## Shooters Today Fire For \$100,000 Prizes

VANDALIA, Ohio (AP) — Trap-shooting's greatest show—the Grand American Handicap—was on tap Friday with more than 2,000 of the Western hemisphere's finest scattergunners fighting it out over the 100-target route for close to \$100,000 in prize money.

While the big field was firing, the shooters were talking about Thursday's merry mixup which left the winner of the preliminary handicap in doubt.

P. B. Rees, 40-year-old tire salesman from Heyworth, Ill., was the apparent winner after defeating Weldon Hopman of Buckley, Ill., a 23-year-old farmer, in a shoot-off. Both had led the field of 1,759 with scores of 98x100.

However, the executive committee of the Amateur Trapshooting Assn. was investigating a report that Rees should have shot from 21 yards instead of 20. The report of the June 10th Illinois state shoot at Casey, Ill., credited Rees with a 95 and tie for second place in the handicap there, a score which would have moved him back to the 21-yard line under trapshooting rules.

If there's a substitute for good pitching it's good hitting and the Eugene Emeralds got both Thursday night in their 6-2 Northwest League baseball victory over Spokane.

Frank Chase held the Indians hitless until the bottom of the ninth when the hometown parlayed three safeties into two runs that tied the game 2-all. Eugene won it in the 10th with a four-run outburst, three on Cliff Dapper's two-on homer.

The win protected the Emeralds' 3 1/2-game margin over the runner-up Wenatchee Chiefs who clobbered Yakima 15-8. Tri-City beat Lewiston, 8-3, in the league's third game. Salem had the night off.

At Spokane, Eugene touched Phil Page for three hits and a run in the first inning and picked up another tally in the sixth. Until the ninth, Joe Porter's long fly down the third base line in the second was the nearest thing to a hit Chase permitted the Indians.

Wenatchee pounded three Yakima pitchers for 15 safeties while the Bears rapped 13 off Gene Hayden. The Chiefs batted around in the second and sixth innings, scoring five runs in each of the frames. Eight errors were logged against the losers.

Errors helped Tri-City to its win over Lewiston. Five were charged against a third baseman who was filling in for manager Willis Layne. Layne was injured at Wenatchee Wednesday and may be out for the season. Tri-City scored four runs in the first inning and Lewiston never threatened. The win went to Vern Kindsfather.

## Olson Vies Tonight In Nontitle Scrap

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Left-hooking Joey Giambra takes on middleweight champion Carl (Bobo) Olson Friday night in a televised fight which could turn out to be a better-than-average nontitle scrap.

Olson, back in his own division after his thumping by Archie Moore in an ill-fated shot at the light heavyweight crown two months ago, is the favorite. The odds, though, were a tight 2 1/2-1 despite the champion's great popularity here.

Young Giambra, bidding for a return to the national ratings, was impressive in workouts all week. His left hook was sharp. Olson has been bothered by other left-hookers. Giambra showed a good right, too, plus supreme confidence. He held the No. 4 ranking in the middleweight division before entering the Army.

The junior championship was won by Samuel H. Kerr, 15-year-old Steubenville, Ohio, high school sophomore, who broke 96 from 19 yards.

The professionals didn't do as well as the amateurs. Cliff Doughman, Morro, Ohio, shot only 91 from 26 yards to pace that group.

The other match paired Polly Riley, advertising specialist from Fort Worth, Tex., who'll be 29 tomorrow, against Pat Lesser, 22, a Seattle University senior.

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## United States, Australia Today Start Davis Cup Battle

FOREST HILLS, N.Y. (AP) — The Davis Cup — perhaps the most coveted prize in international sports — went up for grabs today when the two titans of world tennis, the United States and Australia, clashed in the Challenge Round at the West Side Tennis Club.

Vic Seixas, the U. S. champion from Philadelphia crossed rackets with Ken Rosewall, an old nemesis, in the first singles match. The second singles test of the best-of-five competition pitted U.S. strong man Tony Trabert against the equally muscular Lewis Hoad.

The doubles — Seixas and Trabert against Hoad and Rex Hartwig—are scheduled for tomorrow, with the final two singles Sunday. If the decision still is in doubt going into Sunday's matches, Seixas will play Hoad, and Trabert, Rosewall.

But American Captain Billy Talbert sees no such eventuality. "We'll have a 3-0 lead by Sunday," he said. "That means we'll be playing for fun by then. I am already considering using Hamilton Richardson in one of the last two matches."

Talbert admitted he would prefer to have Trabert take the court ahead of Seixas, but that wasn't how Secretary of State John Foster Dulles pulled the pairings out yesterday.

"It isn't a major point, but Trabert would rather play first and if he son, Seixas would have a psychological advantage of not having so much pressure on him. Remember when we won the cup in Australia last year, Trabert played the first singles match and beat Hoad. That gave Seixas a lift."

If there was any pressure, it didn't appear to bother Seixas. "What's there to be nervous about?" asked the 32-year-old veteran. "I've played plenty of Davis Cup matches and a lot of first ones too. I've prepared for the Davis Cup and I'm ready."

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
