

Returning American Farm Visitors Say Russians Need More Individual Incentive

NEW YORK (AP) — The Soviet farmer must be given more individual incentive before Russian agricultural production can be increased, a group of American farm experts agreed Thursday.

The Americans arrived home by plane after a six week tour in Russia. They said also that Russian farming is far behind that in this country.

Leader of the touring group was Dean W. V. Lambert of the College of Agriculture at the University of Nebraska. He told reporters: "We had a wonderful trip and had a good opportunity to look at important Russian agricultural areas. I think one of the major impressions we got was the large use of manpower on their farms. They use a great number of people to do what we do through mechanization."

In the group were four American farm operators. They were Ralph A. Olsen, Jewell, Iowa; Herbert W. Pike, Whiting, Iowa; John M. Sedona, Granger, Iowa; and Asa V. Clark, Pullman, Wash.

Others were David G. Johnston,

associate professor of agricultural economics at the University of Chicago; Julius M. Kleiner, agricultural products distributor at Nampa, Idaho; and Herbert H. Pembeck of Des Moines, Iowa, a radio commentator.

Olsen, said his over-all impression was of "the magnitude of everything we saw, especially the new lands — 17 million acres — which they told us would soon be in production."

He said he also was impressed by the physical size of Soviet farm machinery, which in some instances is much larger than that used in this country.

Interpreter for the trip was the Idaho farm products distributor, Kleiner. He said he had made previous visits in 1932 and 1935, and noted many changes this time though the Russians "tried to paint a rozier picture than appeared."

He said the Americans were not given an opportunity to see farms chosen at random by them.

Asked what he would have for lunch Thursday, Kleiner replied: "A nice hamburger—no foolin'."

Socialite Who Eloped With Policeman Is Found Dead

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — A 22-year-old Philadelphia socialite who last June 24 eloped without her family's consent with a Miami, Fla. motorcycle policeman, was found dead Wednesday night under circumstances described as unusual by police.

Mrs. Doris Silver Ostreicher, daughter of Herman Silver, vice president of Food Fair, Inc., a large grocery chain on the Eastern seaboard, died in the apartment of long-time friends while on a social visit.

The attractive red-haired girl received nationwide publicity a few months ago when she ran off unexpectedly with Earl Michael Ostreicher, 29-year-old Miami policeman.

Police said a copy of her report was transmitted to the homicide squad because of the unusual circumstances surrounding the death.

Occupants of the apartment where Mrs. Ostreicher died told police she had been separated from her husband.

Ostreicher was notified in Miami Beach of his wife's death and was given emergency leave by the Police Department. He left Miami Thursday morning via plane.

The Silver girl and Ostreicher eloped to Folkston, Ga., while she was visiting relatives in Miami Beach last June. She had known Ostreicher, a handsome young man, only a few weeks, relatives said at the time.

The police report gave this account of an investigation by Detective Nathan Smith:

The girl arrived in company with her mother, Mrs. Gertrude Silver, at 9:30 p.m. Wednesday night to visit their long-time friends, Mr. and Mrs. Milton Schwartz.

At about 10:05 p.m., Mrs. Ostreicher went into the bedroom and a few minutes later was heard to cry out, "I feel sick."

Her mother and the Schwartzes ran to her assistance and found her unconscious. After vainly trying to revive her, Schwartz ran up the street and got Dr. Samuel Manstein. After an examination, Dr. Manstein summoned police and the fire rescue squad. They administered oxygen for about 15 minutes when Dr. Manstein pronounced the young woman dead.

He said he could not determine the cause of death.

Eisenhower Gives Okay On Defense Plant Loans

DENVER (AP) — President Eisenhower Thursday approved a program providing up to \$60 million in federal loans to repair or replace defense plants damaged in the Northeastern floods.

The President signed an executive order authorizing the emergency program. He also approved a tax amortization speeding for plants covered by the program.

Eisenhower's action came after two days of study of the problem by the White House, the Office of Defense Mobilization, the Civil Defense Administration and the Justice Department.

Under the President's order, loan aid will be available to defense and defense-supporting plants in the flood areas in cases where commercial loans on reasonable terms are not available.

Next to those of babies and pretty girls, pictures of household pets are perhaps the most popular. Like other photographs, they call for know-how to be successful.



The first rule is to shoot close! The animal is of prime importance, so it should occupy the major portion of the picture. This will necessitate using a close-up attachment with some cameras, the most dramatic pictures are extreme close-ups, showing only the heads.

Lack of expression is just as conducive to a poor picture of an animal as it is to one of a person. Animal expressions fall into two classes: real and imagined. The imagined are due to facial structure. The "sad" look of a bloodhound is a good example. A real expression, such as the alert look caused by a strange noise, shows actual feelings. An easy way to obtain an alert expression is to snap a toy dime-store "rattle."

To keep attention on the subject, the background should be simple. An old blanket upon which the subject can be placed serves this purpose well. If artificial light is used, flash is best, as it permits working at fast shutter speeds, often needed.

Animals soon tire of posing. During the session they should be given a rest at intervals. Shooting should also be done without delay, using an assistant to speed up the work by keeping the subject in place.

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Indonesia Police Raid Dutch Liner Tjiluwah

JAKARTA, Indonesia (AP) — Indonesian military police raided the Dutch liner Tjiluwah, confiscating 10 million rupiahs (one million dollars) worth of cargo. It was announced Thursday.

Fifteen persons, mostly Chinese, were arrested in the raid, staged Wednesday as the vessel was about to leave for Singapore and Hong Kong.

The police announcement gave no reason for the raid or the arrests. It also gave no indication of the nature of the confiscated cargo.

Nationalist China Angry Over Sinkiang Self Rule

TAIPEI, Formosa (AP) — Nationalist China has raised an angry outcry against Red China's decision to grant self-rule to Sinkiang Province, by far the largest in all China.

Newspapers and lawmakers denounced the act as a sellout and tantamount to Soviet annexation of the area. They condemned it as a betrayal of the nation's rights, and termed it one of the most infamous and traitorous acts ever perpetrated by the Chinese Reds.
