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to be under control of the army. The city, dazed by the vast destruction, started slowly cleaning up thousands of tons of debris cluttering all sections.

The outbreak here was the first stemming from the dispute over the future of the strategic island of Cyprus, the British crown colony in the Mediterranean which once belonged to Turkey. Greece demands that the islanders be allowed to vote for union with Greece, but is opposed by Britain and Turkey. The Turkish government has declared that if Britain gives up Cyprus it should be returned to Turkey.

Southern Pacific Effort In Douglas Area Told

In a postscript to the Chamber of Commerce meeting Tuesday night, Leith Abbott, assistant passenger - public relations manager for SP, listed some facts to bear out the SP's professed interest in the "continued growth and prosperity of Roseburg and the Umpqua Valley."

He said that since World War II, SP had played a major part in locating new industries in this area and aiding in expansion of existing plants. He said spur tracks had been built for 40 such industries and that other plants are now under construction.

He said the SP has 121 employees in Roseburg and a payroll of \$700,000 annually. He said taxes in the county last year were 3.2 per cent of the total levy.

Sutherlin Schools Feeling Squeeze

Sutherlin's school system was feeling the squeeze of population today according to Acting Supt. Tom Huebner.

The total opening day enrollment reached 1,354, considerably above the advance estimates. Total grade school enrollment was 1,043, and high school pupils numbered 311. The number of children was so great, one administrator had to move out of his office to allow for another second-grade class. The biggest class in the system is the seventh with 144 pupils.

At Myrtle Creek, the situation was much the same. The first grade was the biggest in history with 198 pupils. The freshman class boomed to 125 pupils, reports correspondent Ruth M. Evans. Total number of youngsters in the system is 1,639. Some shifting of teachers was necessary, according to Supt. Al Neel, but sufficient room was found.

Glide School Enrollment Pushes To Record 831

Enrollment in the Glide school district pushed to a new record of 831 pupils as figures were tallied for the first day Tuesday.

Supt. Byron Evans reported to correspondent Mrs. Arthur Selby that the closing enrollment last spring was 781. He said the biggest increase in pupils came in the high school. The high school first-day enrollment of 180 was an increase of 20 per cent over last year, he said.

Evans said additional pupils are expected to enroll in all schools. At first tally, the number of first graders was 193. The senior class at Glide High is the smallest in the district, numbering 34.

Defense attorney Jerry Kabler moved for dismissal of the complaint, claiming it was a matter of self defense, that McCoy was the aggressor, and there was no intent to do bodily injury.

Bartender Don McDonald and Nancy C. Strand, who had been with Stamper, testified that McCoy had been bothering Stamper for some unknown reason and had been told to leave him alone.

Dist. 116 School Enrollment Up By 59 Students

District 116 school enrollment was up 59 pupils over last year, first-day figures showed today.

Supt. William Bromley reports the first-day enrollment Tuesday reached 1,310. Last year, it was 1,251. As in other schools, more were expected to enroll later.

The only school in the district to show a decrease in enrollment was Lookingglass. Enrollment there was 76 Tuesday. On the first day last year, it numbered 94.

In the other schools, Tenmile was up to 177 from 171; Dollard Elementary was up to 373 from 349; and Douglas was up to 484 from 440 last year.

The biggest grade in the system is last year's bumper crop of first graders. Bromley reported second graders enrolling Tuesday totaled 156. New first graders numbered 150.

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Canyonville Schools Enroll 418 Pupils; Others Expected

A total 418 pupils registered in the first day of school at Canyonville and the number was expected to climb to 450 before the end of the month, according to Supt. Omer J. Monger.

He told correspondent Virginia Proctor that 82 had registered in the high school and 336 had signed up in the grade school. He estimated that high school enrollment would reach 160 and grade schools 250 by month's end. Enrollment last year on Sept. 17 was 433.

The only grade which shows slight overenrollment is the first. Pupils there numbered 59.

Two classes will have to meet outside the school plant because of overcrowded facilities. Monger said the building program will solve that problem next year. This year, one fifth grade is meeting in the Methodist Church annex. Music classes will meet in the Community Building.

Schools were in session Labor Day at Canyonville this year in order that a 10-day vacation at Christmas and a full week's vacation in the spring could be arranged. School will be dismissed May 25, 1956.

Three new teachers each for the high school and the grade schools were added this year. They are: Mrs. Blanche Weischedel of Azalea, Mrs. Barbara Charles of Rogue River and Mrs. Marcelle Chiavara of Azalea in the grades and Leonard John, Mrs. Priscilla Gadecke of Cow Creek and Alvin Jones in the high school.

Six children have been registered so far. Mrs. Johnson said a maximum of 10 can be handled by one teacher. Classes will be in the Westside Christian Church.

Other teachers will be Mrs. Ulah Rhoden, who will instruct the youngsters in muscular coordination, and Mrs. Johnson, who will teach fundamental music.

The need now is for an arts and crafts teacher and for money for supplies. A Dillard man donated \$160 for supplies over the weekend. A record player also can be used in the teaching of music. An auction sale will be held soon, Mrs. Johnson said, to raise cash for supplies.

New Missionary Alliance Church Is Formed Here

The Christian and Missionary Alliance, a new Roseburg church composed of Christians who support missionaries on foreign fields, will start meetings Thursday at 7:45 p.m. at the Labor Temple, according to the Rev. Arthur Hoenisch, leader of the church.

Sunday worship services will be held at 11 a.m. at the Temple. The Christian Alliance began 75 years ago in New York City under the direction of Dr. A. B. Simpson. Today, the church supports 700 to 800 active missionaries preaching on foreign soil.

The new church will be one of 60 in the Pacific Northwest District, composed of Oregon, Washington and Idaho. The head office is in Portland.

The Rev. Mr. Hoenisch came to Roseburg from Coos Bay to start the new church here. He has been the leader of the Christian Alliance Church in Coos Bay for six years, living in Dallas, Lewisville, Idaho, and Walla Walla, Wash., before moving to Coos Bay.

He is married and has one son, Rodney, who will be a freshman at Roseburg High School this year. The family will reside at 805½ Mill St.

Hoffman Awarded Sutherlin Sewage Plant Contract

Lee Hoffman of Beaverton was awarded the contract Tuesday for construction of a sewage disposal plant and pumping station in Sutherlin's sewage system.

City Manager Hugh McKinley reported the two separate bids for the job totaled \$148,804. The Beaverton builder bid \$128,449 for the plant and \$20,355 for the pumping station.

Four other bidders entered dual bids also. They were: Funston Construction Co., Portland, \$167,625.35 (\$145,554.99 and \$22,070.36); Lord Bros., Portland, \$176,505.90 (\$151,805.70 and \$24,700.20); L. B. McKinley, Portland, \$184,656.35 (\$15,196.10 and \$26,460.25); and Den Herder Plumbing, Heating and Construction, Lebanon, \$268,737.80 (\$224,935.80 and \$43,802.00).

McKinley said the contract for the two jobs should be signed by the first of the week. The company is given 10 days to start construction and 565 days to complete it after the signing of the contract.

He said another bid will be let in the near future for connections from the line to property lines. Meanwhile, McKinley said, construction work on the sewer lines by Jesse Bros. of Eugene is about two-thirds completed.

Enrollment At Glendale Shows Total Of 726
