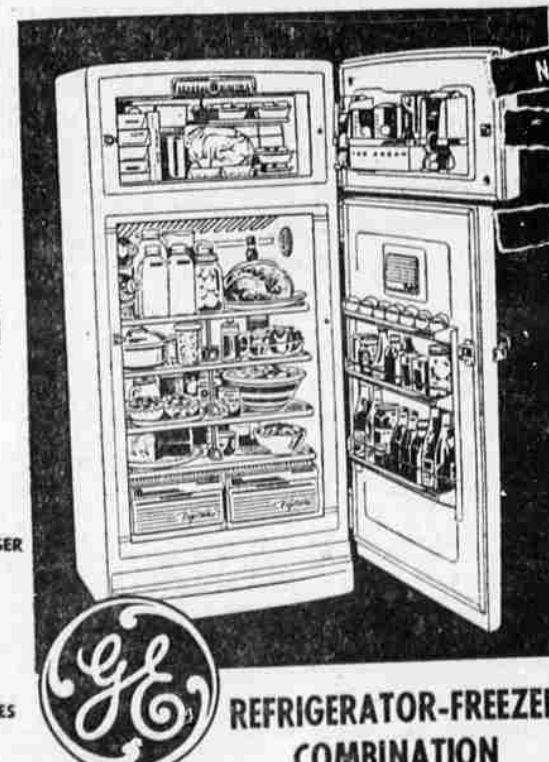
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
