

Rita Broken Up Over Separation

HOLLYWOOD — Rita Hayworth was described Tuesday as so emotionally shocked by her separation from Dick Haymes that she is confined to her bed.

The actress, who announced Monday she was leaving the crooner, was due in federal court Tuesday for a hearing on her breach of contract suit against Columbia Pictures.

The hearing was continued to Nov. 15 after her attorney filed an affidavit signed by Dr. Fred V. Cerini which said:

"The separation was such an emotional shock that I have ordered her to bed for several days. She was so upset I prescribed sedatives for her. Her health would be endangered if she were forced to attend the trial."

Miss Hayworth said she walked out "in the best interests of my children, Dick and myself."

ACTUAL DAYS NOTED

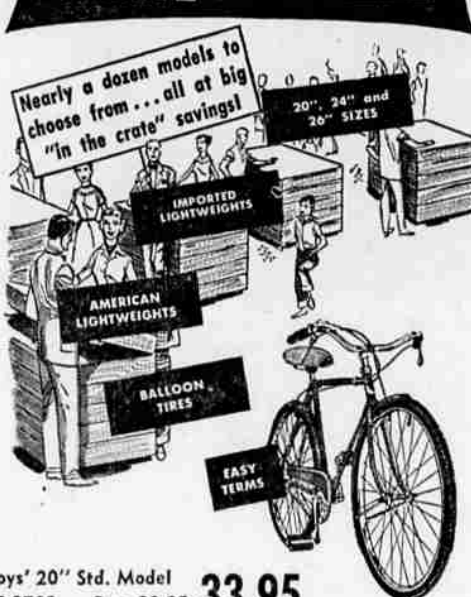
Roseburg schools will have 178 actual attendance days in the classroom during the 1955-56 year, four legal holidays and four in-service sessions for teachers.

Uranium To Aid Indians Build Up Their Reservation

SPOKANE — Thanks to uranium, the Spokane Indian tribe finally has hope of building up its reservation into a sound economic unit, Glen Galbraith, secretary of the tribal business council, said Tuesday.

Uranium has been found on the Spokane reservation north of here in Stevens County and Galbraith called it a symbol of hope to the Indians in a report to the National Congress of American Indians.

"For the first time the tribe has hopes of building up the reservation to a point where it will provide good living conditions for members."

"Housing conditions have been

poor. The land is of doubtful agricultural value in most instances. Most employment has been seasonal, with logging operations the principal employment for a few months in the summer."

Galbraith said the Indians don't want to sit back and just collect uranium royalties but want to participate in the prospecting, the negotiation of leases and the development of mines.

The Congress is in the second

day of a week-long session with 100 delegates from 40 tribes. Most delegates are at downtown hotels but six teepees have been set up at High Bridge Park by others.

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
