

### Possible Death Penalty Facing Prison Rioters

WALLA WALLA (AP)—Charges of kidnaping, conspiracy to kidnap and prison rioting—with a death penalty—have been filed against ringleaders of the July 5-6 riots at the Washington State Prison in Walla Walla.

Walla Walla County Prosecutor Arthur Hawman filed first degree kidnaping charges Saturday against 11 men. He also charged them with counts of conspiracy and rioting.

Seven others were charged with conspiracy to kidnap, and two men were charged with prison rioting.

The prison riot charge is a new one. The 1935 Legislature enacted the law under which it was filed.

The 11 men charged with first degree kidnaping were Emory Cobb, Harry Beine, Roy E. Erb, Charles N. Lambert, James W. Singletary, Edward Geer, Neal Fisk, David W. Hinkle, James Frazier, Charles S. McCabe and German C. Salter.

Salter was involved in an escape at Medical Lake Sunday night. He is still at large.

The seven charged with conspiracy to kidnap and prison riots were Russell Summers, Richard Armstrong, Kenneth George, Irvin Squires, Larry Olson, Cecil King and James L. Davis. A conspiracy conviction could carry a 10-year prison term.

Nolton E. Jacob and James R. Stanley were charged only with prison riot, which can carry a 1 to 10 year prison sentence.

**Harmful Effects Of Fumes Issue**

PORTLAND (AP)—Evidence showing the harmful effects of industrial fumes on cattle will be permitted in a damage suit by three persons who contend their health was impaired by fluorine fumes from the Reynolds Metals Co. aluminum plant at Troutdale. The three, Mr. and Mrs. Paul Martin and their daughter Verla, are asking \$350,000 damages. Earlier they were awarded \$47,000 for damage the fluorine fumes did to cattle on their 1,500-acre ranch, located between the Columbia and Sandy rivers. An attorney for Reynolds argued that what had happened to the cattle had no bearing on the effect of fluorine on human beings. But Federal Judge William G. East ruled otherwise Monday and admitted the evidence. The Martins also are asking that the court stop the plant's operation. A spokesman for the company said two million dollars had been spent by Reynolds on its fume control system.

**Elderly Recluse Found Dead Among Possessions**

BILOXI, Miss. (AP)—The scantily clad body of an elderly recluse was found yesterday amid a pile of possessions and debris that included four live and four dead parrots and canaries. Officers said Mrs. Alice M. Parker had been dead a week. The date of death was set at Aug. 22 by a coroner's jury, which also ruled death resulted from natural causes.

GEARHART, Ore. (AP)—A Ford Foundation grant of \$60,000 will permit expansion of library service in the region. William H. Carlson told the Pacific Northwest Library Assn. conference Monday. Carlson, Oregon State College librarian, told the session that the foundation had made the grant this spring. Other speakers at Monday's meeting—attended by more than 300 delegates from four Pacific Northwest states and British Columbia—were State Treasurer Sig Underander and Oceanor Stephens, State of Oregon librarian. Sen. Neuburger (D-Ore.), speaking at Monday night's banquet session, discussed the historic peaceful relationship between the Lewis and Clark Expedition and the Indians they met. He said this "entitles the descendants of these Indians to great social justice and equity."
