Carole Jo Greeted By Airport Crowd

The Sunday quiet of downtown Roseburg and Sutherlin was loudly pierced by the blare of automobile horns in welcome to Oregon's first national golf titlist.

Petite Carole Jo Kabler, winner of the national girls' junior championship at Florence, S.C., Aug. 19, was greeted by more than 100 well-wishers, including her parents, at Roseburg Airport as she returned from tournamentland.

The 17-year-old star was whisked into a convertible and taken in a caravan through Roseburg streets, then north on Highway 99 to the Sutherlin interchange. There, more Sutherlinites joined the caravan for a triumphant ride through her home town and to a reception in her honor.

Airplane Arrives Early

As the homecoming celebration at the airport was thrown off schedule early, but the quick arrival gave her a chance to see her family for a few minutes before being driven away.

As the plane arrived, Roseburg's Paul Bunyans swarmed close to greet Miss Kabler with their huge axes. About 50 people had arrived in time to see the airplane taxi up (the plane door was open by the time Carole Jo's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Kabler, arrived).

All the fuss was nearly too much for the young golfer, whose "home course" is Roseburg Country Club. She ducked away as the Bunyans surrounded her. Her parents beamed with pride, standing quietly by the terminal until their daughter made her way from the airplane.

Talks To Parents

As people continued to stream to the airport, the young champion retired to the West Coast Airlines lobby to talk with her parents and little brother, Tommy. She had small gifts for them, including some souvenir pennants for Tommy.

She wasn't tired from the overnight trip, she maintained. Two other tournament entrants flew back across country with her, and that helped to ease the long flight.

Carole Jo gave a sigh of relief for the Oregon weather. The "terrific" heat during the two tournaments she entered bothered her, she admitted. "It was so sticky, not like the heat of an Oregon summer."

From the airport terminal lobby, Miss Kabler stepped outside and was greeted by an ovation from the swelling crowd. She bashfully turned her back on the audience as the people from Sutherlin and Roseburg applauded.

Mayor Gives Welcome

Before joining the caravan, Sutherlin's Mayor Claude Kesner gave a short welcoming speech and presented the town's pride with a gift.

Also thrown off schedule by the early arrival of the plane, Roseburg's Mayor Ernest Barker Jr. jumped from his car at the airport in time to join the caravan through the city streets.

Although Miss Kabler is quickly learning there isn't much respite after becoming a national celebrity, the U.S. Golf Assn. girls crown-winner expects to find a few moments to relax before she goes to Medford for the Southern Oregon Golf Championships. The Medford tourney will start Thursday, lasting over Labor Day weekend.

Carole Jo, winner of state and Portland titles earlier this year, was eliminated from national women's amateur competition at Charlotte, N.C., last week by her same-age friend and foe, Anne Quast of Marysville, Wash. Another Northwesterner, Pat Lesser, 22, Seattle, went on to win.

Drain's pennant-winning Black Sox wrapped up their Southern Oregon League season over the weekend with a pair of victories over Bandon.

Wins of 15-2 and 7-4 left Roy Helsner's crew with a remarkable 22-2 season record.

Jerry Cade struck out 13 men while giving up six walks to lead the Sox victory Saturday night at the coastal city. Dick Duerr, who struck out eight and gave up four bases on balls, was Sunday's winning hurler.

Manager Helsner, who was to leave today for his coaching duties at Linfield College, pinpointed Pat Wohlers as one of the outstanding sluggers Saturday night. Wohlers had a home run and a triple in four times at the plate.

The round-tripper came in the fifth with one man on.

Other Sox with two hits each: Don Porter, Ted Wilson, Jerry Cade, Vera Marshall and Bill Beard. Bandon's losing pitcher, Dick Morana, struck out four and gave up seven walks.

Coquille nabbed two from Grants Pass over the weekend, ending Roseburg's place out of the cellar.

The Elks led through the first six innings of a seven-inning contest Sunday, but Coquille rallied for three runs in the last inning to sew up the game 9-8. Saturday night, the Loggers had little trouble in winning 12-6.

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Rams Nip Giants In Pro Contest

They won't show in the official won and lost columns, but San Francisco and Los Angeles exhibition successes would indicate the Rams and Giants are ready at this early stage to challenge for the Western Division title in the National Football League.

The 49ers fought off a desperate two-touchdown final quarter rally by the Cleveland Browns, Eastern Division winners, to take a 17-14 victory at San Francisco Sunday.

Meanwhile, the Rams nipped the New York Giants 23-17 in an overtime game at Portland, Ore.

Last year's lowly Chicago Cardinals tripped the division champion Detroit Lions 17-16 in St. Louis, and the Pittsburgh Steelers squeezed by the Green Bay Packers 16-14 at Green Bay in other games.

The Rams went 3 1/2 minutes over time, under terms of a pre-game agreement, with Tom Younger plunging over untouched from the two-yard line.

The score was tied 17-17 at the end of regulation play and the Rams won the toss for possession of the ball for the overtime session and advanced 70 yards in five plays. The sudden death play-off was one of two innovations. The other was the marking of the field from 0 to 100, rather than from 0 to 50 and back to 0, to aid spectators in following the game.

New York opened a 10-0 lead in the first quarter, but Younger scored the first Ram touchdown in the opening minutes of the second.

Tad West tied the score in the third with a 25-yard field goal and late in the same period Ron Walker tallied for Los Angeles. The Giants tied the score when Alex Webster scored in the final quarter.

Purse Impounded In Armory Brawl

None of seven mat bruisers picked up a \$250 purse in a bloody "over the top" battle royal at the Roseburg Armory Saturday night.

A final-round action between Doug Donovan and Luigi Macera ended in a "no match" when the wrestlers got completely out of hand. Ring police had to be called in to stop the face-pounding, and Referee Thor Hagen called it quits.

Up to that point, Macera had taken the first fall in 10:05 with a press, and Donovan evened the count with a backbreaker in 12:21.

The two matheurs had won the right to try for the cash by cleaning out five foes in the earlier royal go, whereby the wrestlers were eliminated only when thrown or rolled over the top rope and out rope and out of the arena.

Thor Hagen was the first to go, followed by Killer Kameroff, Gory Guerrero, Henry Lenz and George Drake. John Arjun, also scheduled to take part, did not show up.

In earlier action, Kameroff was disqualified by the referee in 12:45 of his bout with Guerrero. Guerrero had taken the first fall.

Time ran out on Lenz and Drake in a one-fall, 20-minute contest.

Wesley Guy of Myrtle Point Sunday afternoon saw two of his mounts post winnings worth \$216 to him. His were the biggest winnings of the Douglas County Fair's race card Sunday.

His horse, Ina, won the quarter-mile open race, and his horse, Gio, led to the wire in the half-mile open. Each win was worth \$84. Then, Gio came to win the last race of the day. It galloped home four lengths ahead of the field in the quarter-mile special for winners of \$48.

One of the finest races of the day came in the "Doc" Carter trophy action. Okie, ridden by July Storde and owned by her father, Larry, kept a lead in the quarter-mile race until the home stretch. Then Misty, owned and piloted by Lyle McMillan, made a tremendous bid that missed by inches overtaking the winner.

Another Horse Wins

Another top race was the half-mile open. Mrs. C. E. Steen's Big Smoke, ridden by F. E. Peery, had little trouble winning the match, but it had been a few furlongs longer the story might have been different. Coming around the last turn, Alda Reno's Smoky, a Salem horse, came roaring from last in the field to bound over the finish in second.

The races and accompanying jackpot rodeo drew a crowd of perhaps 1,000.

Shrine Contest Taken By West

PENDLETON — The Western Oregon class B high school all-stars edged the East prep all-stars 7-6 in a Shrine benefit game here Saturday night.

The winning point was scored by Gene Moneley, a 6-foot tackle from Coquille, after West had scored in the final quarter.

East, which punched over a touchdown in the first quarter, led until the final period when Evor Kumpula of Knappa knotted the count with a 1-yard plunge. Kumpula, a 185-pound halfback, led the West touchdown drive with a pass to Monroe's Harry Wall that accounted for 39 yards.

That put the ball on the East 9-yard line. It was advanced to the East 3 on two penalties and three plays later Kumpula went over right tackle to score.

East tallied with 1 1/2 minutes remaining in the opening period, advancing 50 yards on 11 plays. Merle Hatch, a 156-pound halfback from Joseph, circled left end into the West end zone.

Dennis Swanson of Tione failed in his conversion attempt.

Then West drove 56 yards to the East 3, but the advance died there as Alsea's Rod Holter was hit for a two-yard loss.

East led in first downs, 11-8, but trailed slightly in total yardage, 171-170.

Harold Duncan of Moro was chosen by a Shrine committee as outstanding player of the game. Swanson for the East and Jim McAben of Talent for the West were chosen best linemen. In the backfield it was West's Ron Matheny of Lowell and East's Larry Groves of Lexington.

Proceeds from the game, seen by some 8,000, went to the Shrine Hospital for Crippled Children in Portland.

In a horse race at Monmouth Park this year, Papa Tony was the winner. Doctor Tony ran second.

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
