Portland and San Diego tied for third place 4 1/2 back in the Pacific Coast League, may offer more than a mathematical challenge to league leading Seattle and Hollywood.

The San Diego Padres take on Sacramento at home Wednesday night. In their last home series with the Solons they took five out of seven games.

And Portland displayed its keen interest by handing Seattle and Lou Kretlow a 5-2 defeat Tuesday night in the opener of a long series at Portland, where a doubleheader is scheduled Wednesday night. In other games Tuesday night Los Angeles defeated Hollywood 2-1, and Oakland demolished San Francisco 10-3. San Diego and Sacramento were idle.

Portland scored its winning runs in the seventh inning after Frank Egert walked and both Don Austin and pitcher Bill Werle bunted safely to load the bases.

Egert came home after Carl Pows' sacrifice fly and Austin came around when Kretlow pitched wild. Austin bunted again in the eighth to squeeze in a run after the Beavers had loaded the bases. It was only the second defeat all season for Kretlow, who has won 13 games.

Hollywood's Bob Garber allowed only five hits and struck out 13 batters. But two of those hits, were home runs by Solly Drake and Gale Wade. They gave Los Angeles its victory margin.

The Stars' only run came in the seventh when Carlos Bernier singled, stole second, went to third on Jack Lohrke's sacrifice, and scored on Bobby Prescott's single.

Pitcher Fred Besana hit a grand slam home run to help Oakland to victory over San Francisco. The homer climaxed a six-run rally in the eighth inning after the Seals had narrowed the score to 4-3.

Oakland's Art Cuiti doubled and Billy Consolo and Jim Marshall were walked to load the bases. Russ Rose doubled home two runs and Lenny Neal was purposely passed in the hope that Besana would hit into a double play. He didn't.

Nashua, Swaps Making History

CHICAGO (AP)—Nashua from the East and Swaps from the West—possibly the most brilliant 3-year-olds ever to be matched—take off today in what should rank as one of the greatest showdowns in thoroughbred racing history.

They will settle sophomore honors and undoubtedly Horse of the Year recognition in a \$100,000 winner-take-all race at 1 1/4 miles on Washington Park's "neutral" dirt oval.

Each will pack 128 pounds—the same impost, the same distance, and the same jockeys as in their only other 1955 meeting—the Kentucky Derby. In that race, Nashua with Eddie Arcaro up challenged strongly in mid-stretch only to have Willie Shoemaker and Swaps sweep on to a 1 1/2-length triumph in 2:01.8.

Since then, William Woodward Jr.'s Nashua has won the Preakness, Belmont, Dwyer and Arlington Classic for a sophomore record of eight triumphs in nine starts and earnings of \$389,700, just \$119,707 short of Citation's record as a 3-year-old.

The California-bred Swaps, owned by Rex C. Ellsworth, in the meantime added the Will Rogers, Californian, the Westerner and the American Derby to his list, compiling a record of eight straight victories as a 3-year-old, and earnings of \$418,550.

Significant in Swaps' streak was the California June 11 at Hollywood Park when Jockey Dave Erb, subbing for the grounded Shoemaker, beat the 1954 Kentucky Derby winner Determine and other older horses by 1 1/2 lengths for the mile and one sixteenth in 1:40.4. It was an American record for the distance.

The match race contenders have worked in spectacular fashion for the showdown and are considered in peak condition. This, parlayed with a forecast of fair and pleasant weather, plus a possible fast track, added up to a "natural" for the race.

The race will be televised and broadcast at 3 p.m., EST, by CBS. Odds list Swaps at 3-5 and Nashua 6-5.

Macera, Donovan Schedule Boxing Match To Settle Tiff

Luigi Macera and Dirty Doug Donovan, whose main event match at the Roseburg Armory last Saturday ended in a near-riot, have hit on a unique method of settling their differences after the regular wrestling card this coming Saturday.

Matchmaker Elton Owen said the two will hook up in a four-round boxing exhibition. The winner will claim the \$250 purse which was impounded last week when the two disregarded referee's instructions.
