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Israel Puts Price Tag On Cease Fire

Wants Egypt To Admit Guilt In Hot Conflict

JERUSALEM (AP)—Israel bridled Wednesday at joining Egypt in a cease-fire on the strife-torn Gaza front, demanding that Egypt first take the blame for starting border violence that continued into the seventh straight day.

Israel's resentment was aimed in part at the phrasing of the U.N. proposed cease-fire order. An Israeli government spokesman here said it put "Israel, which was being attacked and invaded by terrorist bands, on the same level as Egypt, which is the aggressor."

It was regarded highly unlikely that Egypt would acknowledge itself the aggressor.

Egypt agreed Tuesday to a cease-fire beginning at 6 p.m. Wednesday. The proposal was designed to halt the weeklong outbreak of pitched battles, infiltrations, and ambushes that has left more than a score of Israelis and Egyptians dead and many others wounded.

In Cairo, an Egyptian communiqué said Egyptian commandos had entered Israeli territory and blown up a broadcasting station only six miles from Tel Aviv. It said the commandos also had blasted two Israeli armored cars near Madgal.

These commandos were believed to be irregulars operating across the frontier in retaliation for continuing Israeli attacks, according to Egyptian observers. Before the Cairo communiqué was issued, Egyptian newspapers said commandos had penetrated Israel for about 25 miles Tuesday to carry out "punitive action" against the population, killing 15 to 20 Israelis.

Fort Ord Soldiers To Face Charges Of Armed Robbery

Two young soldiers from Ft. Ord, Calif., were to be brought to Roseburg today to face a charge of armed robbery in connection with the holdup Tuesday night of a Myrtle Creek grocery.

Robert Eugene Mitchell, 18, and Richard Allen McKelvey, 17, were being held in the Coos County jail at Coquille after their arrest at 1:20 a.m. by state police.

Myrtle Creek Growing Despite Mill's Loss

Despite the fear that loss of Umpqua Plywood's plant at Myrtle Creek last year would create a "ghost town," the city apparently is still growing.

At least, school enrollment is still on its way up.

Supt. Al Neel of District 19 to-day said registration stands at 1,606 in district schools. Last year on Aug. 31 the figure was 1,590.

The gain stands at 16 on the first day of school, with more registrations expected after Labor Day.

Supt. Neel also reported the last teacher vacancy has been filled, according to correspondent Ruth M. Evans. Richard Radford will head the vocal music program for the district. He was formerly at Redlands, Calif.

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Los Angeles smog, worst of the season, was listed by the county air pollution control director Wednesday as a crisis. Gov. Goodwin J. Knight said he is prepared to declare a state of disaster if necessary.

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Car Accident Cause Of Power Outage In Sutherlin Area

A 32-year-old Sutherlin woman, Nancy C. Strand, was recovering satisfactorily at Community Hospital today after an accident in which her car clipped a power pole and cut off electricity for Oakland and Sutherlin about half an hour.

Mrs. Strand received cuts and bruises in the mishap, but her two children, Louvia Ann, 10, and Gary Allan, 8, were not hurt. Mrs. Strand was to have X-rays today.

Sutherlin and county police were called to the scene about two miles south of Sutherlin on old Highway 99. A deputy sheriff said the mishap happened about 11:15 p.m. as Mrs. Strand was driving toward Sutherlin.

She told officers she apparently dozed off. The car went off the highway and hit the power pole. Stearns & Little ambulance took Mrs. Strand to Roseburg while workers repaired damage.

In other accidents, three youths escaped injury when their car flipped over Tuesday afternoon, and no one was hurt in a two-car mishap just north of Roseburg.

State police said a car driven by Benjamin Williams, 37, Sutherlin, went out of control on the Nonpareil Road east of Sutherlin about 1:45 p.m. Williams told officers he accidentally placed his foot on the gas pedal when the car door came open. The car struck several mailboxes and a post before hitting a bank and rolling over, officers said.

They reported no injuries to Williams or his two passengers, James Cratty, 15, and Reece Cratty, 16, both of Sutherlin.

State police said a car operated by Sam Mesher, 66, 3112 N. E. Knott St., Portland, struck the rear of another driven by Malinda Miller, 66, 604 S. Stephens St., Roseburg, at 1:20 p.m. They said both cars were proceeding north on Highway 99 when Mrs. Miller stopped to allow a third vehicle to turn. No citations were issued, and damage was slight, they said.

County Signs Order To Pay O & C Attorney's Share

Members of the County Court signed an order Tuesday approving a payment of \$3,043.20 as the county's share of the annual salary of the legal counsel for the Assn. of O & C Counties.

Guy Gordon, former U.S. senator now residing in Washington, was hired June 10 to be full-time legal counsel for the association at a salary of \$12,000 per year.

Douglas County's share of the salary expense was figured according to the 25.36 per cent of 1955 grant lands revenues paid the county.

Gordon will be in Portland Sept. 8 for a general meeting of the association, according to Carl C. Hill, county judge and president of the association.

Flood Damage Not As Great As Estimated

WASHINGTON (AP)—A White House conference on flood relief took stock of the situation in six Northeastern states Wednesday and concluded that the damage there is not as great as first estimated.

Val Peterson, civil defense administrator and coordinator of the federal rehabilitation job, told a news conference after a two-hour session of 10 agency heads that relief and rehabilitation is not going to cost the federal government as much as at first believed.

Peterson emphasized, however, that there is still a big job to be done. He said the conference decided to "keep pushing" until it is done.

Peterson presided at the conference which was set up by White House staff members at the request of President Eisenhower, now vacationing in Colorado.

Army engineers have given a preliminary estimate of \$1,500,000, 600 as the possible total damage in the flood area, and the government share in the recovery program has been estimated up to 100 million dollars or more.

U. N. Committee Studies American Inspection Proposal

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—Members of the U.N. Disarmament subcommittee today studied a U.S. proposal to merge American and Soviet plans for inspection machinery to prevent surprise attacks.

The new American plan was outlined in detail yesterday to the five-nation subcommittee by Harold E. Stassen, President Eisenhower's special assistant on disarmament and the U.S. representative at the arms talks which opened here Monday.

Stassen recommended that Eisenhower's Geneva proposal for a Soviet-American exchange of military blueprints and aerial inspection rights be combined with the previous Russian suggestion that ground inspection teams be stationed at key ports, airports and railway and road junctions to check on movements of troops and armaments.

A highly placed American source said if the subcommittee, which also includes representatives of France, Britain and Canada, did not adopt the U.S. plan, approval would be sought in the parent 12-nation Disarmament Commission and in the U.N. General Assembly opening Sept. 20 if necessary.

Stassen told the group yesterday aerial inspection and exchange of defense blueprints, together with ground observer checks, would provide a foolproof safeguard against surprise attack by either Russia or United States.

Gen. Twining Warns Soviet Aircraft Catching Up Fast

BOSTON (AP)—Gen. Nathan F. Twining warned Wednesday that a "flood of aircraft streaming from the aviation arsenals of the Soviet Union holds far more potential danger than the mightiest hurricane."

The Air Force chief of staff said the United States is "well ahead in the kind of air power the Soviets respect." But he cautioned that Russian aircraft production is catching up fast, not only in quantity but in quality.

"If we do let the Reds catch up in air power," Twining declared, "you may be certain that a Soviet attack would be more likely than it is now."

The general, in a speech to the 50th national encampment of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, reported on progress by the U. S. Air Force.

He said the nation is still almost two years away from the 137-wing goal set for the Air Force in 1955.

Twining said the radar warning line along the U.S.-Canadian boundary is now complete and that work is well under way on a mid-Canada line. But he said the "DEW" or Distant Early Warning line, in the Arctic is just getting started.

The general said it will be another year before the Air Defense Command gets super-sonic interceptors capable of destroying enemy aircraft with guided missiles.

However, he said U. S. air defense is strong enough so "we can now promise to destroy so many of them as enemy bombers that an aggressor would have to gamble on losing a high proportion of his attacking force."

Spelling Champ Decides To Take \$16,000 Winnings

NEW YORK (AP)—Little Gloria Lockerman has taken her \$16,000 winnings and passed up a chance to spell her way to more wealth on the \$64,000 Question television show.

Here's how she figured it would be a hard question. "It would be a jumble of words I never heard of and then I'd be lost. I thought the sensible thing to do was to stop where I was. I'd rather go away and be Gloria the undefeated champion than Gloria the girl who lost."

"Besides," the 12-year-old Negro schoolgirl from Baltimore told newsmen after the CBS program last night, "it's \$16,000 more than I started out with."

She will net about \$11,000 after federal income taxes, according to best estimates. She received \$500 to use as she wishes, and master of ceremonies Hal March said the rest of the money will be put into a trust fund for her education.

Marion Corps Capt. Richard S. McCracken, Worthington, Ohio, reached the \$16,000 mark last night in his quiz category of cooking and foods. He named the flours and geographical origins of five kinds of bread.

Gino Prato, who recently won \$32,000 on the program by answering questions about opera, left with his wife, daughter and son-in-law by plane last night for Italy to visit his 82-year-old father Giovanni, whom he hasn't seen in 35 years.

"It's my dream came true," said the 53-year-old Italian-born cab driver.

Gloria was smiling and just as self-possessed as she was when she spelled "antidisestablishmentarianism" and other jawbreakers.

In addition to the money, the program gave her a television set, a bicycle, a tape recorder and a year's supply of comic books.

Peron Followers Protest Offer Of Resignation

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP)—President Juan D. Peron offered to resign Wednesday. The response was a mass demonstration of strength by his followers who insisted that he continue in office.

Alberto Tessaire, vice president of the republic, announced that he, too, would resign if Peron steps out. Provincial governors also announced they would resign if the president does.

The Argentine House of Deputies had to cancel its session Wednesday afternoon because the Peron majority announced refusal to attend until Peron withdraws his resignation offer.

The president addressed his offer to the Central Confederation of Labor and the leadership of his own Peronista Party. Both clearly had been primed to receive and reject it.

The long message said: "The time for fighting has passed. The time has come to work and consolidate our revolutionary gains. I offer my retirement to insure pacification. I do not want to be an obstacle. . . . It is not possible to destroy what we have built."

"They speak of civil war," it continued. "I do not believe it will happen here. There will be peace or dictatorship. I have no taste for dictatorship. If that is the solution, someone else will have to do it."

Southern Douglas Mill Destroyed By Fire Monday

Only smoldering embers, a cold deck and an office building remained of the Tri Lumber Co. in southern Douglas County Wednesday.

Plans concerning rebuilding of the sawmill and edger, destroyed by flames Monday night, have not been announced by owner Don Kleck, Canyonville Volunteer Fire Dept. Chief George McClane estimated damage at \$150,000, according to News-Review Correspondent Virginia Proctor. The sawmill is located two miles east of Canyonville on the Days Creek Road. It was partially insured.

Cause of the fire which spread over the four-acre plant in less than 10 minutes was not known. It started at 6:05 p.m. Monday. A company scaler, Bob Young, Canyonville, told Chief McClane he was sealing a load of logs when he noticed a small flame near the edger.

Young raced 50 yards to put out the fire. He was unsuccessful. The flame exploded and spread quickly. Young and an unnamed night watchman called the Canyonville volunteers. The 14-man crew worked until 10 p.m. to prevent the flames from spreading to dry grasslands and nearby timber. A Douglas Forest Protective Assn. crew stood by to help, if necessary.

No persons were seriously injured by the fire, Mrs. Proctor said. Young suffered heat exhaustion and was taken to Forest Glen Hospital. He was released Tuesday.

The correspondent said the edger destroyed in the blaze, was insured only last week. The Tri Lumber Co. was known formerly as the Rice Lumber Mill.

Randolph of Emanuel Hospital and Melvin Murphy, executive secretary of the Oregon Mental Health Assn.

Site Selected For Transmitter On Mt. Baldy

Live Broadcasting Not Planned At Present, But Is Ultimate Goal

Dec. 1 has been named target date for the first signal from Roseburg's new television broadcasting station, KPIC-TV, on channel 4.

The date was announced here Tuesday afternoon by C. H. Fisher, Portland, president of the Southwest Oregon Television Broadcasting Corp., and S. W. McCready, manager of KVAL-TV, Eugene, channel 12.

They said site of the transmitter has been changed. It will be built atop Mt. Baldy (Rose Mt.), a 1,700-foot elevation between New 100 Creek Road and Rifle Range Road. A 170-foot tower is to be built.

The site still is subject to approval by the Federal Communications Commission. Originally, the company had planned to put the transmitting tower atop the Nabo Ridge just southwest of the fairgrounds.

General Electric Co. engineers completed a survey of the new site only last week, Fisher revealed. A location for a downtown studio still is to be selected, he revealed.

Initially, the station will pick up signals from KVAL-TV, but live broadcasting from Roseburg is in the ultimate plans of the company. Before live broadcasts are made.

Bonanza Corp. Gets Government Funds For Exploration

A contract for \$33,500 in federal funds for exploration work has been signed by the Bonanza Oil and Mine Corp., Sutherlin, with the Defense Mineral Exploration Administration, according to The Associated Press.

The federal money must be matched by \$14,300 of company funds.

Bert Avery, mine supervisor, said the money will be spent for exploration "within the immediate area" of the mine, located about seven miles east of Sutherlin. The work will consist of a combination of drilling and excavation.

The money allotted the Sutherlin company was included in \$468,000 in federal funds distributed in the Northwest. About \$318,000 is to be provided under new DMEA contracts; the rest under amended agreements made earlier.

To stimulate the search for ore, the government puts up a share of the cost which is repaid out of profits by the mines if anything is found.

Largest Northwest agreement by the DMEA, Spokane office is with Sunset Mines of Kellogg, Idaho, for \$101,125. The federal agency will match company expenditures up to half the total cost in the search for new lead and zinc deposits.

Other contracts, with DMEA's share of cost followed by operator's share, included:

Crescent magnesium mine, Clallam County, Wash., \$23,250 and \$7,500.

Twin Sisters magnesium and chrome mine, Seattle, \$34,812 and \$10,904, for chromium exploration, \$12,087 and \$12,087.

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
