

Sheep Growers Favor Plan To Spur Lamb, Wool Sales

WASHINGTON — Owners of more than 72 per cent of the sheep in this country favor a campaign to spur lamb and wool sales, Secretary of Agriculture Benson said Friday.

Benson said this is shown by the preliminary results of a poll of the sheepmen.

The campaign would be financed through reductions from incentive payments to wool and lamb growers.

Benson disclosed the trend of the referendum as representatives of the sheep industry met with Commodity Credit Corp. officials to discuss price support levels for the 1956 wool clip.

Officials of the National Wool Growers Assn. and the National Wool Marketing Corp. recommended at this meeting a price support level of 65 cents a pound for shorn wool.

This would amount to 110 per cent of parity, and is the same recommendation made by these groups last year. The support price now is 63 cents a pound.

Representatives of the National Grange, the Farm Bureau Federation and the National Livestock Producers Assn. made no recommendations Friday. They asked

permission to file statements later with the secretary of agriculture.

Supports at 110 per cent of parity are the maximum that may be set under law. Department of Agriculture officials did not indicate how soon the 1956 supports will be announced.

In announcing results so far on the referendum concerning a wool and land production campaign, Benson said producers owning 9-127,000 sheep voted in favor of the program and owners of 3,517,000 sheep voted against it.

"If the final results of the referendum also show more than two

thirds approval the program will be placed in effect," Benson said. Final results of the poll are expected to be known early next month.

Forest Service, O & C Timber Ready For Swap

PORTLAND — Two federal agencies are about ready to exchange a half million acres of Western Oregon timberland. The Oregonian reported Thursday.

According to the newspaper the U. S. Forest Service and the Bureau of Land Management are near an appraisal agreement for an even swap.

The trade would be possible under a bill passed by Congress last year in an effort to consolidate federal holdings and make more timber accessible to cutting for mills.

The land involved is in national forest. Much of it is part of some 2 million acres of Oregon & California land grants administered by the BLM.

The biggest pieces to be exchanged are in Josephine and Jackson counties and in the Siskiyou forest of southwestern Oregon. But one part of the agreement is reported to provide for consolidation of federal lands in Clackamas County, in northwestern Oregon, to provide more timber for four Mollala sawmills. Those plants have been slowed by a log shortage.

The agreement would have to be approved by the 18 Western Oregon O & C counties, which receive 75 per cent of timber sales receipts from O & C lands.

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Russian Farming Standards Said Below Americans

WASHINGTON — Back from a tour of Russian farm lands, several American agricultural experts agreed Friday that Soviet farming by directive falls far short of results achieved by the American way.

John M. Jacobs, Phoenix, Ariz., said that if every U. S. farmer could see how tilling land and raising livestock is carried on by directives handed down by a soviet centralized government, Secretary of Agriculture Benson "wouldn't have much to do."

His implication seemed to be that given an overuse of regimentation American farmers would favor junking federal controls.

The farm delegates who covered 10,000 miles in Russia, said Russia goes in for one expensive and inefficient method of getting fats and oils by producing heavy, fat loaded hogs, now outmoded in this country.

They added that in Russia they never saw an ear of corn—used in America to produce good beef.

J. M. Kleiner of Nampa, Idaho, said a Russian farmer works a month for enough to buy two pairs of shoes. He contrasted Russian conditions with those of West Germany where he said he bought a child's dress for \$4, the goods alone for which would have cost \$6 in Russia.

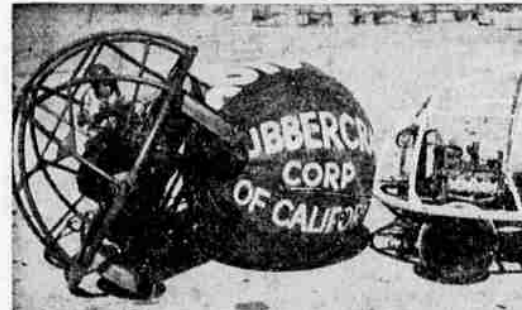

Lolo Pass Road Soon To Be Open To Public Use

PORTLAND — Lolo Pass road through the Portland city watershed preserve will be opened to the public—under some restrictions—on Sept. 15. It will open up the scenic northwest slope of Mt. Hood to travelers.

Portland and Hood River interests sought the opening and the Forest Service, after a conference with Portland city officials, approved it.

The opening date was announced Friday by Regional Forester J. Herbert Stone.

The road was built in 1932 by Bonneville Power Administration to provide access to the Big Eddy-Trontdale transmission line, and it also provides a link between Hood River and Zig Zag.

Stone pointed out that the road is narrow and winding and is suited only for light, slow traffic. Its use increases forest fire hazard, he said, and in times of high danger the road will be closed.

Motorists also may be required to register at the gates.

While the road crosses the watershed preserve, it is not in the actual watershed use area.

All-Jet B47s Take Top Places In Competition

RIVERSIDE, Calif. — All-Jet B47s took top places in missions concluded Thursday in the Strategic Air Command's bombing and navigation competition.

Top places in Wednesday night-Thursday morning missions went to B47s commanded by Maj. Wallace C. Hynds, of McDill Air Force Base, Fla.; Capt. Joseph Schreiber's crew from March Air Force Base here, and Maj. Howard C. Traylor's Castle Air Force Base crew from Merced, Calif.

Propeller-and-jet B36s, based at Fairchild Air Force Base, Spokane, finished out of the running.

The SAC competition continued Thursday night, when 34 planes resumed mock bombing raids on targets in Spokane, Sacramento, and Los Angeles.

Adenauer Will Fly From Bonn To Moscow Soon

BOON, Germany — Chancellor Konrad Adenauer will fly nonstop from Bonn to Moscow in an American-built plane for his conference with Russian leaders, the Foreign Office announced Friday.

Adenauer and his top advisers will leave Bonn Sept. 8 in a four-engine Constellation chartered from the German Lufthansa Airline, the announcement said. The chancellor returned Friday from a six-week vacation at Murren, Switzerland.

His talks with Soviet Premier Nikolai Bulganin and other Soviet leaders on establishing normal German-Russian relations, the outlook for German unity and the release of war prisoners will start Sept. 9.
