YOUR BODY

There is a disease involving the pituitary gland known as Frohlich's Syndrome, which is characterized particularly by a girdle type obesity or accumulation of fat around the hips, sexual underdevelopment and disturbed water balance in the body which gives the individual a puffy appearance. This condition is quite common and is not a matter of age or sex. The physician sees examples of this condition most frequently in boys during adolescence. This is not because Frohlich's syndrome affects girls less frequently, but because the condition is more apparent and alarming in the boys—underdeveloped external sex organs, girdle type obesity, and fat pads over the chest which have the appearance of female breasts; are the usual symptoms. Hence, doctors see more males than females with this disease as many such disturbances in the female are overlooked.

The fault lies primarily with a disturbed function of the pituitary gland. There is also to some extent a disturbance of function in the hypothalamus, a part of the brain dealing with glandular function and is intimately connected with the pituitary gland. Other contributing causes of this disease are hereditary factors and severe toxic illnesses or injury, which



cause great shock to the whole endocrine system and particularly to the pituitary gland. The average case showing evidence of Frohlich's syndrome is so typical and the symptoms are so obvious, it is often surprising that so many parents fail to suspect the disease when it exists in their own children.

The girdle type obesity with fat concentrated mainly in the abdominal region, hips, thighs, upper arms, breasts, and back of neck, sexual underdevelopment are very prominent symptoms. There are however several others which no doubt should be mentioned. In boys there may be testicle underdevelopment of one or both, if the testicles have descended they usually are very small, hair distribution is feminine in type, and breast development is rather pronounced. In girls, external genital abnormalities are not conclusive, therefore, are frequently overlooked until menstrual disorders appear.

Height is normal or taller than average. The hands are short and pudgy, and the arms and legs are long. Intelligence is usually normal. These individuals are usually good natured, but often develop a tendency to shyness and seclusion and become self-conscious of their abnormality. (Ed. Adv.)

Jolley, Portland, assistant regional forester; Rex Wakelind, supervisor of the Siuslaw National Forest; and James J. Loefer, ranger in the Smith River District of the Siuslaw National Forest.

French To Order Arafa To Abdicate Moroccan Throne

RABAT, Morocco (AP) — French authorities are expected to issue a formal request this weekend to abdicate Sultan Mohammed Ben Moulay Arafa to step down from his pink and gold throne.

The 74-year-old ruler has held the largely ornamental job since the French deposed Sultan Mohammed Ben Youssef more than two years ago on grounds he used his position to stir up the cause of Moroccan nationalism.

Ben Youssef was exiled to Madagascar. The anniversary of his ouster touched off demonstrations two weeks ago resulting in the bloody massacre at Oued Zem which claimed the lives of 91 Europeans. This was followed by French punitive expeditions in which an estimated 1,000 Moroccans perished.

Collaboration Charges Against Soldier Dropped

FORT LEWIS, Wash. (AP) — Charges against Maj. Harold Kaschok of Paisley, Ore., alleging collaboration with the enemy while a prisoner of war in Korea, have been dropped, Brig. Gen. Paul L. Freeman Jr., commanding general of the 2nd Infantry Division, announced Friday.

Gen. Freeman said a review of this evidence in the case disclosed that it did not warrant trial by court martial.

Freeman's decision came a few weeks after a nine man Army court martial cleared Lt. Jefferson D. Erwin of similar charges.

Testimony at the Erwin trial disclosed that he and Kaschok served together in the 2nd Division, and that they were held prisoners by the Communist Reds.

Oregon Traffic Officials Optimistic For Weekend

SALEM (AP) — Oregon traffic officials were optimistic Friday as the state headed into the heavy Labor Day week end traffic.

Public awareness of the need for head-up driving is probably at an all-time high, Secretary of State Earl T. Newby said.

Police departments have distributed 200,000 leaflets calling attention to vacation traffic dangers and press, radio and television coverage has been unusually thorough, Newby said.

The summer-long "slow down and live" campaign throughout the U. S. has been stressed in Oregon for the first time this year.

Five persons were killed in Oregon traffic accidents over last year's Labor Day week end.

Stephens St. Attendants there said the brown colored monkey had been frightened, but was not injured. They said it was the first time they had treated a monkey who had been involved in a car mishap.

"We've had dogs before and some chinchillas," they reported.

State police said Buckles was traveling north about 10 p.m. when he swerved into the southbound lane of traffic, hitting Dykeman. Both vehicles were damaged. They were towed away by Walt's Towing & Ambulance.

Lions Club Sees Lumber Pictures

The Roseburg Lumber Company portrayed in color motion pictures of the nation, was shown to the Roseburg Lions Club Thursday night by Al McBee, office employee of the company.

McBee in a brief talk prior to showing the pictures said the plant's sawmill operation cut about 120 million board feet of lumber last year, and 85 million feet of 3 1/2 inch average plywood. The company employs 1,015 men and has an annual payroll of between \$3 1/2 and \$4 million. He discussed the problem of building roads into logging operations and told of other phases of the production, including marketing. Total of 5,190 boxcars are needed to distribute the finished lumber, all of which is dried in kilns.

The motion pictures, which will be shown throughout the country to interested parties, include the production of lumber, from the cutting of trees in the forests to final shipment.

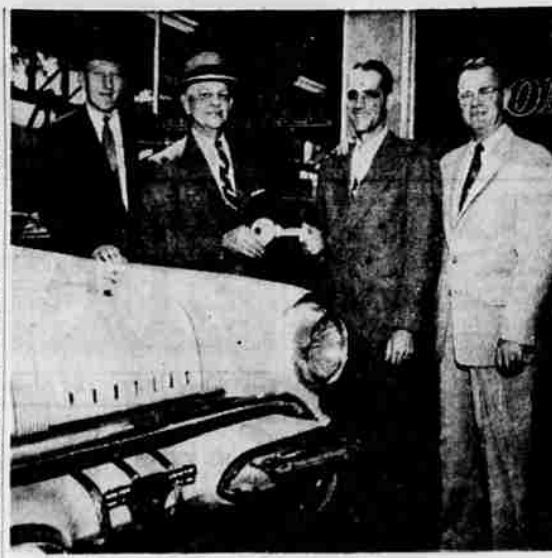

Air Crash Takes Lives Of 12 On Flight To Nome

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP) — A rescue crew has reached the scene of a C-119 crash 65 miles northwest of here, the Air Force reported Saturday, but there has been no report from them as to the possibility of survivors.

Twelve men — five crew members and seven passengers — were believed killed in the crash and burning of the Air Force transport. The tragedy occurred Thursday night as the disabled plane tried to return to an emergency airstrip in a wilderness area.

The Air Force identified the 12 men Saturday, listing them as missing pending a final report.

Those aboard included Airman 2C, Durwood K. Johnson, Spokane, Wash., and T. Sgt. E. T. Jordan, Blackfoot, Idaho.

Ice-Trapped Ship Is Working Free

ALESUND, Norway (AP) — The owners of a Norwegian ship reported trapped in a Greenland ice-pack said Saturday it had worked the vessel was working free of ice under its own power.

Earlier the U.S. Air Force reported its planes were trying to rescue the 25 men aboard the ship, the 488-ton Jopeter, a steel-hulled seal catcher.

A spokesman for Peter S. Brandal and Co., owners of the ship, said it received a message saying that the ice pack around the vessel was breaking up.

The Jopeter was reported carrying 19 passengers and a crew of 16 from Greenland to Copenhagen. It had been reported trapped on the East coast of Greenland.

South Umpqua Drainage Area Field Trip Set

A field trip to the South Umpqua River drainage to view U.S. Forest Service studies on direct seeding and natural regeneration of sugar and ponderosa pine has been scheduled for the Umpqua-Coguille chapter of the Society of American Foresters for Sept. 17.

Leo Isaac, researcher for the Pacific Northwest Forest and Range Experiment Station, Portland, will lead the expedition. Foresters also will see ponderosa pine plantations and heater rust control, pruning and other aspects of sugar pine management.

Isaac also will lead the evening's discussion on observations of the day at a dinner at Canyonville Community Center.

1,100 Students Register Here For High School

Exactly 1,100 students have registered for classes at Roseburg High School, according to Vice Principal Kenneth Simon.

Simon said the figure was not complete because the school still has 220 cards of pre-registered students who have not yet appeared. He said the estimated total would surpass 1,500.

Registration at the high school will continue all day Tuesday at the Liberal Arts Building. The vice principal requested that students working late contact him as soon as possible in order to keep their places in various classes.

In a class-by-class breakdown, the freshmen outnumber their older classmates. A total of 340 has registered. Enrollment in other classes is as follows: Sophomores — 288; Juniors — 239; and seniors — 233. Registration started Tuesday.

France Sending Troops To Quell Disturbances

PARIS (AP) — France is sending between 9,000 and 12,000 more troops to quell nationalist disturbances in Algeria, a government spokesman said Friday.

Six battalions left France during the past two months and nine more will follow. There are between 600 and 800 men in a French battalion. Additional transport units will also be dispatched.

Government sources declined on security grounds to say how many troops are in Algeria at present. However, in recent weeks it has been widely reported that France has approximately 125,000 men in her North Africa territories.

Gaza strip, an area six miles wide and 30 miles long in southern Palestine.

The Israelis sent word to Cairo Thursday they would observe a cease-fire if the Egyptians would refrain from violence. Egypt said it had agreed on Tuesday to abide by a cease-fire sought by Maj. Gen. E. L. M. Burns, the chief U.N. truce negotiator in Palestine.

There has been no official acceptance of a cease-fire by both sides. Israeli sources said Egyptian infiltrators dynamited wells in settlements near the Gaza area on Thursday and Friday nights, but no major violence had been reported until Saturday morning.
