Worker Admits Fatally Beating Real Estate Man — SEATTLE (AP) — An Everett millworker held in the fatal beating of Howard N. Schenck, 31, has confessed clubbing the Seattle real estate salesman to death, Detective Norman Kabel said Tuesday night.

Kabel said Fred L. Bartlett, 26, arrested here Tuesday in a car identified as Schenck's, changed an earlier story and in a recorded confession admitted striking the salesman with a club "like a war club the cave men used" and leaving him in a shallow beach grave on Guemes Island Aug. 9. The beaten body was found Aug. 13.

Arrested by patrolmen who noted the similarity in the car driven by Bartlett and the description of Schenck's machine, the millworker first told officers Tuesday he struck Schenck with his fist once during a fight and left him unconscious on the beach.

Bartlett changed the story, Kabel said, when discrepancies were pointed out and told of a fight that followed what Bartlett said he considered were improper advances by Schenck.
