New Concessions Offered Arabs On Jordan Project

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Eric Johnston, President Eisenhower's special envoy to the Middle East, Tuesday announced new concessions to the Arabs in an attempt to win their support for a U. S. plan to develop the Jordan River Valley.

Johnston has been trying to get the Arabs and Israelis to agree since 1953 on a plan to develop the Jordan Valley by an irrigation and power network to increase the productivity of the area. It would benefit both Arabs and Israelis. So far hostility between the Arabs and Israelis has blocked agreement. The Arab press has been attacking the Johnston plan, claiming it is an entering wedge for permanent peace with Israel.

In a statement Tuesday, Johnston said the plan had been revised to meet Arab demands for greater storage of water in the Yarmuk Basin of Jordan and Syria. He also said a decision on the storage of water in Lake Tiberias, controlled by Israel, would be deferred until further study by a neutral body.

Chief beneficiary of the Johnston plan, whose costs will be largely underwritten by the United States, would be Jordan. Johnston has been conferring with Lebanese leaders after talks in Jordan. He said he plans to go to Syria later this week and then on to Cairo.
